Harter—Jacob Harter died Sunday morning at St. Mary's Hospital. The funeral took place on Wednesday at 9 a. m. from St. Michael's church.

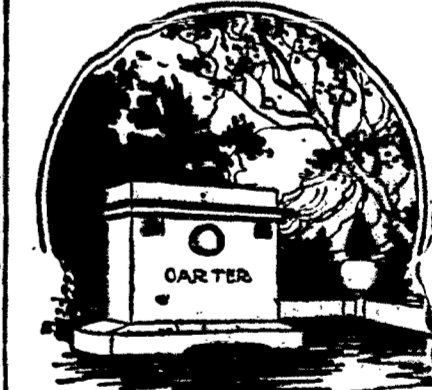

Fr. Robert Parsons, Georgetown U. Dean Goes To St. Joseph's

Washington, July 20.—The transfer of four members of the present faculty and the appointment of seven new professors are involved in the faculty changes at Georgetown University here, as announced by the Rev. John A. Dixon, S. J., acting vice president.
A particularly interesting change announced by Father Dixon is the transfer of the Rev. Robert A. Parsons, S. J., dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, to St. Joseph's College, Philadelphia, where he will assume a similar capacity. Father Parsons is perhaps the youngest dean in the history of Georgetown College. He will be succeeded by the Rev. W. Cosman Nevils, S. J., a former dean at Georgetown, who is widely known here and who recently has been teaching in the Jesuit Novitiate at Slidobrook, Mass.
Other changes involve the Rev. P. Karatz, S. J., a Filipino, who returns to Manila where he will assist in the compilation of weather reports for the Government; the Rev. T. J. O'Brien, S. J., and the Rev. J. S. Dinneen, S. J., who go to St. Andrew's Episcopal, Foughkeepsie, N. Y.; two Jesuites, Mr. Gustavus J. Deane, S. J., and Mr. Joseph A. Mahoney, S. J., received earlier transfers; the former going to Lyons, France, and the latter to Milltown, Ireland.
The Rev. Francis E. Lucey, S. J., who is on leave on Hudson; the Rev. John J. Murphy, S. J., of Canisius College, Buffalo; and the Rev. John J. S. J., are some of the members named. In addition, there are to be three new appointments to the teaching staff—Mr. McGowan, S. J., Mr. J. J. J., and Mr. J. J. J.

50,000 in Procession At California Novena In Honor of St. Anne

San Francisco, July 25.—More than fifty thousand marchers participated in the procession of the Blessed Sacrament incident to the novena to St. Anne now in progress at St. Anne's church in the Sunset district. The novena is a great annual Catholic event in California.
Led by a squadron of mounted police, the procession moved through four streets, traffic having been suspended in the district. Included were: Cross bearers, the Confraternity of St. Anne, 2,600 strong, representing every part of the State and bearing banners of purple and gold and emblems of St. Anne; the Holy Name Society, St. Francis Assembly, Knights of Columbus; Catholic Daughters of America, Men's and Women's sodalities of St. Ignatius church, Third Order of St. Francis, League of the Cross cadets, Young Men's Institute, Young Ladies' Institute, Third Order of St. Dominic, Ancient Order of Hibernians, parishioners from the bay city parishes, sixty Sisters of Charity, the Fathers conducting the novena, a color guard of boys and girls, and the Rev. William G. O'Mahony, pastor of St. Anne's, bearing the Sacred Host and escorted by an honor guard of the League of the Cross cadets.
The Hibernian band, the only of its kind in the West, and a municipal band played sacred music along the line of march.
The great courtyard of the parish school, where Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament was given, was inadequate to hold the throng and the streets in the vicinity were filled with kneeling worshippers. The Rt. Rev. Bishop Giovanni Maltagliu, Vicar Apostolic of Darfari, officiated. The novena closes Thursday.

Catholic Summer School of America

Cliff Haven, N. Y., Aug. 3.—The week just closing has been about the busiest of the season here at the Summer School. Sunday opened the week's program, with the usual religious services, the "Family Gathering" and a reception to the Rector of Fordham. Rev. Charles McAuliffe was the celebrant of Sunday's high mass, when the sermon on "Catholic Idealism" was preached by Rev. John S. Middleton, Ph. D., lecturer in Philosophy in the extension courses, and attached to the Newman School for Boys, Lakewood, N. J. The reception to Rev. Dr. Dunne took place in the afternoon, when he was the guest of honor, and officers and trustees of the Summer School and the faculty of the extension courses, were also guests. Mgr. M. J. Lavelle, LL.D., rector of St. Patrick's Cathedral, and Chairman of the Board of Studies here, was the chairman for the "Gathering" of the largest family of the season. Dr. Duane spoke of the work accomplished in the university extension courses, and said that in working for the project he felt that he was repaying in part a debt to Mgr. Lavelle. Dr. James E. Hagerty of Ohio State University, who lectured on "Crime and its Causes" spoke on his series of lectures. Agnes Quinlan spoke of her two lectures—recitals she gave during the week, and played some excellent selections. Entertainment was provided by Hubert J. McVey, vocal soloist who was accompanied by Miss Helen O'Hare of New York. Forrest Lewis of Boston, accompanied by Miss Quinlan, sang a group of French numbers. On Monday evening Rev. John E. Morris, A. F. M., Maryknoll missionary from Korea, gave an illustrated travel talk on the Catholic missions in Korea. Native costumes were displayed. Fr.
