Adjutant General Of Army, Catholic War Hero, Is Dead

(By N. C. W. C. News Service) Washington, D. C., Jan. 5.—Funeral services were conducted at St. Matthew's Church, yesterday, for Maj. Gen. Lutz Wahl, adjutant general of the Army. Interment with military honors followed in Arlington Cemetery. Gen. Wahl, who died after an illness of several weeks, was 58 years old. He was the holder of the Distinguished Service Medal for "exceptionally meritorious and distinguished service" during the World War period. At the outbreak of the World War, Gen. Wahl first commanded the 58th Infantry of the 4th Division. He was detached from his regiment and ordered to Washington early in 1918, serving there as chief of operations of the general staff. On his appointment to the grade of Brigadier General this service terminated and he joined the 7th Division, in which he commanded the 14 Infantry in all of its operations. After the war he returned to Washington and attended the War College in 1921 he was detailed to the adjutant general's department and assigned to service in the Officer's Division. He was appointed adjutant general, July 2, 1927. Gen. Wahl was a native of Milwaukee and was graduated from the United States Military Academy in 1901. His earlier service was with troops at Fort Keog, Mont., and at Fort Logan, Col. He went to the Philippines during the insurrection in 1898 for a term of service lasting about three years. He returned to the Philippines in 1903 and 1908, for two years service each time.

Dutch Prince Consort Criticized For Taking Odd Fellows' Office

The Hague, Dec. 31.—There is a stir in Holland Catholic circles, and among orthodox Protestants as well, because the Prince Consort, Henry of Mecklenburg Schwerin, has recently accepted the title of Protector of the Social Service Board of the Odd Fellows. "The Order of Odd Fellows," says a writer in "De Limburger Koerier," is a secret society and that suffices to make it undesirable for any one invested with so high a rank in the State as the Prince of the Netherlands to enter into any connection whatever, with it, even though that connection occurs by way of a department of the Order of which the aims are primarily of a social and ethical character. Such aims, verily, need not be pursued along the byways of a secret society.

\$575,000 Bequest Made To Overbrook

(By N. C. W. C. News Service) Philadelphia, Jan. 4.—A bequest of approximately \$575,000 is made to St. Charles Borromeo Seminary, Overbrook, in the will of Frederick S. Smith, which has just been admitted to probate at Easton, Pa. All but about \$25,000 of his estate, which is estimated to be worth \$600,000, was left by Mr. Smith to Cardinal Dougherty for the benefit of the seminary.

Fenian Revolution Hero Dies; Aged 86

Ogden, Utah, Jan. 4.—Patrick Nugent, 86 years old, last of the 26 men who formed the war party on board the vessel "Erin's Hope" that attempted to land ammunition in Ireland during the Fenian Brotherhood revolt in 1865, died here recently. The little vessel had almost reached the coast of Ireland, after a 27-day voyage from America, when one of the officers was accidentally wounded. Nugent was one of three men who took him ashore in search of medical attention. They were captured by British soldiers and sentenced to death, but later were reprieved and banished to America.

Storm Relief Gifts Total \$276,282.26.

C., Jan. 4.—The Administrative Committee of the National Catholic Welfare Conference has received additional contributions for the storm sufferers of Porto Rico, Haiti and Florida from the following dioceses: Salt Lake City, \$665.49; Sacramento, \$257; Des Moines, \$2,772.07; Rochester, \$300.10. These contributions raise the total given by the dioceses of the country for the rehabilitation of religious and charitable institutions in the hurricane areas to \$276,282.26.

