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Nun Daughter Of Montalembert Dies In 86th Year

Paris, March 19.—News has just reached Paris from Rome of the death of Mother Catherine of Montalembert in the convent of the Sacred Heart of the Trinity of the Mountains. She was 85 years old and had spent 65 years in the religious life.

Mother Catherine was the second daughter of the famous Catholic orator, Charles de Montalembert, and with her passes the last survivor of the line. She served her father as secretary for many years and had just reached her twentieth birthday when, on June 5, she announced that she wished to become a nun. That day is marked in the diary of Montalembert with the following touching entry:

"I do not believe that in a life already sorely tried there could be a more unforeseen and poignant grief."

He sought strength in prayer, fled to a chapel in St. Sulpice and remained there praying for two hours. When he arose, he had made his sacrifice. Soon afterward, the father led his daughter to the Novitiate of the Sacred Heart at Conflans, and on the twenty-sixth of October, Catherine de Montalembert took the veil in the presence of the founder of the Order of the Sacred Heart, Mother Barat, and the members of her family.

Pilgrims To Sydney Eucharist Congress Leave S. F. July 4

San Francisco, March 26.—What is likely to be the first organized group of pilgrims to leave the Pacific Coast for the Eucharist Congress in Sydney, Australia, next September, will sail from this port July 4 on the Talyo Maru according to an announcement made by the Knights of Columbus Information Bureau, here.

The pilgrims will visit Honolulu, Yokohama, Kobe, Nagasaki and Shanghai on the way to Hongkong, where they will spend several days. From Hongkong they will proceed to Sydney by way of Singapore, Batavia, Semarang, Sourabaya, Macassar and Brisbane.

In the party will be a delegation from the Middle West, according to information received here.

Presbyterians Let Priest Use Church After His Burns

Mountain View, Calif., March 18.—Fire started by incendiaries who stuffed the walls of the wooden structure with oil-soaked rags, destroyed St. Joseph's Church here last Sunday. The damage is placed at \$100,000, with but \$445,000 insurance. Two men were seen running away as the structure flashed into flame. They drove away in an automobile with a disfigured number plate.

The blaze was discovered at 3 a.m., by some one who summoned firemen and policemen. They aroused Father J. W. Galvin, pastor, who was sleeping in the parsonage next door.

Although the officers sought to restrain him, Father Galvin insisted on entering the church for the Sacred Host. He went through smoke to the altar, secured the Blessed Sacrament and a statuette of the Sacred Heart, and had just emerged from the building when the spire, with its heavy crosses, crashed down.

Father Galvin was unable to suggest any motive for the burning of the church. Mountain View, he said, had been unusually free from unpleasant feeling between the several religious groups.

The pastors of the Adventist and Presbyterian churches immediately after the fire offered their respective churches for the celebration of Mass. The offer of the Presbyterian pastor was accepted and Father Galvin celebrated Mass in the assembly room, while Presbyterian services were being conducted in another part of the building.

Father Galvin came to Mountain View from Modesto in 1913. He was previously at the Holy Cross church in San Francisco.

Ogden, Utah, Parish Benefits By Will

Ogden, Utah, March 19.—Virtually the entire estate of Mrs. Mary McGrath, who died here some time ago, is left to the St. Joseph's parish of Ogden and Sisters of the Sacred Heart Academy. It was learned today, with the probate of the will and the appointment of Father William A. Ruel, as executor, under the terms of instrument.

The estate is valued at approximately \$13,000.

C. D. Of A. Gives Bursae To Educate Priest

New York, N. Y., March 22.—The New York State court of the Catholic Daughters of America has presented to Cardinal Hayes, a bursae of \$5,000 for the education of a boy at the North American College in Rome.

Mrs. Cecilia Murphy of New York City, a national director of the order, made the presentation to the Cardinal.

St. Vincent Society Helps 35,000 Poor In All Of Ireland

Dublin, March 19.—The St. Vincent de Paul Society in the Free State and Northern Ireland relieved 35,000 persons in 1926-27 the latest report of its work shows. Eight thousand families were represented among the beneficiaries.

