

Msgr. O'Hern To Be Consecrated On March 19th

Authorization was received here Wednesday night from Rome for the consecration of Rt. Rev. Monsignor John Francis O'Hern as third bishop of Rochester to take place Tuesday morning, March 19.

The feast day of St. Joseph, March 19, was tentatively selected by Monsignor O'Hern some weeks ago for the ceremony. Since, however, canon law requires that consecration services must take place on a feast of one of the twelve Apostles, special permission had to be obtained from the Holy See for the suggested date.

CHARLES E. MIRGUET, SCIENTIST, DIES HERE

Charles E. Mirguet, 69, scientist and osteologist at the Smithsonian Institution at Washington and for a number of years affiliated with Ward's Natural Science Establishment here, died Wednesday, February 20th, at his home at 80 Selye Terrace.

Because of ill health, Mr. Mirguet obtained a leave of absence from the institution some time ago. He apparently had recovered, and was preparing to return to his duties in Washington when he was stricken.
