

SIXTY YEARS SINCE BISHOP M'QUAID CAME

First Head of Diocese Here Devoted Life Largely To Christian Education

Just sixty years ago Thursday, July 12 in the old Roman Catholic Cathedral in New York city, Father Bernard J. McQuaid, a young priest in the New Jersey diocese, knelt before Archbishop McClosky and was ordained the first bishop of Rochester.

Four days later, July 16, 1868, Bishop McQuaid came to Rochester, a community being transformed from town to industrial city, with a large Catholic population which had hitherto been governed from the diocese of Buffalo. There are many who remember the first coming of Bishop McQuaid, who recall his proud, free carriage on all occasions, and who recount incidents illustrative of his startling directness, simplicity and whole-hearted devotedness to Catholicism and Catholic education.

Bishop McQuaid, from the first was interested primarily in Christian education and he observed with some dismay that only a few German parishes had schools, and that there were in addition two small Christian schools. "We'll build schools," he asserted, "and where there's a church there will be a school."

Under his administration school and church were built together, and before long, the Sisters of St. Joseph opened a convent school for girls in Frank street and a high school for girls soon followed. Then the St. Patrick's cathedral high school for boys and girls was opened. But the dream, dearest to Bishop McQuaid's heart and in preparation for which he sent several of his priests to Europe to study, was the establishment of a Catholic theological seminary. That dream was realized when ground was broken for the first building in April, 1891, and in September, 1893, thirty-nine young men were admitted to St. Bernard's Theological Seminary, named for the man who had done so much to insure its establishment.

It was a proud day for Bishop McQuaid, when in 1901 the Pope granted the institution the privilege of conferring degrees in philosophy and theology. The growth of the seminary and the addition of new buildings was one of the consolations of the Bishop's last years. His death occurred in 1909 at the age of 66.

Carmelite Convent Is Established In China

Kasing, Chekiang, China.—As a practical manifestation of their conviction that the grace of heaven must guide all the Church's labors in the missions, missionary directors in Central China have opened a new monastery of cloistered Carmelites here. The Sisters will devote themselves entirely to prayer and for the conversion of China.

The establishment of this convent, too, comes as a direct answer to the recent bitter anti-Christian attacks in China. This is the second Carmelite convent to be opened in that country. The first one having been founded near Shanghai in 1869.

In this connection, it is interesting to note that other Carmelites have been established in Madagascar, Indo-China and India. All of them, including the Chinese foundations, are of the French Observance.

Mission Exposition Is To Have Statue Of Christ The King

(Fides Service). Barcelona, Spain.—A massive statue of Christ King will be unveiled as a part of the Mission Exposition of the world Exposition scheduled to open in May, 1929, at Barcelona. Plans are well under way for this mission display. The Palace of Missions, as the main structure is to be called, is built on lines simple but majestic suggesting the style of the Spanish mission architecture of the famous reductions of California.

Catholics Hope To Gain School Grants

Africa.—The question of grants to Catholic schools has been brought up for the second year before the Transvaal Provincial Council and the motion to contribute these grants was again defeated by a single vote. A similar question was raised for the first time in the Provincial Council of the Cape Province but an amendment that the question of grants to Catholic schools should be referred to the Union of South Africa each of the four Provinces deals separately with those of primary and secondary education. The native Catholics keep fighting.

Catholic University Of Tokyo Is Granted Government Approval

(Fides Service). Tokyo, Japan.—News of the official approbation given by the Japanese Government to the Catholic University of Tokyo is contained in a report made to the Vatican by the generalate of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith.

The Catholic University was founded in 1913. Six years later the government enacted a new set of university regulations and announced that private institutions of this kind could secure an equal footing with state institutions on condition that they satisfy the necessary requirements. One of these requirements was that more than one half of the professors had to be attached exclusively to the university and another set forth that a sum of 100,000 yen had to be deposited with the government for each common college.

The Jesuits, who conduct the University, were thus obliged to provide almost \$400,000 to meet the regulations.

Chinese Prelate Is Consecrated June 3

(Fides Service). Shuanhwafu, China.—The Right Reverend Peter Teh'eng was consecrated Vicar Apostolic of Shuanhwafu June 3. The new Bishop succeeds Bishop Philip Tehao who died October 1927, a year after his consecration by Pope Pius at the Vatican. On the day following the consecration of Bishop Teh'eng memorial services were held for the former Prelate.

Holy See Names New Prefect Of Ubanghi

Ubanghi, French Equatorial Africa.—Pope Pius, through the Sacred Congregation of the Propaganda, has appointed Father Marcellus Grandin, of the Holy Ghost Fathers as Prefect Apostolic of Ubanghi. Within the boundaries of this Prefecture, which was established in 1909 are approximately 250,000 natives, 4,100 of whom have been converted to the Faith. The Congregation of the Holy Ghost in this field has a personnel of 12 priests and 5 brothers.

Mission Untouched By \$4,000,000 Fire

(Fides Service). Sarawak, Borneo.—Catholic mission buildings narrowly escaped destruction when a fire that caused a \$4,000,000 loss swept through Sibau, the second largest city in North Borneo. The Vicariate of Sarawak is one of the two mission fields in North Borneo. Both are operated by the Mill Hill missionaries of London.
