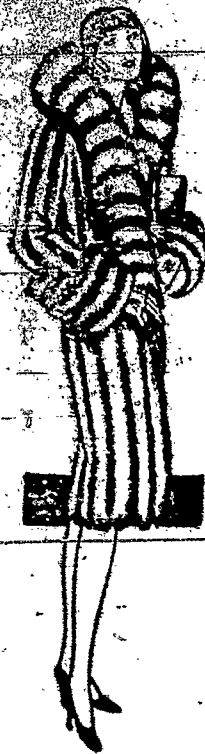


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New Keith-Albee

Palace To Open With Holiday Matinee

J. J. Ford, general manager of the Keith-Albee-Orpheum Circuit of theatres issued a supplementary announcement from New York, stating that the new Keith-Albee Palace Theatre here in Rochester would have its premiere performance Tuesday afternoon, December 25th, opening with the Christmas Day matinee. After a consultation of the executive board it was concluded not to deplete the holiday matinee patrons an opportunity of attending the palatial new theatre here and while the first performance will be in the nature of an inspection of the beauty of the latest Keith-Albee playhouse and the inaugural programme will be a "repetition general" as the French call this first presentation of a new bill, the special ceremony of dedication will be originally planned.

The new Keith-Albee Palace here, incidentally will be the first theatre on the circuit to be built with the new Phonophone or sound equipment and amplifying apparatus in connection with the construction of the present and auditorium in most theatres this winter and equipment has been added after the theatre were completed but here it was made a part of the plans, just as the organ, electric conduits, heating facilities and other appointments of a modern house are provided for in the construction. For this reason the new Keith-Albee Palace will be the most complete and up-to-date theatre in the city.

Rochester Theatre

Weekly Calendar Of Feast Days

Sunday, December 9.—St. Leodegaria, virgin, was a native of Toledo who was apprehended by order of Dacian, the governor under Diocletian. Hearing of the martyrdom of her friend St. Eulalia, she prayed that God would not prolong her exile. Her prayer was heard and she died in prison. Monday, December 10.—St. Eulalia, virgin, martyr, a native of Merida in Spain, when only twelve years old appeared before the cruel judge Dacianus who was executing the edicts of Diocletian, and reproached him for attempting to destroy souls by compelling them to renounce the true God. She was seized and, when flattery failed to win her over, was most cruelly tortured before she finally succumbed. Tuesday, December 11.—St. Damasus, Pope, was archdeacon of the Roman Church in 355 when Pope Liberius was banished. The saint followed the Pontiff into exile and later returned to Rome where he was chosen to succeed Liberius on the latter's death. After overcoming local dissension he devoted his time to the extirpation of Arianism in the West and Apollinarism in the East and for this purpose convened several councils. He died in 384. Wednesday, December 12.—St. Valery, abbot, was born in Auvergne in the sixth century. After spending a number of years in several monasteries seeking spiritual perfection he travelled into Neustria where he converted many infidels and established a monastery of his own. He died in 622. Thursday, December 13.—St. Lucy, virgin, martyr, after her mother had been miraculously restored to health, consecrated her virginity to Christ. A young man to whom she had been promised in marriage accused her as a Christian to the heathen. A fire kindled around her was, through miraculous intervention, prevented from harming her and she was finally dispatched with the sword as foretold at the tomb of St. Agatha when her mother was cured. Friday, December 14.—St. Nicastus, Archbishop, and his companions, martyrs. St. Nicastus was the Bishop of Rheims who was killed by the barbarians who plundered that city in the fifth century. Florens, his deacon, Jocund, his lector, and Eutrope, his sister, were martyred with him. Saturday, December 15.—St. Mesmin, was appointed abbot of the monastery at Micy in the time of King Clovis. During a terrible famine he fed nearly the whole city of Orleans with wheat from his monastery without perceptibly reducing it. He also drove an enormous serpent out of the place in which he was afterwards buried. After governing his monastery for ten years, he died of sanctity, in the year 520.

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Sunday's Liturgy

Dec. 9: Second Sunday of Advent By Dom Cathbert Goeb, O.S.B. (Prepared for the N. C. W. C. News Service by the Liturgical Press, Collegeville, Minnesota.)

Today the Church prays for the interior sanctification of our hearts because exterior sanctification alone is useless: "Stir up our hearts, O Lord, to prepare the ways of Thine only-begotten Son; that through His coming we may attain to serve Thee with purified minds." (Collect). The sanctity of the children of God is above all shown by fraternal charity, a holy peace, as the Divine Saviour practiced it towards the Jews and Gentiles: "Now the God of patience and of comfort grant you to be of one mind towards one another, according to Jesus Christ; that with one mind and with one mouth you may glorify God and the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ." (Epistle).

The Redeemer came for all, Jew and Gentile alike. The seed from the root of esse has also called us, the Gentiles, into His one Church. As a token of our gratitude for our wonderful calling, which we owe solely to the mercy of God, we ought to cultivate during this holy season of Advent the spirit of brotherly love, so unknown in the world of today. As the Apostle says in the Epistle, this unity and oneness of the members of the Church is best expressed in the one and harmonious praise and service of God.

In the Gospel St. John the Baptist proposes the important question, in the name of his disciples, in the name of Israel, in the name of all Christians: "Art Thou He that art to come, or look we for another?" And the Saviour gives an answer unmistakable in its meaning, pointing to the testimony of the prophets and the testimony of His works: "Go, and relate to John what you have seen and what you have heard."

Also for us St. John is the precursor, the preparer of the way. He strengthens our faith in Jesus, the true Messiah. "The blind see, the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the poor have the Gospel preached to them." We are blind, the lame, the lepers, the deaf and the poor. We shall find salvation and a cure only in Christ. But still greater miracles will Christ work in our souls on Christmas day itself, if we go to meet Him, imitating the example of the Baptist, his steadfastness and courage, his self-denial and love and willingness to sacrifice. He was no less shaken by every wind of temptation or false doctrine.

In today's Mass Christ, our Salvation and Saviour, will appear in our midst with His mercy and His love. There He will confer new life and spiritual joy: "Thou wilt turn, O God, and bring us to life and Thy people shall rejoice in Thee." (Offertory verse). At the Eucharistic banquet we experience this joy and celestial bliss—we, the happy children of the new "Jerusalem," celebrating Christmas in anticipation of "Arise, O Jerusalem, and stand on high and behold the joy that cometh from Thee from Thy God." (Communion verse). Ardent longing for the Redeemer is the keynote of the Church's liturgy today.

After Indictment For K. of C. Libel

By Rev. J. Van der Heyden. Maplewood, N. J., Dec. 3.—At the request of the board of trustees, the Rev. Elmo L. Bateman, who was indicted by the Essex County Grand Jury, Friday, for criminal libel, resigned as pastor of the Hilton Christian Church here, at the morning services yesterday. Mr. Bateman was indicted on complaint of Edward J. O'Brien, a Knight of Columbus, that he had circulated a false oath of the Knights of Columbus. Mr. O'Brien is said to have traced a copy of the bogus oath to Mr. Bateman through the postal authorities. Mr. Bateman will plead to the charges this afternoon. The resignation was requested by the trustees after a meeting at the home of John L. Michaels, president of the board, Friday evening. Mr. Bateman's explanation, according to Mr. Michaels was not satisfactory. Mr. Bateman asked to have the resignation postponed. Mr. Michaels said, but the trustees insisted that it be made immediately.
