Preachers Secure More License Over Radio In England

London, March 26.—Catholic preachers welcome the announcement made by the Prime Minister in the House of Commons this week that the official ban on controversy in broadcast talks on religion is to be raised.

The Government controls the British Broadcasting Corporation, which is the only public broadcasting organization allowed to exist in the British Isles.

Hitherto preachers have been seriously handicapped in explaining Catholic doctrine over the radio because it was so easy to become involved in controversial matters. Now, with certain safeguards, they will be able to give Catholic teaching without being officially censored.

Father J. I. Lane, who is in charge of all Catholic broadcasts from the B.B.C. station at Liverpool, says the ban has been detrimental to the efforts of Catholic speakers because in religious dogma practically every utterance is controversial to a greater or lesser extent. Now, he adds, they will be able to explain the Faith without vying restrictions.

The new regulation also permits statements involving political or industrial controversy. On the other hand, the Government intends to retain the veto on the expression of "editorial" opinion by the B. B. C. itself.

Propaganda Makes Changes in Foreign Mission Personnel

(By N. C. W. C. News Service) Rome, March 26.—The Sacred Congregation of the Propaganda announces important changes in the Missions in China, Indo-China, India, the Dutch East Indies, and Africa. The principal changes are these:

In China, Msgr. Lorenzo Balconi, of the Milan Foreign Missions, is named vicar apostolic of Hanbungtu, and Msgr. Gustave Desvaziers of the Paris Foreign Missions is named vicar apostolic of Takhol.

In Indo-China, Msgr. Valentin Herrgott of the Paris Foreign Missions is named coadjutor of Msgr. Bouchu, vicar apostolic of Phnom-Penn.

In India, Msgr. Louis Van Herck, S. J., vicar apostolic of Patna, is to be head of the new vicariate of Ranchi in the Chota-Nagpore region.

In the Dutch East Indies a new prefecture apostolic is established at Soerabaya, on the island of Java.

In Africa, Father Fourcardier, S. J., is named vicar apostolic of Tananarive on the island of Madagascar; and Father Gallo-Steiger, O. S. B., is named premier abbe of the new abbey nullius of Lindi in British East Africa.

Rene Bazin Pleads France Aid Church's

(By N. C. W. C. News Service) Paris, March 26.—Rene Bazin, speaking before the Charles de Foucauld Association, here, a few days ago, on missionary work in the French colonies of Africa, stressed the obligation of France to bring material civilization to her colonies. He said brotherly charity should precede the teaching of the Gospels, and that the important message of the Gospels must be impressed upon the Mussulmans.

Father Joyeux of the White Fathers gave an interesting account of his recent visit to Tammarasset, where he had seen the body of the Holy Hermit of the Sahara, Charles de Foucauld, and had visited the scenes of his labors. Father Joyeux, who is vicar in the cause of beatification of Father de Foucauld told how the holy hermit had, through prayer, example and charity, made a profound impression upon the inhabitants of the Sahara and, while serving God and saving souls, had also rendered a great service to France.

The meeting, which was presided over by His Eminence Cardinal Dubois, was attended by many prominent people, among whom were: Prince Sixtus de Bourbon; Marshal Lyautey; General Gouraud; Msgr. Thomas Boucher, Ollchon, Lords de Guebrant, Lemaire, and Le Hunsee; Messrs. Massignon and Fernand Laudet and the brother-in-law of Father de Foucauld, Monsieur de Blie.

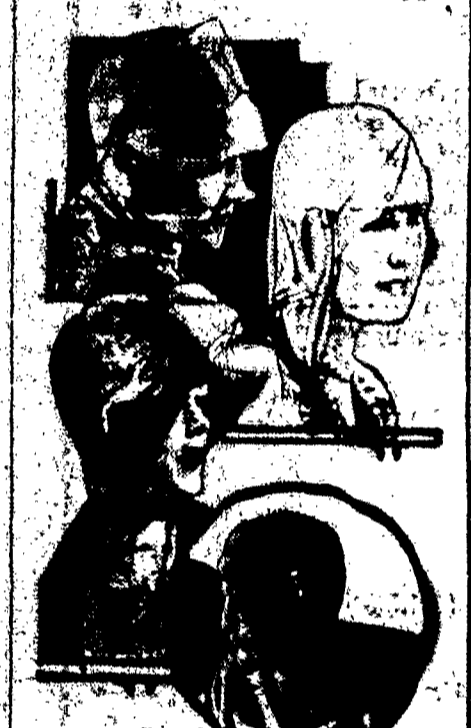
