Keith-Albee's Palace The Perfect Playhouse To Be Christmas Gift For Rochester

The official announcement was made Monday from the New York headquarters by J. Ford, general manager of Keith-Albee-Orpheum Circuit that Rochester's newest palatial theatre, the Keith-Albee Palace new-nearing completion, will be opened on Tuesday evening, December 25th. Thus, the great vaudeville organization is planning to make the new theatre a Christmas gift to residents of Rochester and its suburbs and the inaugural promises to be a more festive occasion than ordinarily. President E. F. Albee, who is devoting his personal attention to the supervision of this new structure for Rochester, a city which already has one magnificent theatre that challenges comparison with the great cathedrals of vaudeville.

The new Palace Theatre here covers a large area. Its main foyer entrance is on Clinton Street, but the theatre proper has been erected on a site extending from Mortimer to Pleasant Streets at a cost of approximately \$2,500,000. Its seating capacity will be 3000.

The broad space occupied gives a splendid opportunity to develop the promenades and the Grand Foyer which have become one of the outstanding features of the modern Keith-Albee theatres, combining art gallery and lounge. Grand stairways of marble lead from this to mezzanine and balcony. Marble and bronze enhanced by specially woven carpets, rugs and tapestries, specially made are generously used in the decorations.

The retiring and comfort rooms, smoking reading and rest facilities, are of ultra modern style. The electrical equipment, provided with a specially designed switch-board, has been designed and equipped with many improvements and recently proved betterments. The heating, cooling, ventilating, seating and safety of this house are the latest demonstrated and tested devices of scientific experts.

The back-stage equipment and embellishment are true to the Albee standard of the best comforts, luxuries and considerations of the artists. From the stage entrance and the green-room to the special quarters and "stables" for the trained animals, the same of perfection has been accomplished. Each dressing room is provided with private bath, trunk room and wardrobe chamber. There is a nursery, a laundry, a barber shop, a billiard room and even a kitchenette for the visiting artists.

Another modern feature will be the Palace's own parking space (a new and almost essential phase of the present day theatre) which, with its 30,000 square feet, will accommodate over 1,000 automobiles. From this special theatre entrance is provided for motorists accessible on two sides of the theatre, relieving all traffic congestion from the front of the building and facilitating the entrance and exit of its patrons.

The size of this new theatre will make it possible to inaugurate the same policy now in vogue in the new theatres in Boston, Cleveland and Brooklyn. The policy embraces a composite programme of major vaudeville introducing the most important international artists and novelties together with a feature photo-play. The Photophone is being installed and the very latest and most complete devices of sound photography and tone synchronization are assured Rochesterians as an additional pleasure when this playhouse opens. The performances will be continuous, giving three complete programmes daily. This popular policy permits patrons to see a complete show at any time they choose to attend.

Mrs. Leellie E. Thompson, district manager of the Eastern group of Keith-Albee-Orpheum theatres, with direct supervision over the new Keith-Albee Palace here, states that prominent officials of stage and screen and many famous players of both the departments of the theatre are already making arrangements to be in Rochester at Holiday time for this important inaugural.

\$1,000,000 Home Gift To Sisters in Detroit In College Program

(By N. C. W. C. News Service) Detroit, Nov. 21.—The Burtha M. Fisher Home for the Aged, a gift to the Little Sisters of the Poor of Detroit from Mr. and Mrs. Frederick J. Fisher, was dedicated today by Bishop Gallagher. The beautiful and modern institution is situated on a 20-acre tract which was donated by Mr. Fisher and several Detroit laymen. The value of land and building is estimated at \$1,000,000.

Both the exterior and interior of the asylum have been designed to conform to the traditions and needs of the Little Sisters of the Poor. The nuns are provided with a convent within the building. There is a beautiful chapel that will accommodate 350 persons. In addition to constructing the building Mr. and Mrs. Fisher equipped it with new furniture throughout. Accommodations are provided to take care of 250 of the poor and aged and the number of sisters necessary to maintain the institution.
