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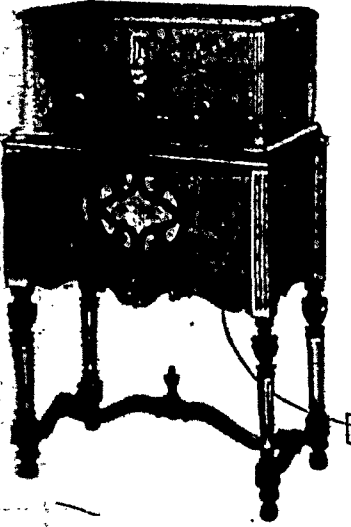

Catholic Hospitals Celebrate Annual Medical Mission Day

New York, Oct. 19.—The annual Catholic Medical Mission Day, which falls on the Feast of St. Luke, the physician evangelist, was observed yesterday in many hospitals, colleges, high schools, seminaries and novitiates throughout the United States and in foreign countries.

Medical Course Sponsored. The Board also sponsors an annual medical training course for missionary Sisters, Brothers, and Sisters who are going on the missions.

Medical Mission Day is an occasion for all Catholic people to help by their prayers and by contributions to the furtherance of missionary work.

'Rome and Reunion' Address Distorted Says Abbe Calvet

(By N. C. W. C. News Service) London, Oct. 29.—The Abbe Calvet has disavowed the translation of his addresses on the union of the Churches published here recently under Anglican auspices with a preface by Lord Halifax.

Under the title "Rome and Reunion"—Abbe Calvet also disavows the title—the English translation appeared about six months ago. It was evidently intended to give the impression that it was a reply to the Papal Encyclical which seemed to mark the end of the Malines discussions.

Yet they were not published until seven years later, and were printed without the knowledge of the author.

The statement follows: "The Abbe Calvet who in 1921 delivered certain discourses which were translated into English and recently published in book form under the title of 'Rome and Reunion' with a preface by Lord Halifax has learned with regret of the unfortunate impression produced by this publication among English Catholics and has offered the following explanation."

"Had the idea of publication been submitted again to M. Calvet after these events he would have felt unable to renew the permission he had given in 1921, without further reservations. He would have insisted on attention being called in the book to the date of his discourses."

"Had the MS been shown to him he would not have accepted 'Rome and Reunion' as the equivalent of the title of his addresses, which was 'Le Probleme Catholique de l'Union des Eglises.' He would not have approved of the way certain French expressions are rendered in English."

Throngs Acclaim Cardinal Rouleau On Montreal Visit

(By N. C. W. C. News Service) Montreal, Oct. 26.—A remarkable demonstration of loyalty on the part of the faithful to a Prince of the Church witnessed in this city when His Eminence Cardinal Rouleau of Quebec, paid his first official visit to Montreal since his elevation to the Sacred College.

In the Hall of Honor in the City Hall more than five thousand citizens gathered and hundreds of others stood outside to salute His Eminence. High dignitaries of the Church, statesmen and persons prominent in commercial life and the professions were in the assemblage.

Replying to the civic address, delivered by Mayor Camilleen Houde, His Eminence took as his theme the thought that the religious ideals of the people of this city have guided its actions and contributed to the growth and prosperity of the largest city of the Dominion.

"These high ideals, gentlemen, have long been familiar to you," he said. "They guided your actions and contributed to the growth of your metropolis. In the future they will preserve it from that ruin toward which material prosperity may lead and enable it to continue its ascent toward the highest progress."

Mission Crusade Brings 10,000 To Newark Session

(By N. C. W. C. News Service) Newark, N. J., Oct. 26.—The third annual convention of the Catholic Students' Mission Crusade was held Wednesday afternoon at the 113th Infantry Armory here. About 10,000 attended, including clergy of the Diocese of Newark, sisters, teachers and delegates from schools and colleges.

The Catholic Students' Mission Crusade, as an aid to the Society for the Propagation of the Faith, aims to impart to every student a knowledge of all the missions of the Catholic Church. The annual convention is held in conjunction with Mission Week in the schools of the Diocese of Newark, October 21 to 27.

Among the speakers were Bishop Walsh, the Rev. Harold Eynell, C.P., the editor of The Sign, official publication of the Propagation of the Faith; the Rev. William A. Griffin, diocesan director of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith.

