

Masses Celebrated In Public School At Akron, Ohio

Akron, O., Aug. 6. — The first Masses in St. Sebastian's parish, Akron's thirteenth Catholic congregation, were celebrated today by the Rev. Hilary A. Zwister, the pastor, and a local priest.

St. Sebastian's is a division of St. Vincent's parish, which is the oldest in Akron, having observed its ninetieth anniversary a year ago with a successful campaign for \$150,000.

The Rev. John J. Scullen, pastor of St. Vincent's, gave Father Zwister a check for \$5,000 as the nucleus of a building fund for the new parish.

Extend China Mission Of Canadian Sisters

Montreal, July 27. — The Canadian Missionary Sisters of the Immaculate Conception are extending their activities in China this month to the Vicariate Apostolic of Haimen in Kiangsu Province.

The Vicariate already has Chinese Sisters, but the Sisters of the Immaculate Conception are the first foreign nuns to offer their services to Bishop Tsau.

The Congregation of the Canadian Missionary Sisters of the Immaculate Conception was founded by the late Abbe Bourassa in 1902 at Outremont, near Montreal.

Minister Asserts Preachers' Right To Be In Politics

Raleigh, N. C., August 4. — Protestant preachers have a right to engage in politics, the Rev. J. Powell Tucker, pastor of the First Baptist church here, declared last night in the course of a speech in which he assailed the Catholic Church.

He also attacked newspapers which criticize political activities of Protestant ministers. The meeting which the Rev. Mr. Tucker addressed was called to organize a campaign against one of the presidential candidates.

Nuns to Run \$485,000 Business Girls' Home

Dayton, O., Aug. 3. — Plans have been announced for a new home for business women to be built here and to be in charge of the Sisters of St. Dominic. It will cost \$485,000.

Work will begin Nov. 1, and it is planned to make the structure one of the most imposing of downtown buildings. It will have three stories and be of pressed brick, with terra cotta trimming.

British Miner Wins Free Scholarship

London, July 30. — A coal miner, Martin Brennan, has been awarded the Tyneside scholarship for the Catholic Workers' College at Oxford, which was founded by the Catholic Social Guild.

Mr. Brennan is treasurer of the Hodan lodge of the Durham Miners' Association, a member of the Easington rural district council, and a member of the board of guardians.

D'Annunzio's Works Since 1911 Banned

Rome, July 23. — The Holy Office has declared, in answer to various interrogations on the subject, that the tragedies, comedies, romances, novels, poetry, etc., of Gabriele D'Annunzio are condemned as well as his works prior to that date, and was decided to insert this declaration in the Index.

Careers of Persons Once In Orphanages Subject Of Paper

St. Louis, Aug. 3. — "Are the children raised in institutions successful in life? Do they become good parents? Do we find them among the professions? Do they become good citizens? These and many other questions were the subject of a paper by Rev. Dr. John O'Grady, of Washington, D. C., while here a few days ago.

Dr. O'Grady, who is secretary of the National Conference of Catholic Charities, was in St. Louis to confer with John E. Riley, general chairman of the St. Louis committee.

Mr. Riley and Dr. O'Grady went over the plans for the coming conference, which will be held in conjunction with the meeting of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul of the United States and the annual Conference of Religious.

"Among the important items to be discussed at the September conference," continued Dr. O'Grady, "will be 'What Becomes of the Children Reared in the Asylums?'

While in St. Louis Dr. O'Grady announced that Frederick A. Moran, director of Probation for the State of New York and a member of the New York State Probation Commission, would act as chairman of the meeting of the Commission on Protective Care at the conference.

Mr. Moran is a graduate of the University of Pittsburgh, and for many years was identified with Red Cross work in the West Indies, particularly in the Virgin Islands.

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Sister Of Priest And Nun Is Dead

San Francisco, August 5. — Mrs. Hannah Theresa Peters, who died at Napa, aged 75 years, a few days ago was a sister of Sister Mary Ignatius of the Presentation Order and of the Rev. James M. O'Sullivan, S. J. Her eight children were at her bedside when she died.
