Seely, president of the W. R. C., and Mrs. Marie Minor, patriotic instructor of the corps. A large number of Civil War veterans were present to witness the ceremony.
Mrs. Seely said: "We want you to know that this flag, though it hangs in your courtroom, is your personal property. We want you to know that we appreciate your efforts in naturalization cases and your hearty American cooperation in patriotic affairs."

Dublin, July 4.—Some discussion in the newspapers has been provoked by the prominent part taken by the National Army during the religious processions on Corpus Christi and the succeeding Sundays. Writers have stated that many people thought it irreverent for soldiers to wear their caps, especially during the most solemn parts of religious services such as Requiem Mass. Other writers describe this practice as anti-Catholic, and as a slavish imitation of English and Protestant military traditions.
The Army authorities pointed out, however, that it is only guards of honor who wear their caps during religious services. Since the guard of honor present arms at the solemn parts of the Mass, it is considered necessary for them to wear full uniform, which includes their caps. Troops merely attending Mass but taking no active part in the ceremony remove their caps while in the

75,600 Sermons, Irish Jubilarian's Record

London, July 9.—Father Denis Cregan, an Irish priest who has just celebrated his golden jubilee in the priesthood at Northwich, Cheshire, has officiated at some 226,000 services and preached about 75,600 sermons.
The Holy Father has sent Father Cregan the Apostolic Blessing, and at a meeting of the townspeople he was presented with a check, a gold watch from the children and a gift from the altar boys of St. Wilfrid's Church.
One Diocese's Charities \$78,000
London, July 9.—The sum of \$78,000 was spent last year by the St. Vincent de Paul Society of the Glasgow diocese in works of charity. It was stated at the Superior Council's annual meeting in the city. A report concerning the home conducted by the Brothers at Langbank recorded that about 16,000 poor children have been given a fortnight's holiday at the home.

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Italy Bans Manual Divorces
On Easy Divorces
Rome, July 9.—In the interest of family life, the sale of a divorce manual printed in Budapest and advertising the easy manner of obtaining divorces in Hungary has been forbidden in Italy.
Each week, Premier Mussolini awards 2,000 lire to one or more families who have ten children. Most of the large families are found in Lombardy among the farmers. At present, the Government is engaged in an important study of the population situation in Italy. The Cardinal Archbishop of Milan selected "The Family" as the subject of his Lenten pastoral letter, for which he received the congratulations of the Ministry.

Alaska And Hawaii Ask C. D. of A. Courts
New York, July 13.—Requests from prominent Catholic women of the Far North have been received at the national headquarters of the Catholic Daughters of America here, to establish courts of the order in Juneau, Valdez and Seward, Alaska.
Several Catholic women leaders in the Hawaiian Islands also have urged the C. D. of A. to institute a court in Honolulu, but the supreme board of the order has decided to concentrate its extension activities on Canada, where it is planned to organize 200 courts in the present year.

Nuncio Will Preside At Verdun Contests
Verdun, July 2.—His Excellency Monsignor Magliano, Apostolic Nuncio to France, and Marquis Lyautey will preside at the national gymnastic meet to be held here July 21-22. M. Poincare is honorary president of the association holding the meet.
More than 200 athletic societies, representing 10,000 members, will take part in the championship contests.

Pope Honors Workers For Foreign Missions
London, July 9.—The Holy Father has conferred the medal upon three workers of the Association for the Propagation of the Faith here—Mrs M. A. Villa, Mrs. Mardel-Ferreira and Lea Dutton, all of whom have given fifty years of service to the cause of the missions.
Mrs. Villa probably has more friends in the mission fields than any other lay worker, for she has a regular correspondence with hundreds of missionary priests in all parts of the world.
