Boy Work Notes

Grand Knight Horace Heffernan of Council No. 265 of Gloversville, New York, has made application to the Supreme Council for a charter for a circle of Columbian Squires and is preparing very carefully for the proper guiding of the circle on its program of activities. To qualify his council to organize a unit of Squires and to have available the properly trained leaders, he has selected several members of the council whom he will send to the Boy Life Bureau school for leaders at Cliff Haven. In order that he, too, may be qualified to participate in the work to better advantage, the Worthy Grand Knight, himself, has resistered for the Cliff Haven course.

At the meeting of the Supreme Board of Directors recently held in Chicago, a number of scholarships for the course in Boy Guidance at Notre Dame University were provided for immediate award to college graduates desirous of entering the boys' work field. The work of the thirty-eight Knights of Columbus scholars, who were trained in the Notre Dame course, with over 70,000 boys, has had such good results since the establishment of the Boy Guidance Department, that the Board felt encouraged to continue the provision of scholarships. State scholarships have also been provided for next year's class by New York and Louisiana State Councils. Applications are now being received by the Boy Life Bureau for the scholarships.

Toledo Knights Sponsor Tour to Ste. Ann de Beaupre

Raymond J. Sheahan, Grand Knight of Toledo Council, five years ago when he held the office of Lecturer, conceived the idea that many Catholics go to some place for a vacation and as a rule, when traveling, are confronted with difficulties about attending Mass. Five Bishops Endorse Laymen's Retreat
