Clergymen of Rochester and nearby towns, personal friends of the Rev. Mathias J. Hargather, attended solemn high mass Sunday morning in St. Michael's Church, Clinton Avenue North, celebrated in honor of the fiftieth anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood.

The Rt. Rev. Thomas F. Hickey, bishop of the diocese, who was an altar boy at the time Father Hargather went to St. Michael's thirty-two years ago, gave the jubilee address.

Bishop Hickey lauded the work of Father Hargather and bestowed the papal blessing sent by Cardinal Gaspari, papal secretary of state.

Assisting in the Mass Sunday were the Rev. Bernard Gefell of East Rochester and the Rev. Francis M. Hoefen of Webster, former pupils at St. Michael's parochial school.

After the mass a dinner was served, visiting clergymen in the parish hall. In the evening a reception was held in the parish hall.

Former Priest Here Is Believed Drowned

Police and coastguards are seeking the body of Rev. Charles S. Hoff, Catholic priest and a native of this city who is believed to have drowned near Asbury, N. J., according to word received from that city.

Father Hoff, who has been in charge of the retreat at West End, N. J., for two years, went bathing alone Tuesday, Sept. 25, at the small beach near the retreat. His clothing was found in a bath house, but no trace of him has been found.

Father Hoff was born in Rochester July 10, 1875. He received preparatory school education at North-east College, Pa. He was engaged for several years in parochial school work in Boston, after which he served eight years in Porto Rico as a missionary. On his return he went to St. Peter's Church, Philadelphia.

Later he was assigned to the Roman Catholic Church of Our Lady of Perpetual Help in Brooklyn. Two years ago he was given charge of the retreat.
