55 Assassinations Listed in Hidalgo's Political Warfare

Mexico City, Jan. 25.—Reports received here today from the State of Hidalgo tell of the killing there since Monday of five partisans of the contending candidates for governor. This brings the list of political assassinations reported from that State since December 20 up to 55.

In some of the Courts of Civil Registry in Mexico, according to El Universal, extra fees are being charged for the performance of marriage ceremonies. Couples appearing to be married, the paper reports, are told by judges that there is a long waiting list, that all the working hours of the Court are filled for days and that if the ceremony is to be performed within the time desired it will have to be done after hours. For this extra time the court charges an additional fee. This, says El Universal, is declared a false pretense, and is resulting in considerable hardship.

Charged with having betrayed the cause of the peasant, three men who once stood at the head of the Agrarian movement in Mexico were formally voted out of the party they formed. Aurelio Manrique and Antonio Soto y Gama, both members of the Chamber of Deputies, and Lauro G. Galoca, a member of the Senate were expelled last week. The specific charge was that they had been disloyal to Gilberto Valenzuela, the Agrarian candidate for the presidency. They were forcibly removed from the meeting, leaving Leopoldo Reynoso Diaz in command of the situation.

Reynoso Diaz, only three days before, had himself been expelled from the party on the charge that he acted without authority when he pledged the party to support Aaron Saenz. This action is held to be evidence of a definite breach between Valenzuela and Saenz.

Marquette Tutor, Poet Laureate of Canada, Succumbs

Milwaukee, Jan. 25.—Dr. John D. Logan, poet laureate of Canada and head of the Department of English at Marquette University, died at the University hospital yesterday.

Dr. Logan became a member of the faculty at Marquette in 1926. He was born in Nova Scotia in 1869 and after graduation from Pictou Academy in 1886 attended Dalhousie University, Halifax, N. S. He also attended Harvard and won three scholarships in successive years. He served as editor of two Canadian newspapers and fought during the war in France, where he was decorated.

Dr. Logan also wrote many volumes on literary and political history, English text books, criticism and fiction.

Catholic Newspaper Is Placed On Liners

Liverpool, Eng., Jan. 25.—Copies of the Catholic Times will in the future be available in the reading-rooms of the Hamburg-American liners traveling between Hamburg, Cobl and American ports. The papers will be placed aboard the liners as they call at the southern Irish port, the publishers announced today.

The Catholic Times also is obtainable on the White Star liners, which ply between Liverpool and New York and Boston, and on the vessels of the United States Lines.

Hurricane Relief Fund Total Now Is \$284,959

Washington, D. C., Jan. 25.—Announcement of additional gifts from the dioceses of the United States for the rehabilitation of religious and charitable institutions in the hurricane-stricken areas of Porto Rico, Haiti and Florida was made today through the administrative Committee of the National Catholic Welfare Conference. The total contributed to date, either through the N. C. W. C. or directly to the dioceses affected, is \$284,959.82.

A contribution of \$8,500 was received by the Administrative Committee from the Archdiocese of New Orleans and the committee received checks for \$61.46 from Bishop Nussbaum of Marquette, Mich., and \$116.78 from Bishop Tiet of Concordia, Kansas.

Contributions sent direct to Florida and reported to the Administrative Committee included \$846.17 from the Archdiocese of San Francisco and \$2,000 from the Archdiocese of Chicago.

Holy Name League Forms In Richmond

Richmond, Va., Jan. 25.—The first unit of the Holy Name Laymen's League was formed here Sunday at a meeting of members of the Holy Name Society, called by the Rev. Edward Brosnan. The principal objects of the league are to use all modern means for the diffusion of Catholic thought and ideas and to combat attacks on the Church.

Officers of the local organizations are J. F. O'Keefe, president; Fred Sitterding, vice-president; W. J. Fleming, secretary, and Frank Newbiser, treasurer.

Two Native Priests Conduct Retreat In Indo-China Seminary

Ha-Nio, Indo-China, Jan. 14.—For the first time, retreats were given at the Seminary at Phat-Diem by two native priests. Heretofore missionaries have always conducted retreats in the three institutions. Since its foundation sixteen years ago, the Phat-Diem Seminary has given ninety priests to the Church. The Grand Seminary now has 53 students, the Petit Seminary 126, and the preparatory school, 130.

Passion Play To Open Its Fifteenth Season Union City, N. J., Jan. 25.—The fifteenth consecutive season of America's Oberammergau Passion Play will open with a special performance for children, Sunday afternoon, in the Passion Play Auditorium, here.

Teachers and members of religious orders in charge of the children also will be invited to attend. The regular performances for adults will open the first Sunday of Lent, Feb. 17. More than 100 persons take part in the performance.
