English Church Disestablishment And Its Problems

London, Feb. 11.—A prelude to that a furious anti-Catholic outbreak would follow an Act of Parliament giving the King the right to become Catholic on the disestablishment of the Church of England was made on Monday by Fr. Philip Malden (himself a convert from Anglicanism) opening a debate on "The Church of England—How Established: What If Disestablished?" at the Catholic Citizens' Parliament, St. Anne's Settlement, Vauxhall, London.

Question of Continuity Speaking of continuity earlier in his speech, Fr. Malden said that nonsense had been talked on both sides. On the Catholic side it was only from the more ignorant, who maintain that the continuity of machinery was altogether untrue. The opposite mistake, that which the Anglicans make, was made by all of them and consisted in thinking that continuity of machinery involved continuity of religion.

Felicitations Cabled Pope on Rome Accord By Bishop Schrembs

Priest's Will Makes Interesting Bequests

Boston, Feb. 12 It has just been announced that Rev. John F. Leonard of Orange, Massachusetts, intends to put into effect this year, while he is still alive, provisions of his will. Under the terms of Father Leonard's will, certain sums would be set aside for investment, income from which would provide prizes for an annual competitive or oratorical contests. A first prize of \$300 and a second prize, the amount of which could be determined by the remainder of annual income from \$10,000 would be awarded two successful representatives of various Catholic colleges in New England. First prizes of \$200 each and second prizes, determined by the remainder of annual incomes from two sums of \$5,000 each, would go to successful contestants from the Catholic High and grade schools of New England.

PAGAN ALTARS FOUND BENEATH CHURCH CRYPT

Excavation occasioned by necessary repairs to the crypt of the Bonn Cathedral have brought to light unusual and unsuspected treasures: twenty-three pagan altars, of limestone and sandstone, beautifully decorated with statues and inscriptions, and unmistakably of Roman origin. Critics declare them to be the finest relics of Roman occupation that have been found in the Rhineland.

Klan, Hard Pressed For Funds, Curtails All Its Activities

Washington, D. C., Feb. 15.—The Ku-Klux Klan is in financial difficulties, chiefly due to desertions of old members and inability to attract recruits to its "unhooded" program, it is learned. Hiram W. Evans, of Washington, Imperial Wizard, has ordered a drastic curtailment of field and clerical forces in both State and national organizations. An official once high in the organization declared today that it is becoming increasingly hard to get members to attend "konklaves."

Philippine Educator Makes Talk Which Provokes Catholics

Manila, Feb. 11.—A statement attributed to President Palma of the University of the Philippines, in addressing a conference held at Baguio under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A., has drawn the fire of La Defensa, Catholic journal of this city. The speaker is quoted as saying: "The youth of yesterday was educated in such a manner that it could not but accept established dogmatic principles. They were not taught to discuss with their fathers and teachers. From the very beginning, they learned of the tragedy of life. The education of yesterday was inspired in Divinity; that of today, in Humanity."

Mrs. Wm. Ryan, 83, Observes Birthday

St. Paul, Minn., Feb. 13.—Mrs. William Ryan, mother of the Rev. Lawrence F. Ryan, rector of the Cathedral and of the Rev. Dr. John A. Ryan, director of the Social Action Department of the National Catholic Welfare Conference and professor of moral theology at the Catholic University of America, celebrated her eighty-third birthday on Candlemas Day. A dinner in her honor was given at St. Joseph's Hospital, where Mrs. Ryan makes her home.

Coadjutor-Bishop Of Namur Is Named

Louvain, Belgium, Feb. 11.—The Very Rev. John B. Cawot, Vicar General to the Rt. Rev. Thomas L. Heylen, Bishop of Namur and permanent president of the Eucharistic Congress, has been named Coadjutor Bishop of the Diocese of Namur. Bishop Heylen asked for the appointment, he announced in a pastoral letter to his flock, "so that the interests of the diocese would not suffer and that he might apply himself with more liberty to this work of the Eucharistic Congresses that Our Lord and contributes powerful aid to the extension of Christ's Kingdom in all countries."

Japanese Apostolate In Brazil Is Growing

Rio De Janeiro, Feb. 15.—Within the last ten years a great missionary work has grown in Brazil among the Japanese, who, in ever-increasing numbers are entering this country. Many priests, both secular and regular, are devoting themselves to the task of winning these souls for Christ. His Japanese Apostolate had its beginning in 1919, when the Rev. Lorentz Hubbauer, C.S.S.R., was asked to instruct several Japanese families in the faith. Not knowing a word of their language, Father Hubbauer wrote to the Marianists in Japan and received from them some Catholic literature printed in Japanese. For a long time this was the only Japanese literature at the disposal of the prospective converts.

Vandal Smears Paint On Church Entrance

(By N. C. W. C. News Service) London, Feb. 15.—Police of Derby are hunting the authors of a curious act of vandalism perpetrated at St. Joseph's Catholic Church there. On Sunday morning the oaken front door of the church was found to be covered with white paint, down which ran streaks of scarlet and black. The Rev. J. F. Hargreaves, the pastor, said that when the door was repainted a year ago it was defaced in a similar mysterious manner. The nuisance was repeated only a month ago.

Texas Regent Directs C. D. A. Arrangements

New York, Feb. 15.—Mrs. Louis C. Poth of Yoakum, Tex., State Regent of the Catholic Daughters of America, has been appointed general chairman of the arrangements committee for the 1929 Supreme Biennial International Convention of the Catholic Daughters' order, to be held in Galveston, July 3 to 9.

Lutherans Assail Church Lobby To Beat Cruiser Bill

Chicago, Feb. 15.—The church lobby organized in opposition to the cruiser bill, while that measure was being considered Congress, was denounced in a resolution adopted by the Chicago Lutheran Pastoral Conference, which just closed its session here. The conference represented more than 150,000 Lutherans in the Chicago area. The resolution deplored "the inroads made upon the old American principle of the separation of church and state." While the church's duty is to speak on moral issues, the resolution stated, it has no right to "force either the individual or the state to its way of thinking."

John McCormack On Concert Tour

(By N. C. W. C. News Service) London, Feb. 8.—John McCormack has begun a concert tour in Great Britain and Ireland. Opening in Glasgow and then coming to London, he has engagements in Belfast and Dublin before returning to England to continue a schedule which will keep him engaged till March 21.