The income of the Society was approximately \$100,000, which slightly exceeded the amount spent in the relief of the poor. Four new conferences were added to the Society in Ireland, the number now being 74.

The reserves of the Society suffered a slight reduction owing to the prevalence of unemployment. This reduction was minimized by the generosity of John McCormack, whose recital for the benefit of the Society, resulted in a profit of \$5,500.

Savings Movement In Ireland Is Given Bishop's Indorsement

Dublin, March 19.—The Most Reverend Dr. Cullen (Bishop of Killdare and Leighlin), has presided at the founding of a Regional Savings Committee for Carlow County. The Chairman of the Central Savings Committee of the Free State, Wm. T. P. Gill, declared at the meeting that the Savings Movement in Ireland is "providing a new leverage for developing character and bringing out the spirit of citizenship."

The Central Savings Committee is designed to push the sale of Government Savings Certificates among the public generally, and particularly in schools. The certificates may be bought for amounts as low as twelve cents, with a maximum permitted investment of two thousand five hundred dollars. The interest allowed is 5 1/4% compound interest, which is free of income tax.

Successful endeavors have been made by the committee in many parts of the country to enlist the cooperation of the Catholic clergy.

In advocating the purchase of Savings Certificates, Bishop Cullen said: "The movement will have a great influence in developing the cooperative spirit, which is a very important thing for the welfare of the community. Much of the trouble that has arisen in recent years, has been because of the absence of that spirit of cooperation."

Vote To Condemn Calles In Radical League Is Close

Paris, March 19.—An animated debate on Mexico marked the last meeting of the general council of the League of the Rights of Man, a French organization composed chiefly of men of the extreme left, some of whom are Jews and almost all of whom are anti-clerical.

The president of the League, Prof. Victor Basch, asked whether the League should express indignation at the violence committed in Mexico, inasmuch as the news that is reaching Europe has provoked condemnations which the League ought not to avoid. Many members of the central council replied that the Church was responsible for bringing down upon the Mexican people secular oppression. They even went so far as to say that the League should not "dishearten the defenders of Mexican democracy."

When put to a vote, Prof. Basch's suggestion was defeated by a vote of seven to six.

French Catholics are not astonished at the attitude of this organization which has been consistently opposed to Catholicity, but they are amazed at the slender margin of one vote. It is evident that the tyrannies of President Calles have caused in Europe reprobation by even the anti-clericals themselves.

Havana Archbishop Asks More C. D. of A. Activity In Cuba

Havana, Cuba, March 22.—Commending the Catholic Daughters of America for their welfare activities in the penal institutions and day nurseries of Havana and other cities of Cuba, Archbishop Manuel Rula Rodriguez of Havana has urged Miss Mary C. Duffy of Newark, supreme regent, and Miss Katharine M. Rooney of Poughkeepsie, N. Y., national secretary of the order, to consider the organization of several additional courts in Cuba, to aid the five branches already at work in the Island.

Miss Duffy and Miss Rooney were visiting Cuba recently while entertained by prominent women of all denominations in Havana and other Cuban cities. The local court of Catholic Daughters of America is under the patronage of the wealthiest women of this city. The Grand regent of Havana court, Mrs. Maria Montalvo-de Soto Navarro, is also president of the Federation of Women's Clubs of Cuba. She addressed the latest Pan-American Conference, in the interest of suffrage for the women of Cuba.

Courses To Be Held
At Cliff Haven

Head of Department of Educational Psychology and Measurements, School of Education, Fordham University; Eugene A. Colligan, Ph. D. History; Rev. John S. Middleton, S. J., Ph. D. Philosophy; Maurice N. Rogalin, Ph. D. Education.

All students are expected to reside in the beautiful mile square park with three quarters of a mile frontage on Lake Champlain, known as Cliff Haven, and called the "Vacation Paradise for Catholics."
