NEW CHURCH IS DEDICATED

Italian Catholics in Lockport Conspire \$40,000.00 Edifice—Many Present at Dedication.

Lockport, March 14.—The new St. Anthony's Church, erected by Italian Catholics of this city at a cost of approximately \$40,000.00, was dedicated with solemn services last Sunday. The new edifice, which is located on Bristol avenue between West and Park avenues, has just been completed. During the past year and a half services have been held in the Queen's Daughters home.

The dedication services were conducted by Bishop Ernesto Coyro, a Salernitan missionary, at the request of the Right Reverend Bishop Turner, of Buffalo. He was assisted by several priests of Western New York.

Masses of St. Anthony's parish have been said since the church's inception, by the Rev. Valerio Bernardo, assistant rector of St. Joseph's church. The new parish numbers about 125 families.

Ground for the new church was broken September 20, 1928. The architecture of the building is Romanesque, the edifice being of red masonry brick with stone trimmings, 92 by 27 feet. The church proper will seat 350 persons. The basement contains besides a steam heating plant, a large auditorium and a well planned kitchen.

At one end of the auditorium is a commodious stage with dressing rooms at either side. The large hall may be used either for entertainment purposes or as a dining room.

The new parish, looking forward to a splendid spiritual and social future, is intensely ambitious; and, already hopes are high that it will be essentially possible within the not far distant future, to build a rectory on the property adjoining the new church.

New Home Opened By Redemptorists

Rochester, N. Y., March 13.—The Redemptorists in Holland have recently added a third Retreat House to the two existing ones at Amargort, near Utrecht, and at Soopy, near Breda. The new house, which accommodates 70 retreatants, is situated at Zanderon near the German border. For the management of household affairs 14 "Little Sisters of St. Joseph" live in a convent close at hand. The monastery adjoining the Retreat House can accommodate 11 Fathers and 1 Brothers. During the first five months 25 Retreats were given, attended by 784 men and 1,427 women.

Cabinet Member Visits Cathedral

Paris, March 11.—On a tour of inspection of French West Africa, Minister of Colonies Maginot recently visited the Catholic Cathedral now in course of construction at Dakar and congratulated Bishop Grimault. Minister Maginot charged the Governor General of the Colony to represent the government officially at the dedication of the Cathedral, Easter Sunday.

Chapel Car Tours Churchless Towns

Fresno, Cal., March 13.—The new St. Theresa Chapel Car of the Monterey-Fresno diocese has begun its tour of the churchless towns of the San Joaquin valley with the blessing of Bishop James B. MacGinley. The Rev. L. J. Kulleck, who is to conduct the services, will live in the car, which is equipped with an altar, sleeping quarters, kitchen, shower bath and radio. The motor chapel represents an outlay of \$15,000.

Czechoslovak Priest Slain By Assassin

Bratislava, Czechoslovakia, March 11.—The Rev. Joseph Pavlik, pastor of St. Martin's Church, here, was slain recently by an assassin who mistook him for a Communist. The assassin, a young man, also was slain in the pursuit.

The assassin, Gen. Stredon, was captured by a posse and shot to death when his ammunition became exhausted.

Laetare Medal Goes To Alfred E. Smith

Notre Dame University President Announces Choice Awarded Once Each Year To Notable American Catholic

Notre Dame, Ind., March 14.—(Special) — Honorable Alfred E. Smith, for six years governor of New York State, and an outstanding figure in American governmental circles, will be the recipient of the Laetare Medal for 1929, administrative authorities of the University of Notre Dame announced officially last Sunday morning.

The Laetare Medal, which is considered the most notable distinction that can be conferred upon a Catholic of the United States, is presented annually by the University of Notre Dame on Laetare Sunday, the fourth Sunday of Lent. It is comparable to the Golden Rose, which is conferred by the Pope at Rome each year on some Catholic who has distinguished himself in world affairs.

A time and a place for the official presentation of the medal will be set after University authorities have conferred with Gov. Smith.

In announcing that the Laetare Medal is to be conferred on Gov. Smith, the Rev. Charles L. O'Donnell, C. S. C., Ph. D., president of the University of Notre Dame, made this statement:

"The University of Notre Dame announces the award of the Laetare Medal for the year 1929 to the Honorable Alfred E. Smith, former governor of the State of New York. The award of this medal is made annually to some lay Catholic of the United States, who has achieved such distinction in his field of special endeavor as to reflect glory upon the Catholic Faith. Notable services in religion, philosophy, science, art, literature, or to any other worthy activities of life or division of knowledge, as well as distinguished service to our country in public life, are among the reasons determining the selection and bestowal of this honor. The long and honorable public career of ex-governor Alfred E. Smith, as well as the fine example of his private life, are known and admired

by the entire American people. These public and private virtues are inseparable from the man's sterling Catholicity. Therefore, in the choice of this latest recipient of the Laetare Medal, the University feels that the end for which this honor was established is fittingly served."

The Laetare Medal for 1928 was awarded to the Honorable Jack J. Spalding, K. S. O., of Atlanta, Ga., one of the most prominent attorneys and philanthropists in the south. In 1927 it was awarded to Miss Margaret Anglin, noted classical actress, and in 1926 it was conferred upon Edward N. Hurley, former chairman of the United States Shipping Board.

Annual presentation of the medal originated in 1883 when the Rev. Thomas Walsh, C. S. C., was president of Notre Dame. John Gilmary Shea, the historian, received the award that year. Noted persons who have been honored with the Laetare Medal since that time include:

General William S. Rosencrans, 1886; William Bourke Cockran, the orator, 1901; Dr. John B. Murphy, 1902; Charles J. Bonaparte, attorney general of the United States, 1903; Maurice Francis Egan, the diplomat, 1910; Agnes Repplier, the essayist and critic, 1911; Chief Justice Edward Douglas White, 1914; Dr. James J. Walsh, the writer, 1918; Admiral William Benson, 1917; and Albert A. Zahn, the scientist, in 1925.

Father O'Donnell is ex-officio chairman of the Laetare Medal committee. Other members of it include the Rev. Michael A. Mulcaire, C.S.C., vice-president of the university, Rev. Mathew J. Walsh, C. S. C., and Rev. Patrick J. Carroll, C. S. C., former president and vice-president of Notre Dame; Rev. Thomas A. Steiner, C. S. C.; Rev. Hugh O'Donnell, C. S. C.; Professor Edward J. Maurus, Jose A. Caparo, and Henry B. Fronig of South Bend, Ind., and Prof. Burton Conroy of Chicago. All are members of the faculty.

Independence Of Discussed By Noted Pope Speaker

Boston, March 14.—The Independence of the Holy See was the subject of discussion at a meeting here of the Boston Branch of the Foreign Policy Association. Speakers of international fame discussed the accord recently reached between the Vatican and the Quirinal.

Among the speakers were Count Carlo Sforza, Robert Muncourt, Chas. Clifton Marshall and Dr. James J. Walsh, president of the American Catholic Historical Society and author of "The World's Debt to the Catholic Church."

Dr. Walsh is also the author of a series of articles on "What Freedom for the Pope Has Meant in History," which is being issued by the N.C.W. C. News Service.

Catholic Institute Planned In Portugal

Lisbon, March 11.—At a recent meeting with the Portuguese Hierarchy it was decided to begin negotiations with the Holy See with regard to establishing a Catholic Institute in Portugal.
