Knights of Columbus Elect Fitzgerald As Grand Knight

Daniel F. Fitzgerald was elected grand knight of the Rochester Council, Knights of Columbus, at the annual election of the order on Monday night in the Columbus Building, Law and Chestnut streets. The polls were open from 2 to 9 o'clock. The only contest was between John A. Doyle and William H. Welch for the office of deputy grand knight. Mr. Doyle was elected to the post.

The new officers will be installed on Oct. 1, and will comprise the executive committee of Rochester Council. Charles R. Barnes, retiring grand knight, had held that office for the last four years, longer than any other man elected to the post.

The other officers elected are: Chancellor, James E. Cuff; advocate, James M.E. O'Grady; recorder, Thomas H. O'Connor; treasurer, George W. Henner; warden, Louis J. Knapp; inside guard, Rocco M. Fischette; outside guard, Andrew J. Schell; trustee for three years, James P. Jones; delegates to state convention, Daniel F. Fitzgerald and Charles R. Barnes; alternates, John J. McInerney and George T. Roche.

Gov. Smith Explains N. Y. Archbishopric Incorporation Act

New York, Sept. 11.—Recent injures received here by the Democratic National Committee concerning the signing by Gov. Alfred E. Smith of a bill passed by the New York Legislature incorporating the Roman Catholic Archbishopric of New York have brought an answer from Governor Smith showing that this legislation is consistent with the history and policy of New York State going back more than a century, and that it is similar to several other bills he has signed granting much the same incorporation to Protestant groups.

Incidentally, the Governor vouchsafes the information that the first general law of New York for the incorporation of churches was passed in 1784, and that the present Religious Corporations Law deals particularly with the government of the following churches: Protestant, Episcopal, Presbyterian, Roman Catholic, and Greek churches, Ruthenian, Greek Catholic churches, Reformed, Dutch, Reformed Presbyterian, Lutheran, Baptist, Congregational and independent churches, Free churches, Union churches and miscellaneous denominations.

J. A. McWilliams of Louisville wrote Governor Smith expressing the view that the Archbishopric bill "agrees contrary to the principle of the separation of church and state" asking information.

After citing incorporation bills he has signed for Baptist, Episcopal, Presbyterian, Y. M. C. A. and other denominational groups, Governor Smith points out that in each case, including that of the Archbishopric, the holding of property is made subject to the State's laws; that the Archbishopric is freed from taxation only to the extent the general State law frees all similar religious institutions; and that the legislative act did not create the Archbishopric of New York as a religious institution, as had been suggested, because it already existed, and only provided for the care of religious charitable and educational funds in the hands of the Archbishop. "It is nothing new in our statutes," says the Governor.

St. Bernadette Relics Are Re-assembled In Chapel at Lourdes

Paris, Sept. 3.—The Crucifix and the old statues from the church in which Bernadette of Lourdes prayed as a child, scattered after the original parish church was torn down to make room for a larger shrine, have now been re-assembled and placed in the chapel of the Museum of Lourdes.

The museum is an ancient stronghold, on a rocky prominence above Lourdes, which has long ceased to serve as a fortress.

Among the objects now preserved in this chapel are the Communion rail before which St. Bernadette used to kneel in her old parish church; a series of statues of the sixteenth century, carved in wood and gilded; and the bells which rang at the funeral of the saint's parents.
