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### Armistice Day Dinner to State Chaplain

Under the auspices of Mystic-Rose Council, New York City, a testimonial dinner will be tendered the Rev. Francis C. Campbell, State Chaplain, on Sunday evening, November 11. Father Campbell has been Chaplain of Mystic-Rose Council for the past two years. The dinner will take place at the K. of C. Club-Hotel and will follow the mass installation of the officers of the forty-two councils composing New York Chapter. The installation will be held in the afternoon at the 69th Regiment Armory.

Father Campbell, former president of Cathedral College, received the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws from Seton Hall in 1922. Two years later, Mt. St. Mary's, Baltimore, similarly honored him.

### Kansas State Officers Met at Topeka

### N. Y. State Deputy Installs Columbus Council Officers

At the regular meeting of Columbus Council, No. 126, Knights of Columbus, held on Monday, October 15, in the grand ballroom of that Council's magnificent club, State Deputy Walter A. Lynch installed the officers for the ensuing year. This is the first time as far as known, that a State Deputy has officiated at an installation of officers in Brooklyn. This honor was paid to Columbus Council because of its size, having a membership of over five thousand eight hundred, and being the second largest council in the Order.
