

St. Patrick's Day Parade To Be Held In New York

More Than One-Hundred Organizations Will March—Cardinal Hayes, Mayor Walker and Other Officials to Review Marchers

New York, March 14.—New York City will have its annual St. Patrick's day parade on Saturday of this week, the day after tomorrow. "The Wearing of the Green" will stir the blood of the Statue of Liberty, the marchers and many thousands of onlookers, and the metropolis of America will pay generous tribute to Ireland's patron saint.

The parade will start at Fifth Avenue and Forty-Sixth Street at 2:30 in the afternoon and will move northward to 110th Street. More than one-hundred organizations have been assigned places in the line of march. Among these are the color guard of the Second Regiment, Knights of Columbus, cadets of the Blessed Sacrament, Junior Naval Militia and Junior Naval Reserve, Ladies of the Cumann Na Mban, Auxiliary Ladies of the A. O. H., Auxiliary Ladies of the Friends of Irish, Freedom and county organizations, as follows: Clare, Cork, Kerry, Tipperary, Monaghan, Offoy, Wicklow. The applications of several other organizations are now before the committee on formation.

Cardinal Sues Action Francaise For Libeling Him

Paris, March 14.—Following repeated attacks upon him by the journal, L'Action Francaise, condemned by the Pope, the Cardinal Archbishop of Paris has applied to the courts.

The process will begin April 17 before the Tribunal of the Seine. The interests of the Cardinal will be defended by Philippe de Las-Cases, son of the senator from Lyons. He is the same attorney who, in a former suit, won a highly satisfactory verdict for Cardinal Germain, victim of infamations and calumnies.

L'Action Francaise, on the other hand, is suing Cardinal Dubois for 200,000 francs damages for having related in Semaine Religieuse, with commentaries, the ordinances of the Pope's Penitentiary condemning the magazine and the journal.

Le Croix and La Vie Catholique are also being sued by L'Action Francaise for having reproduced the news of the Sacred Penitentiary and the official note of the Archbishop of Paris. Each has been ordered to pay 100,000 francs damages.

Cardinal Hayes Mass Celebrant

New York, March 11.—His Eminence, Patrick Cardinal Hayes, Archbishop of New York, officiated at a solemn Pontifical Mass celebrated in St. Patrick's Cathedral yesterday morning in thanksgiving for the signing of the treaty and concordat between the Holy See and the Government of Italy. Following the Mass a Te Deum was sung by the choir and choir. The Rt. Rev. John J. Dunn, Auxiliary Bishop of New York, and a large representation of the Archdiocesan clergy attended.

At Cardinal Hayes' direction, similar services were held in every one of the more than 420 churches through the Archdiocese of New York yesterday morning—Laetare Sunday.

Mgr. Michael J. Lavelle, Rector of the Cathedral received a letter from Noble Giacomo de Martino, Italian Ambassador to Washington, who was unable because of the press of his duties, to attend.

"I will be very much obliged to you, the Ambassador wrote, 'for presenting to His Eminence, Cardinal Hayes, the expression of my regret at the inability on my part to interpret to him my profound appreciation of the initiative he has taken thus to solemnize this happy event, which is one of the greatest achievements of contemporary history, and for which he rejoices, not only all Italians, but all Catholics throughout the world.'

The Rev. Dr. John A. McClorey, S. J., of the University of Detroit, who is preaching a course of sermons at the Cathedral at High Mass each Sunday during Lent, preached yesterday on "The Church and the Republic."

In the course of Father McClorey's sermon, the name of Alfred E. Smith, former Governor of New York and a candidate for the Presidency of the United States in the recent election, was mentioned for the first time from the pulpit of St. Patrick's Cathedral. Father McClorey was developing a statement he had made concerning civil authority and the Church. "It," he said, "a difference should arise between Church and State very likely the representative can settle it by using a little diplomacy in something of the way taught by ex-Governor Smith in his dealing with Mr. Marshall."

Pope Seen As Peace Arbitrator
The use of church influence in politics in America," Father McClorey added, "must be looked for outside the Catholic Church. The ecclesiastical-political history of the last five months has proved that certain groups continually harp on the intolerance of the Catholic Church in politics in order to distract the people's minds from their own intolerance in politics."

Father McClorey said that, although he did not speak with authoritative sanction, it was his opinion that the Pope hoped to be the arbiter of the world in the interest of peace. "So far as the preacher said, what he hopes for is a general peace over any authoritative power over international affairs, but that is not the intention of the Pope, at the moment of the nations, he has never the intention of applying the teaching of Christianity to the words of the world."
