Philippine Priests To Aid Immigrants In Mindanao Wilds
Manila, Nov. 19.—The exploitation of Mindanao, southernmost and second largest of the Philippine Islands, is of great interest to everyone because of the development of its nearly virgin soil, but its religious aspect is of the utmost importance to Catholics.
The Council of State has adopted a plan for the agricultural development of the island, the construction of highways and installation of public services for colonists. As the colonists who will migrate to these wild regions will necessarily come from the Christian provinces, the diocese of

Zamboanga will be in need of a much greater number of priests.
Because of the number of Philippine laborers who migrated to Hawaii, it became necessary to send a Philippine Catholic priest there to care for the spiritual necessities of these emigrants. Ecclesiastical authorities as well as others will encourage migration to Mindanao rather than Hawaii, since this will help to solve the economic problems of the islands.
The work of self-sacrificing missionaries in Mindanao, Palawan, and the Mountain Province passes unheeded by many people, Catholics included. These missionaries not only care for the spiritual welfare of the laity, but also their material welfare.

Moslem Minaret On Wailing Wall Arouses Protest

Jerusalem, Nov. 12.—Moslems, in order to confirm their exclusive rights of ownership on the Wailing Wall, subject of much controversy due to the disorders during the recent Jewish Day of Atonement, have erected a room on the northern part of the wall, which, it is alleged, is intended as a base for a small minaret.
Jewish leaders have made a strong protest to the Government, asking that the work be stopped.
It is the Government's opinion it is stated here, that it cannot legally prevent the Moslems completing the building at the Wall area in view of Article 13 of the Palestine Mandate. The last paragraph of this article reads as follows: "Nothing in this Mandate shall be construed as conferring upon the Mandatory authority to interfere with fabrication of management of purely Moslem sacred shrines, the immunities of which are guaranteed."
Protests against the Jewish demands regarding the Wall were received from the Nationalists' Committee of Amman, Transjordan, and from the residents at Damascus. The Jewish agitation is continuing in an effort to settle forever the question of the Wailing Wall. They contend that the site, sacred to Jews, and its immediate surroundings should be handed to them by a Government act of expropriation.
According to the daily Jewish paper Doar Hayom, the Moslems are now contemplating the construction of an iron gate at the approach to the Wall, the key of which will be in their hands.

300 In Cleveland Confirmation Class

Cleveland, Nov. 14.—In a class of 300 adults and children confirmed by Bishop Joseph Schrembs Sunday in the colored parish of Our Lady of the Blessed Sacrament, most of the adults were converts.
This parish, the only one in the Cleveland diocese exclusively for colored, was established by the Rev. O. J. Gannon in 1907. Its membership has grown from less than 100 persons to approximately 600, the greater number being converts.
Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament teach 170 children in the little frame school and because of lack of accommodations are compelled to decline admitting more.

Calendar Change Stirs Protest In Orthodox Church

Jerusalem, Nov. 19.—The action of the Orthodox Greek Patriarch of Alexandria, Egypt, in following the reform movement and substituting the Gregorian for the Julian calendar has met with strong opposition.
At Port Said a petition was drawn up asking that the Julian calendar be continued in force. Similar request by the Abyssinians, the petition said, had been granted. It was rejected.
Then the Greek Orthodox church members of Port Said passed a resolution to celebrate their religious feasts in the Church of the Copts, boycotting the ceremonies within the temples of their community. A similar form of protest was adopted at Alexandria.
An effort was made to celebrate Mass on the feast of St. Jerasimus, according to the Julian calendar. An Orthodox-Russian parish priest was to officiate but he was suspended by the Patriarch, Mgr. Meletios. This severe measure aroused retaliation on the part of the community, which manifested its resentment by writing inscriptions on the walls of St. Sabas Convent.

Dr. George Johnson Assumes Educational Duties With N.C.W.C.

Washington, Nov. 24.—The Rev. Dr. George Johnson, editor of the Catholic Educational Review and Associate Professor of Education at the Catholic University of America, who recently was designated head of the Department of Education of the National Catholic Welfare Conference, has assumed his duties with the Conference. The Most Rev. Austin Dowling, Archbishop of St. Paul, is Episcopal Chairman of the Education Department.
Dr. Johnson has had a distinguished career in the field of Catholic University, also in Toledo. He 1899, he was educated in the parochial schools there and at St. John's University, also in Toledo. He prepared for the priesthood at St. Bernard's Seminary, Rochester, N. Y., and at the North American College at Rome. He was ordained in Rome in June, 1914. Thereafter, for three years, he made special studies at the Catholic University of America, under Dr. Thomas Edward Shields, to prepare himself for the office of diocesan superintendent of schools.
He served as Diocesan Superintendent of Schools at Toledo for the next two years, when he joined the faculty of the Department of Education at the Catholic University. He has taught at the University for seven years. Besides being editor of the Catholic Educational Review, he also is a member of the Advisory Board of the National Catholic Educational Association.

Rev. Francis Nigsch, Aged 82, Dies In Ohio

Carthage, Ohio, Nov. 24.—Funeral services for the Rev. Francis Nigsch, 82, oldest in age and in service of the local community of the Congregation of the Precious Blood, were held here yesterday.
Father Nigsch died last Tuesday of illness following a paralytic stroke he suffered last summer. He was born in Vorarlberg, Austria, in May, 1846, and entered the order in 1866. He was ordained in January, 1872.
Two of his brothers also were members of the Precious Blood order. Both are dead.
Father Nigsch relinquished doing active work only a month ago, when physical weakness made it impossible for him to continue longer.

Adoption of Latin Characters Upheld By Angora Rulers

Jerusalem, Nov. 19.—The National Assembly of Angora in passing the law providing for the adoption of Latin characters to supplant the Arabic in the written language of the country has issued this explanation:
"By adopting the Latin characters the Turkish Government did not think at all to break down the relations with Oriental peoples. The aim of the reform is to fight illiteracy. This radical measure was adopted to enable Turks to learn to read and write more easily."

Wisconsin Nun Dies When Auto Hits Her

Madison, Wis., Nov. 21.—Sister M. Imelda, member of the Order of the Sorrowful Mother, registered as a student at the University of Wisconsin, was killed and Wilbur Koch, a mechanical engineering student, was seriously injured, when Koch's automobile struck the nun as she stepped from a sidewalk near the university, last night.
At a hospital, Koch said he failed to cross the street. The nun's residence was given as Convent, Cedarburg, Milwaukee. She was registered in the letters and science course.
