

Cistercians Take Over Caldey Island

London, Jan. 21.—All the residents of Caldey Island went down to the shore to greet the Cistercians from Chimay, Belgium, on their arrival to take over the Abbey recently vacated by the Benedictines.

The monks crossed from Tenby, on the mainland three miles off, in the motor launch "The Dove". As Abbot Anselm Le Bail landed the islanders pressed forward to kiss his ring and receive his blessing.

A procession was then formed to the Abbey. It was led by the new community, who had brought with them the foundation cross from Belgium.

On beginning their new life on Caldey Island the first act of the community from Belgium was to send a telegram to the Bishop of Menevia.

Report on Catholic Summer Camps

Washington, Jan. 24.—Due to the rapid and varied growth of every type of Catholic Charities, that a special committee should be appointed to gather together a body of information which might be mutually helpful.

Accordingly, such a committee was appointed with Dr. Paul Hanly Furley, professor at the Catholic University, as the chairman. This committee has held many meetings at the headquarters of the Conference, 1103 Vermont Ave. in this city.

A report has now been published which represents the findings of this committee. Many specialists in the field of physical education and recreation loaned their valuable assistance and advice to this committee.

The report is regarded by experts as indispensable to those persons interested in and administering camps.

The experts contend that a camp with honest intentions will defeat its own purposes if it is not conducted along scientific lines.

The history of the camping movement is traced in the report. Other phases of camp life are treated in the following sequence: Administrative Organization; Financing a Camp; Camp Site; Buildings and Equipment; Camp Staff; Intake; the Camp as a Telegram to the Bishop of Menevia; Water Supply and First Aid; Sanitation; Religious Life of the Camp; Special Problems; Health Services; Special Problems in Girls Camps; Appendix I. State Regulations Regarding Summer Camps; Appendix II. Suggested Lists of Campers' Equipment; Appendix III. Directory.

Senator Consults Dr. John A. Ryan On Merger Proposals

Washington, Jan. 28.—In his efforts to amend the enabling resolution which would bring about a merger of the street railways of Washington, United States Senator Blaine of Wisconsin has sought the advice of the Rev. Dr. John A. Ryan, professor of industrial ethics at the Catholic University of America and director of the Social Action Department of the National Catholic Welfare Conference.

The Blaine amendment would change the method by which utility corporation valuations are now being fixed throughout the country, providing that Congress and State legislatures determine values and rate bases on a prudent, investment basis, and doing away with the reproduction cost theory.

The Blaine amendment is in entire accord with the ideas of Dr. Ryan, advanced in a pamphlet entitled "The Ethics of Public Utility Valuation," prepared by the noted economist and published by the National Popular Government League.

Vicar General Named In Diocese of Trenton

Trenton, N. J., Jan. 25.—The Rt. Rev. John J. McMahon, Bishop of Trenton, has just announced the appointment of the Rt. Rev. Magr. Maurice H. Spillane as vicar general of the diocese to succeed the late Magr. John H. Fox.

Bishop McMahon announced at the same time that the Rev. Thomas U. Sullivan, pastor of the Holy Trinity Church, Trenton, has been named as vicar general of the diocese.

The Rev. Magr. Spillane is a native of Trenton and was educated at St. Francis College, Trenton, and at St. Joseph's University, Philadelphia.
