Future of Church In Mexico Assured, Says Dr. E. V. O'Hara

Washington, Oct. 6.—The future of religion in Mexico is assured by the very suffering which the Catholic Bishops, priests and laity of that country are enduring for the sake of their faith, the Rev. Dr. Edwin V. O'Hara of Eugene, Oregon, recently returned from Mexico, declared in an address delivered at the Catholic University of America here Wednesday.

The Rt. Rev. Msgr. James H. Ryan, new Rector of the Catholic University, presented Dr. O'Hara to the audience, saying that the University was honored signally in having him as a speaker.

Recalling the appearance of the Blessed Virgin to a Mexican Indian, which led to the building of the Shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe, Dr. O'Hara said: "The importance of this apparition cannot be overestimated. It was not a Spaniard, but an Indian." As a consequence, he said, the devotion of the Indians to the Virgin Mary is unshakable, and no irreverence to the Blessed Lady is possible from any source there.

Canadian Church's Centenary
Quebec, Oct. 1.—The parish of St. Charles de Bellechasse has just celebrated the centenary of its parish church. Although the parish was founded in 1740, and the first church erected in 1752, the present edifice was constructed in 1828.

Paris Servants Donors Of Five Church Bells

Paris, October 1.—Cardinal Luçon recently presided at the blessing of Rheims of five bells that have an interesting history. They were donated by an association known as "The Holy Family," composed of domestic servants, waitresses and other persons of modest means, all members of the parish of St. Honoré d'Eylau in Paris.

Writing For Blind In Braille Is To Be Done In Hospitals

Louvain, Sept. 27.—A very meritorious work of charity—the writing in relief points for the blind—which is extensively practised by Dutch Catholics for the Institute of the Blind at Grave, is about to find official recognition by the State. Upon recommendation of the Medical Committee of the League of Labor Advisors, Boards, writing in raised points, according to the Braille method, will in all likelihood, soon be one of the occupations of the inmates of the State controlled sanatoria for tuberculous sufferers who are permitted and requested to take up.

Maryknoll Fathers Will Restore Beauty Of Mission San Juan

San Juan Bautista, Cal., Oct. 6.—Resurrecting the historic era of the Mission Padres, the flaming red roses of San Juan will bloom again over the grave of Rose Castro, the original of "Rose of the Rancho," and niece of old General Castro.

The grave lies beside the walls of San Juan Bautista Mission. In the golden days of the Fathers, the Indian neophytes reverently cultivated a bush of red roses around the headstone.

"We will restore the Mission to its original beauty, and plans are also being made to construct a tubercular hospital, school and orphanage on the Mission grounds for foreigners," announced Rev. C. F. McCarthy, A. F. M. in charge of the Maryknoll Fathers.
