More Priests Soon For Madagascar

News Service) Rome, July 23.—Twenty thousand European and native Catholics living on the west coast of Madagascar, who have been without priests for a long time, will soon be supplied with spiritual advisers, due to the efforts of the Bishops of Antananarivo, Fianarantsoa and Antsirane. A missionary from La Salette, a Canadian named Father Breaud, has been charged with opening a new mission with headquarters at Marodova. His region will comprise the vicariates apostolic of Fort Dauphin and Majunga.

Besides caring for the Catholics, the mission will be interested in the welfare of the pagan population of that portion of the island.

Jockeys Aid Church Meeting On Negroes In U. S. Industry To Be Held Sept. 1

(By N. C. W. C. News Service) London, July 23.—Riding Shetland ponies, eighteen of the most famous jockeys in the country competed in a race for a silver cup presented by the Jockey who won the Derby this year. The event is an annual one popularly called the "Pinner Derby" because the novel events staged for the benefit of the Catholic church at Pinner, just outside London.

This was the first time ponies were used. In the past donkeys have been pressed into service, but they have sometimes proved a bit stubborn. Shetland ponies—smaller than a donkey—put up a good race and ran the course of 750 yards at speed. Whips and spurs were barred.

Steve Donoghue, most famous of the British jockeys riding today, had the humiliation of being thrown by his diminutive mount, but the family honors were restored when young Pat—Steve's son—won the race. Father John Caulfield, pastor of the Pinner church, was the originator of the "donkey derby" idea here, and has gone a step further by pioneering the pony contest. All the jockeys are his fast friends, and he is often described as "the unofficial chaplain of turf and stage."

Four thousand persons paid 25 cents each to see the "Pinner Derby" Peggy O'Neill acted as starter. Sophie Tucker and a number of other theatrical people were there

Meeting On Negroes In U. S. Industry To Be Held Sept. 1

(By N. C. W. C. News Service) Washington D. C., July 27.—A one-day conference on "The Negro in American Industry" will be held in Cincinnati, September 1, under the joint auspices of the Catholic Conference on Industrial Problems and the Committee on Inter-Racial Relations of the Federated Colored Catholics of the United States. It was announced here today at the headquarters of the Catholic Conference on Industrial Problems. The conference will immediately precede the national convention of the Federated Colored Catholics.

Among the speakers on the program are the Most Rev. John T. McNicholas, Archbishop of Cincinnati, the Rev. Francis J. Gilligan of St. Paul, who has recently completed a volume on the morality of the American race problem, Professor Thomas W. Turner of Hampton institute, and A. Philip Randolph, general organizer of the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters.

The conference will consist of morning, afternoon and evening sessions. The morning session will be given over to addresses on the conditions of negro workers, both men and women, in the United States. In the afternoon the general position of negroes in relation to the unions will be the subject of the addresses. Discussion from the floor will accompany both the morning and afternoon sessions.

In the evening, to round out the program, the addressed will center upon other constructive means of improving the economic condition of negro workers in the United States.

Priests Should Call On Stage Folk, One Advises Conferees

(By N. C. W. C. News Service) London, July 21.—"Go around to the stage door" was a priest's advice to priests when at the Catholic Stage Guild annual meeting here. Father Michael Coughlan, Plymouth diocese, urged the clergy to keep in touch with Catholic actors and actresses.

"There is an old prejudice," he said, "that it is as much as a man's name is worth to be seen going to the stage door. But that is all nonsense. 'Souls are at stake. Perhaps a priest will say 'after all these people will be here only a week; they can go and see a priest in the next town.' The priest in the next town thinks the same thing, and that goes on all the year round."

Peggy O'Neill said Catholic actors and actresses were grateful to priests who came to see them. She proposed to organize a matinee on half of the charities here and spend a lot of her Guild funds.

Members of Irish Club Study Social Work in Belgium

(By N. C. W. C. News Service) Dublin, July 21.—F. T. Lennon, P. Waldron, and M. J. Kehoe, who are members of "An Eileach," a guild of Catholic Social Study, are on a visit to Belgium, for the purpose of familiarizing themselves with Belgian methods of Catholic Social activity.

"An Eileach," (Irish words which mean "The Kingdom") is a guild under the direction of Father E. Cahill, S. J., at the meetings of whom Catholic men follow lectures and conduct debates on social questions, and the application of Catholic teachings to daily problems. They study the many branches in the country, but its chief activities are centered in Dublin.

In Belgium Messrs. Lennon, Waldron and Kehoe spent a week-end studying the working of the Ecole Sociale de Commerce de Saint-Etienne, under the guidance of the Rev. Professor Theyskens, S. J., who made a special study of Irish questions and distributed many copies to the Irish Delegates.
