The Rev. Thomas L. Rossiter, chaplain at St. Mary's Hospital for 37 years, died Saturday, October 13, aged 79 years...

Church Building Damaged By Fire; Convent Periled

Fire of undetermined origin swept St. Francis Xavier Hall at 527 Bay Street at 5:30 o'clock Tuesday morning, destroying a major portion of the building with a loss estimated at \$20,000.

The blaze is believed to have started in the second floor club rooms of the Holy Name Society which met Monday night. When the fire was discovered, the rear of the building, a two-story frame structure, was a mass of flames...

Additional apparatus under Chief Jaynes and Battalion Chief Creagan arrived and kept the flames from spreading to St. Francis Xavier Convent, 20 feet away. Ten sisters were in readiness to leave the building but seven water streams thrown against the side and end of the burning building made it unnecessary.

The loss is divided: \$15,000 to the building and \$5,000 to its contents according to the fire department report.

Two classrooms of St. Francis Xavier School are in the burned building and 50 children were sent home Tuesday morning. The Rev. Francis X. Kunz is rector of the parish and Sister Frederica is superior of the convent.

Early restoration of the damaged section of the school, hall and club-rooms were being planned Wednesday.

Class for the first grade pupils will be temporarily halted until other quarters are found. The rest of the school was back to normal schedule Wednesday.

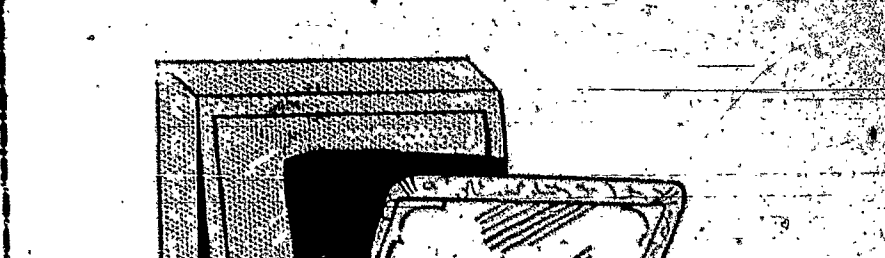