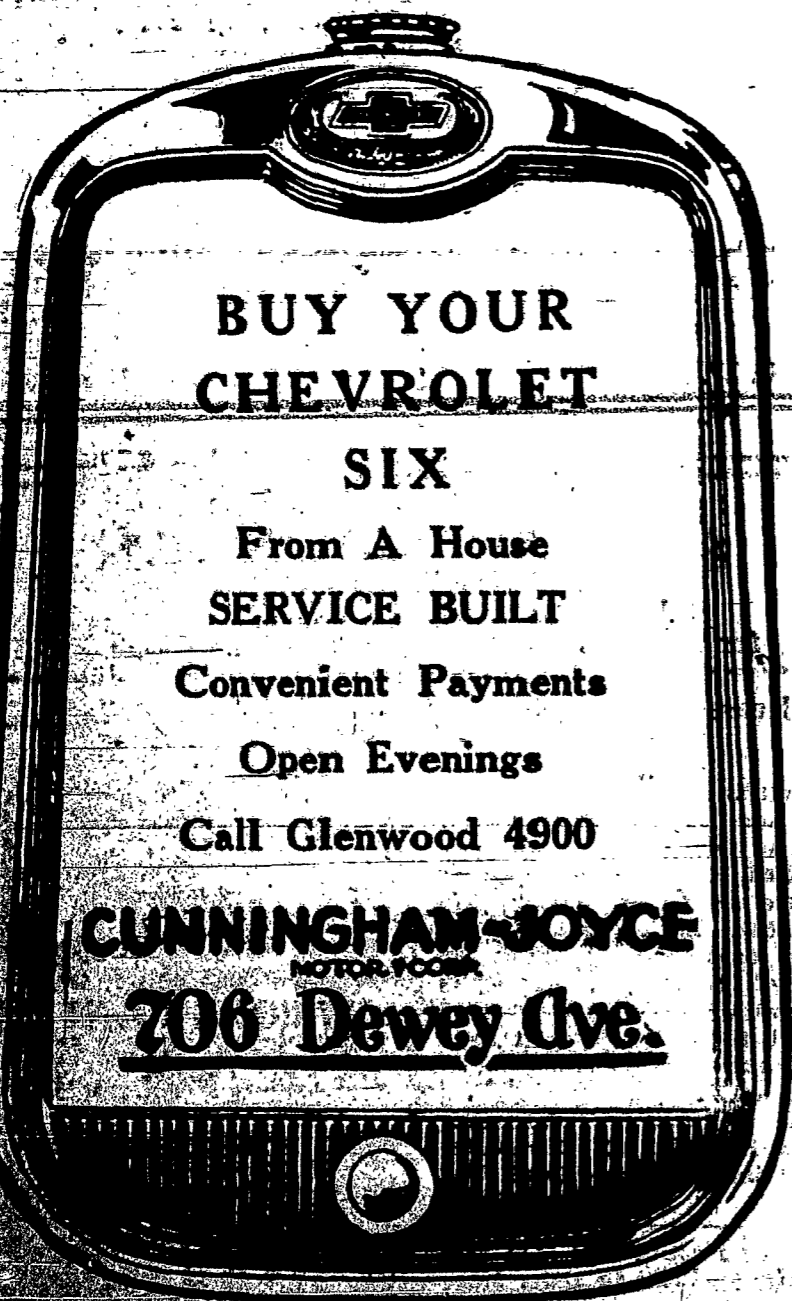

Preacher General Of Dominicans Dies London, Jan. 4.—The only priest in England holding the Dominican degree Preacher General died recently at Stroud, Gloucestershire. He was the Very Rev. Joseph Mandy, O. P. C., and had just completed his 76th year. The Preacher General degree was conferred by the Master General in recognition of the pastoral labors of Father Mandy. Born at Grahamstown, South Africa, he entered the Dominican Order at Woodchester, Glos., and was admitted to profession there in 1871. He worked at Hinkley, Leicester-shire, for 15 years before being elected Prior of Holy Cross Priory, Leicester. Later he was at Byken, Neweasth-on-Tyne, and served again at Hinkley before, in 1927, retiring to Stroud, Glos., to act as chaplain to the Dominican nuns.

Holy Name Society Is Thanked By Pope For Yule Message New York, Jan. 4.—The Very Rev. M. J. Ripple, O. P. C., National Director of the Holy Name Society, has received from Cardinal Gasparri, Papal Secretary of State, the following cablegram: "His Holiness heartily thanks the Holy Name Society for its Christmas and New Year greetings and prayers and willingly imparts his Apostolic Blessing." Each year at Christmas time, Father Ripple, in the name of the Holy Name men of the United States, transmits to the Holy Father their sincere greetings and best wishes, and their renewed pledges of prayer and loyalty. Cardinal Gasparri's cablegram was in answer to this year's message to His Holiness from the Holy Name men.
