

Vincentian Provincial To Preach At Catholic Charities Conventor.

St. Louis, Aug. 17.—The Very Rev. William P. Barr, C. M., Provincial of the Western Province of the Congregation of the Missions, will preach the sermon at the fourteenth meeting of the National Conference of Catholic Charities opening in the new St. Louis Cathedral September 16, it was announced here today by John E. Riley, general chairman of the local committee.

The Mass will be attended by several thousand persons. Most of the 2,000 visiting delegates and a majority of the 3,000 local members of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul are expected to receive Holy Communion at that time.

Father Barr, a native of New Orleans, formerly was a professor at Kenrick Seminary, St. Louis, and was president at Dallas University until his appointment as Provincial of the Western Province three years ago. The Western Province extends from Canada to the Gulf of Mexico and from Chicago to the Pacific Coast.

Francis J. Lewis, K. S. G., of Chicago, vice-president of the National Conference of Catholic Charities and widely known for his Catholic philanthropies, will attend the meeting here, according to Mr. Riley. Mr. Lewis has donated several hundred thousand dollars to Catholic institutions. Lately he has done much to assist exiled Mexican nuns.

First reports on the Rev. Dr. John O'Grady's survey of institutional children, which will be discussed at the meeting here, have been turned in. The survey thus far deals with the after-careers of 137 boys over eighteen years of age who were professional wards for at least one year in one of two large Catholic children's homes, one in Pittsburgh and the other in Washington, D. C. The data thus gathered is described as very interesting and encouraging.

Another decree cuts off from the Archdiocese of Madras a territory which will form the new diocese of the American continent. Father Mederlet of the Salesians of Don Bosco, originally from the diocese of Metz, has been named Archbishop of Madras. The new diocese is 60 years old and has been in India since 1903.

East Africa Convent Opens Rome, Aug. 17.—Sir Donald Cameron, governor of the territory of Tanganyika, East Africa, presided at the opening ceremonies of the new convent school and college of St. Joseph at Dar-Es-Salaam. Sir Donald congratulated Msgr. Zeiger, Capuchin and vicar apostolic of Dar-Es-Salaam, on this new enterprise.

New Jesuit Province Opened In Mid-West

St. Louis, Aug. 17.—The plan for the readjustment of the midwestern province of the Society of Jesus, which became effective Wednesday, creates a new province with Chicago as its center. By this arrangement that district hitherto known as the Missouri Province henceforth will not include any territory east of the Mississippi River.

Headquarters for the Midwestern province for many years has been in St. Louis, the territory covered extending from Cleveland to the Rocky Mountains and from the Lakes to the Ohio River. At an earlier period it included Louisiana and California and the Pacific Northwest. The Missouri Province also has been the home headquarters of Jesuit missionaries in British Honduras, Kentucky, Indiana and Michigan, as well as the northern half of Illinois. The St. Louis province will continue, with limited area.

Brooklyn, N. Y., Aug. 17.—At the triennial chapter of the Franciscan Brothers, Brother Columba was re-elected Superior General. Brother Jarlath was re-elected Assistant Superior General. Brother Vincent, teacher of history at St. Francis High School, Brother Eugene, principal of St. Francis Xavier school, and Brother Ambrose, principal of St. Mary Star of the Sea; Brother Anthony, professor of biological sciences at St. Francis College; Brother Jerome, prefect of St. Francis High School.

Small Oregon Towns Receive Dental Care Sponsored By Priest

Eugene, Ore., Aug. 17.—Taking the dentist to the country community is a venture being worked out in Lane County, Oregon, under the direction of the Rev. Edwin V. J'Hara, director of the Rural Life Bureau, Social Action Department of the National Catholic Welfare Conference.

Nine Lane County communities were included in the scope of the work, 272 children receiving free dental care in 28 days of service. Eugene, Junction City, Marcola, Springfield, Creswell, Wendling, Florence, Deadwood and Cottage Grove were visited. It is planned next year to proceed to the smaller, more remote communities.

To see what could be done to take health to the country districts, a branch of the St. Vincent de Paul Society was organized in Eugene. The Willamette Valley Dental Society furnished professional advice. Dr. W. B. Lee acting as adviser. The Lane County Health association arranged clinics and otherwise assisted the work.

Frederick Strong and Paul Murphy of Portland, benefactors of the work, increased the resources of the society. Two Corpus Christi sisters, Sister Frances Paul and Sister Regina, were field workers, acting as dentists' assistants and keeping the records. Permanent headquarters were established in Eugene.

Cleveland, Aug. 17.—Writing to the Catholic Universe Bulletin, Cleveland, from the Great Southern Hotel, Joseph of Killarney, Ireland, Msgr. of whom 500,000 are Koreans, while the population of Ireland is about 500,000, all Chinese. Both missions are cared for by the Benedictines of St. Odile.

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Cure's Jail Sentence Stayed By Justice

Paris, Aug. 13.—Some ten or more obscure politicians, municipal councilors of the village of Tarn, La Bastide-Rouairoux, hoped to Allaire fame through an ill-chosen attack. In conflict with the cure of the parish, Abbe Gautrand, they had the mayor sign an edict forbidding processions. The abbe then appealed to the Council of State, whereupon the municipal councilors lodged a complaint against him for having disregarded a municipal edict. The judge sentenced Abbe Gautrand to three days in jail.

A. O. H. Convention Denounces Bigotry In National Campaign

Atlantic City, August 21.—The National Boards of the Ancient Order of Hibernians and the Ladies Auxiliary, in annual session at the Ambassador Hotel here, yesterday adopted resolutions denouncing the "intolerant" attitude of certain elements in the country toward the Presidential candidacy of Gov. Alfred E. Smith, because of his religion, scoring the Ku Klux Klan, the Carnegie Foundation, stage and screen ridicule of the Irish, and opposing prohibition and the present immigration laws. Martin L. Sweeney, president of the national organization, presided.

Bishop Muldoon, who died last October, was a leading figure among the Bishops of the United States, and gave memorable service to his country, as well as to his Church, in peace and war. He headed the group which organized and directed the National Catholic War Council, whose great work is known to both Catholics and non-Catholics. When the peace-time National Catholic Welfare Conference was projected after the war, Bishop Muldoon was made chairman of the Committee of Survey, and the report he submitted was accepted and approved. Thus he was in a special sense a founder of the N. C. W. C. Moreover, he served on its Administrative Committee until shortly before his death.

'1862-1927'."

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Veteran War Flier Buried At San Jose

San Jose, Cal., Aug. 20.—Following a requiem Mass in St. Joseph's church, celebrated by the Rev. Joseph Crowley, S. J., Lieut. Dominie A. Difore who died in an airplane crash at Bakersfield was laid to rest in Santa Clara cemetery. The Rev. Louis O'Brien, S. J., performed the rites at the cemetery.

Fifteen pilots, most of them world war veterans, flew over the cemetery dropping floral tributes on the tomb. Lieut. Difore was born here 38 years ago. He served with distinction overseas with the air service, and after the armistice engaged in commercial flying. He was killed while testing a new motor near Bakersfield.
