Protestant, Mason, Assists Rebuilding Of Catholic Church

Cincinnati, O., April 14.—An unusual story of a non-Catholic's interest in the plight of a Catholic congregation at Somerset, Ky., which recently lost its church, rectory and school by fire and his efforts to restore the property has just been made public here.

R. B. Simpson, general manager of the Southern Railroad's lines west, who is high in Masonic councils, is the man about whom the story centers. When interested in the condition of the parish, Mr. Simpson not only made a personal donation but enlisted the interest of Protestant friends and to date has turned into the fund some \$1,800 one-tenth of the amount needed for the restoration of the property.

The appeal sent out by Mr. Simpson to enlist aid for the congregation is as follows:

"Gentlemen: You may or may not know, we had the misfortune of losing the little Roman Catholic school and church at Somerset, Ky., by fire recently, where the majority of our railroad men's children are being educated and worship, and I am undertaking to assist in rebuilding the same.

'Defender of Faith' As English King's Title Is Explained

London, April 14.—Why is the King of England styled "Defender of the Faith?" Dr. Arendzen, missioner to non-Catholics, answered this question in a box query at Aberdeen Cathedral.

Henry VIII, the first king to use the title, which is still borne proudly by English monarchs, did not assume it, said Dr. Arendzen. It was bestowed on him by the Pope as a reward for a book written by him in defense of the Catholic religion against Luther.

Catholic Daughters Buy Camp For Girls At Mattituck, L. I.

Gen. F. H. Robertson, Southern Veteran, Dies As Catholic

Waco, Tex., April 21.—General Felix Huston Robertson, said to be the last surviving general of the Confederacy and thought to have been the youngest man to hold that rank in either the Southern or Northern forces in the Civil War, who only two weeks ago embraced the Catholic faith, died at his home here yesterday. He was eighty-eight years old.

In failing health since he attended the Confederate reunion in Florida last year, General Robertson had been confined to his bed for months. He was bright and cheerful to the last however. His widow and four children survive until his retirement he was engaged in the practice of law.

He resigned his citizenship at West Point in January, 1861, a few months before graduation, and joined the Confederate Army as a lieutenant of artillery. In 1864, he was appointed brigadier general of cavalry and became the youngest major officer in the Confederate army.

He served under Gen. Johnson, Bragg, and Hood before getting a command of his own, and when he was the head of a cavalry brigade he was assigned to General Wheeler's corps, with whom he served until his surrender. Two months before the war ended he was wounded in the arm, and a major-general's commission was sent to him, but he had surrendered to Union troops before it arrived.

Russian Seminary In Rome Started

Rome, April 16.—Construction of the new Russian Seminary, which will be situated on the Esquiline Hill near the Lombard Seminary, the Oriental Pontifical Institute and the Institute of Archeology, has begun. All these buildings are due to the munificence of Pius XI and occupy the former site of the convent of St. Anthony.

Parents' Exposition Bars Birth Control League's Exhibit

News Service) New York, April 20.—The American Birth Control League, Inc., of which Mrs. Margaret Sanger is president and leading spirit, has been barred from occupying a booth at the Parents' Exposition, opening here Saturday at the Grand Central Palace, because of a protest of the Board of Education against participation of the organization.

Until yesterday the Birth Control League had every expectation of taking part in the exhibition. It is reported, but during the day it became known that the United Parents' Association, under whose direction the exposition is to be held, returned the contract calling for space at the Grand Central Palace. The contract, unsigned, was sent back to Mrs. F. Robertson Jones, acting president of the birth control organization.

The formal protest of the Board of Education was entered a few days ago by Harold G. Campbell, Associate Superintendent of Schools. Learning of the application of the Birth Control League, the board had put it squarely up to the United Parents' Association that, either the body headed by Mrs. Sanger be refused sanction to join in the show or the Board of Education would withdraw all displays and refuse to allow any of its scheduled exercises.
