

Bishop Hickey Makes Appointments in Churches

The vacancy in the pastorate of St. Mary's Church in South Street, which has existed since the death of the Rev. Simon FitzSimons, was filled last Friday by the appointment by the Rt. Rev. Thomas F. Hickey, D. D., of the Rev. James B. Keenan.

Father Keenan has been stationed for several years at St. Patrick's which is in the north-west of the Cathedral, ever since he returned from Brockport, where he temporarily filled the pastorate of the Church of the Nativity, following the death of the late Father Story and prior to the appointment of the Rev. Michael J. Kreig.

Father Keenan was born in Bloomfield, March 30, 1872, studied for the priesthood in St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's seminaries, and was ordained June 11, 1898. He served as assistant at Holy Family Church in Auburn and at Immaculate Conception Church in Ithaca and later Korean worshippers in their very real and solid faith.

The system of the White Fathers in the vicariate of Tabora and which is understood to be similar to that employed by the Society in its own

territories, includes a course of instruction over four years embracing 300 separate lessons in the Faith. When a missionary is assigned to open a new territory in Tabora he is given a number of Catechists. For instance when a missionary first penetrated the Banangwa district four years ago he was accompanied by 13 catechists. This year the first fruits of their labors are evident. The catechists begin by making contacts with the natives, either by individual visits or public addresses and in time they succeed in gathering together a class of candidates. For these candidates there is a period of probation lasting about two years followed by a strict examination. These successful in this examination go for two more years in what is known as the catechumenate, divided into three terms of 8 months each. After these four years of preparation, the candidates are given a final examination in the faith, and they make a three day retreat. Then they are baptized.

This system may appear extremely rigid. But as the White Fathers and missionaries of other orders declare, it is none too rigid when there is question of transforming often times undisciplined tribesmen into worthy members of the Catholic Church.

Bishop Ordains Record Group of Native Priests

Shenhsien Chihli, China—The largest group of Chinese in the history of the vicariate of Shenhsien was ordained last May by Bishop Henry Lecourt, S. J. when ten natives were raised to the priesthood. Besides these secular priests, several other members of the class of candidates have entered the Society of Jesus and are at present making their novitiate.

Bishop-Elect III; Consecration Not Held At Sheklung

Hongkong China—Because of illness, Bishop-elect Gustavo Desales, former chaplain of the Lepers at the Sheklung Colony, was not consecrated June 24, as had been previously announced. On that date he was to have been made Vicar Apostolic of Pakhoi, China. Instead, he was taken ill and on reaching Hongkong was ordered back to France by a physician. No date has been set for his consecration, which was to have been held in the chapel of the Leger Asylum where the Bishop-elect labored for many years. As will be recalled, the lepers of Sheklung on learning that their chaplain had been appointed to another field made an appeal to the Holy Father that the missionary be left with them. Sheklung is the largest Leger Asylum in China, counting more than 700 inmates, and is the second largest of its kind in the world.

Dr. Philip Conboy Dies at his Home

Dr. Philip Conboy, 58, eminent surgeon, of 258 Alexander Street, died at his home, Tuesday, July 31. Dr. Conboy had been ill only a few weeks. He underwent an operation in St. Mary's Hospital about three weeks ago and last week was removed to his home.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Anne L. Conboy; two daughters, Mrs. Hugh Kelsher, of Larchmont, N. Y., and Mrs. Franklyn Slater of Rochester; one son, Leonard Conboy of Rochester and three brothers, Francis J. and Edward J. Conboy of Auburn and Dr. Michael A. Conboy of Buffalo.

Dr. Conboy was born in Auburn June 21, 1870, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Owen Conboy. He attended the public schools in Auburn and at 22 years of age entered the College of Physicians and Surgeons at Baltimore, from which he was graduated. He took post-graduate work at the Philadelphia Medical College in 1895 after which he practised medicine for three years in Auburn.

Dr. Conboy began practice in Rochester in December, 1900. For 20 years he was a member of the St. Mary's Hospital staff, from which he resigned in 1926.

During his life in Rochester, he was prominent in political, social, and art circles. He possessed a collection of 500 valuable etchings. He was a member of the Historical Society, Art Club, Knights of Columbus, Alhambra, Oak Hill Country Club, American Medical Society and the Rochester Medical Association.

The funeral will take place Friday morning at 9:30 o'clock from the family home 258 Alexander Street, and at 10 o'clock from Corpus Christi Church.
