Loss of Msgr. Ariens, Champion of Labor, Mourned in Holland

Louvain, Belgium, Aug. 27.—The Church in Holland is in mourning for the loss of the Rt. Rev. Alphonsus M. Ariens, a humble priest, known far and wide for an all-embracing charity that made of him a champion of labor, an apostle of temperance, a promoter of the missionary movement for native priests in pagan lands and of many other movements to which he lent the assistance of his facile pen and his fiery eloquence.

Msgr. Ariens was born April 26, 1860 and was but 22 years old when ordained to the priesthood. When but 25, he received the Doctor's title at the Minerva, Rome and the Archbishop of Utrecht entrusted him with a curateship in the factory-town of Enschede, Overijssel. Here he was brought face to face with the evils of conscienceless capitalism—great wealth upon the one hand, abject poverty upon the other—afraid for rising socialism to set up a tyranny of its own.

The young priest saw the menace to the faith of ten thousand Catholics at work in the mills as well as the injustice of which they were the victims. He threw himself into the fray upon the side of the laborers against the rapacity of their employers. It led him to found the Catholic social movement in Holland, which happily has kept the masses of the Dutch Catholic workers out of the clutches of Socialism and saved them to the Church.

Waged Fight For Temperance
As he had sensed the evils and the dangers of capitalism on the one hand and of socialism upon the other, he also realized the great harm to the laboring classes of the saloon and of the abuse of poisonous liquor. It made of him an apostle of temperance. Wherever he went, he drew the workingman to his lectures. They listened readily to his impassioned appeals for temperance. He displayed further zeal as promoter of the missionary movement for native priests in pagan lands and as an ardent supporter of traditional and correct Liturgy in our churches.

A Protestant minister, witness of the young curate's work in Enschede, said: "I do not believe in the miracles of the Roman Catholic Church; but I, verily, do believe in Father Ariens' miracle. For where that man finds the physical power and the time to do all that he does can be explained only by a miracle."

Dr. Garard Brom, another, but Catholic observer of Father Ariens' tireless labors summed them all up in these words: "If there ever was an exemplary life, it was that of this incredibly fruitful life in which good deeds did follow upon one another as words do in an oration."

The Church recompensed his work and worth with a prelatore; his Queen with Knighthood; the people with their love.

recalled many an anecdote of his eventful life. Here is one of his youthful priestly years:

Settled Textile Strike

At the height of a textile-workers strike in Enschede thousands of workers were so wrought up that the city authorities called upon the Government to send troops to maintain order. Father Ariens decided to attend a rioters' meeting and to plead with them to give up a fight doomed to failure and that threatening to end in blood. His friends, fearing for his life, tried to dissuade him from the step. He answered them: "I'll go, and I'll come down from the rostrum either a victor or torn to shreds!" He went and came down a winner. The next day he led the men back to the factories.

Father Ariens promised to take upon himself the care of all those who the millowners refused to readmit to the factories. That promise he faithfully kept; but it cost him all he possessed. He had come to Enschede with a fortune left him by his father, a prominent Utrecht lawyer, and when he left the city in 1901, to assume charge of the parish of Steenderen, he was so poor that his friends had to raise funds to furnish his pastoral residence.

Priest Translates Dante

San Francisco, Aug. 24.—A translation of the first book of the Divine Comedy, in the rhyme of the original, has been published by the Rev. Albert R. Bandini, pastor of the parish of Cotati, in this archdiocese. Inasmuch as the language of Dante, the Singua Tuscana, is his own, Father Bandini had an advantage over other translators. He was thereby able to translate accurately the close-compacted poetry.

Rev. Macey, Founder of Salesian College In London Succumbs

London, Aug. 24.—The first Provincial of the Salesian Congregation in England, Father Charles Bernard Macey, died recently at the Salesian College, Chertsey (Surrey) where he had been living in retirement since resigning the rectorship about three years ago. Father Macey, who was 74 years of age, was one of the founders of the English Congregation.

Educated by the Benedictines at Jowzside, he entered the Salesian Oratory at Turin in 1856 at a time when the Ven. Don Bosco was sending out his missionaries. The founder of the Congregation himself conferred the habit on Father Macey. Five months after his ordination he was sent to England. One of his earliest works was to enlarge the school at Battersea. This was followed by the erection of a permanent church in the district. He next opened a school for the training of ecclesiastical students, which developed into the present big Salesian College. He started a new parish in Wandsworth London, building a church there, and then built the Chertsey college.

Cardinal Bourne offered a special Mass for Father Macey, whose friend he had been for 40 years.

Catholic Emigrants From Britain In Year Estimated At 10,500

London, Aug. 24.—Ten thousand five hundred Catholics leave Great Britain every year to find homes in other parts of the world, Henry Somerville, formerly organizing secretary of the Catholic Social Guild said at the guild's summer school at Oxford.

Mr. Somerville estimated that seven per cent of the 150,000 persons who emigrate each year, from England, Scotland and Wales are Catholics.

Temperance Session Is Held At Antwerp

Antwerp, August.—The nineteenth International Anti-Alcoholism Congress has just been held here under the patronage of the King and Queen of Belgium and His Eminence Cardinal van Roey, Archbishop of Malines. The sessions were attended by religious leaders of the country, Catholic, Protestant and Hebrew.

The question of preventing the intemperate use of alcohol was discussed from every angle. Prof. Laitinen expressed the hope that alcoholism could be cured eventually through treatment of the endocrine glands. Dr. Feldman of New York and Doctors Emerson and Lindsay of Columbia University reported on prohibition laws and their effects in the United States. Mr. Antonopoulos, doctor of political science and member of the faculty of the Solvay Institute of Sociology, discussed the effect of excessive drinking upon the economic and social sides of life.

2 American Jesuits Go To China Mission

San Francisco, Aug. 31.—Leaving the University of Santa Clara on a mission that will undoubtedly be for years, the Rev. Father John A. Lennon, S. J., embarked today for China in company with the Rev. Plus L. Moore, S. J., former president of St. Ignatius' College, and three Jesuit scholars, Cornelius Lynch, S. J.; John Phillips, S. J., and Charles Simons, S. J.

Father Lennon will be located with the French Jesuit Missionaries in the Keang-soo Province, an area of 45,000 square miles with a population estimated at 38,000,000. Headquarters are to be at Shanghai. The Fathers are the first American Jesuits ever to be sent to China as missionaries.

The Missionary Cross was bestowed upon the members of the party at St. Ignatius' Church last night. The Rev. John M. Piet, S. J., provincial of the order, officiated. The sermon was preached by the Rev. Edward J. Whelan, S. J., president of St. Ignatius' College. Parishioners of St. Ignatius' Church held a reception in honor of the missionaries.

St. Mary's Has New College Publication

Brother Virgil, F. S. Rector-Editor Made Domestic Prelate

Scranton, Pa., Aug. 28.—The Rev. Paul A. Kelly, V. G., rector of St. Peter's Cathedral here, and editor of the Catholic Light, official organ of the Diocese of Scranton, was elevated to the rank of Domestic Prelate with the title of Rt. Rev. Monsignor by the Rt. Rev. Thomas C. O'Reilly, Bishop of Scranton, last Thursday. The ceremonies were held in St. Peter's Cathedral.