Russian Bishop Tells Thrilling Story of Escape

(Clears Away Bones And Hides In Grave a Week While Bolsheviks Scour Neighborhood—Lives On Oak Leaves)

Regina, Sask., Oct. 26.—A story of persecution and adventure beyond the imagination of the most thrilling fiction writer has just been told here by Bishop Dubowski, who arrived recently from Rome, where he has lived a refugee since his escape from Russia in 1919 after being condemned to death by the Soviet Government.

Imprisoned for a year in Kiev, with his life daily in jeopardy; an almost miraculous escape from death at the hands of an assassin; a sojourn of a week in a Russian forest with only oak leaves for food; forced to flee when the forest was set on fire and to conceal himself in a grave, while his companion who was taken was burned alive; and final rescue by German soldiers—these are personal experiences which the Bishop relates as occurring shortly after the outbreak of the revolution.

Condemned to Death. With five Polish bishops, one of whom was Bishop Cieplak, who died several years ago in New York, Bishop Dubowski was condemned to death, his ultimate escape only being made possible by the intervention of outside countries.

The persecution of the clergy in Russia, he avers, was not an attack against any particular religion, but a war against God by persons to whom the virtues of a Christian were a crime.

Following his imprisonment in his residence in Kiev, during which his attendants kept a faithful watch to prevent the entrance of assassins, Bishop Dubowski was formally placed under sentence of death. While making preparations to flee he was attacked by a hired assassin armed with a club. The Bishop was wounded by the blow and with the assistance of his servants left the palace after a nightfall on foot.

Rescued By Germans. After waiting in vain for the arrival of German or Ukrainian troops in his hands they were safe, the Bishop's secretary determined to re-connote. Bishop Dubowski never saw him again and only after his escape learned that the man had been taken prisoner and burned alive.

He is at present visiting Polish parishes in various parts of Canada, accompanied by Fathers Pander and Hollek of Winnipeg. Upon his arrival here he was met by the Rev. Father Hilland, rector of St. Mary's Church; the Rev. George Bradley, rector of Campion College, and a delegation of Polish residents.

Limehouse Pastor Holds Anniversary

London, Oct. 22.—Father F. H. Higley, parish priest of Limehouse, this week completed his forty-third year in the parish without being absent on a single Sunday.

The anniversary was also his fortieth as parish priest. No other priest in the Westminster diocese has been rector of one church so long.

7,000 Pilgrims Visit Canada Shrine In Day

Montreal, Oct. 26.—The pilgrimage season at St. Joseph's oratory, which nestles behind Mount Royal, came to a close this month. On the final day more than 7,000 visited the shrine, and of this number 4,000 received Holy Communion.

The season brought the largest number of pilgrims the oratory has ever received. But while the pilgrimage season for out-of-town visitors is supposedly closed, each day throughout the year finds individuals or small parties devotedly making their way on bended knees up the steps to the chapel and shrine.

Priest 69 Years, Dies At 93.

Montreal, Oct. 27.—A priest for 69 years, the Rev. Canon Joseph-Soyime Taupier, former pastor of Saint Charles-on-the-Richelieu, a few miles from Montreal, has died at the age of 93 years. Of his 69 years in the priesthood, Canon Taupier was in actual service for sixty, having retired only nine years ago. A tragic coincidence in connection with his death was the fact that his sister, who kept house for him, died a few hours after her brother, at the age of 84.

Savants Addressed By Jesuit Explorer

Santa Clara, Cal., Oct. 26.—Members of the La Conte Club, composed of professors of geology at California and Stanford Universities, paid unusual tribute to the Rev. B. R. Hubbard, S. J., professor of geology at Santa Clara University, when they invited him to address their recent meeting.

The club has on its roster some of the foremost geologists of the world and only men of recognized merit are privileged to address them. The only other Jesuit ever to lecture before the club is the noted Father James B. Macelwane, now president of the Seismological Association.

The subject of Father Hubbard's lecture was the interglacial forest near Mendenhall glacier in Alaska. This forest is the only one known to exist and its discovery by Father Hubbard marked one of the great achievements of the famed explorer's career.
