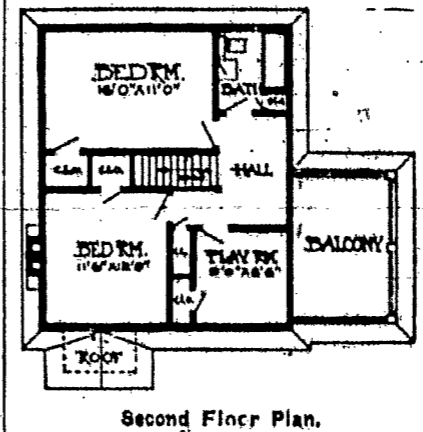
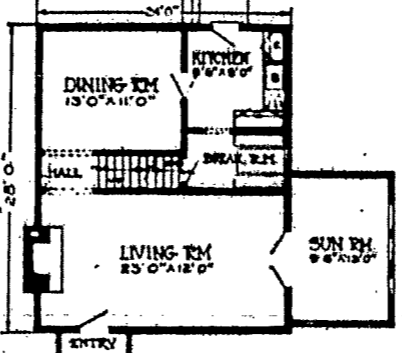

**Giant Statue  
Of Columbus  
Is Unveiled**  
American Donors Present Magnificent Memorial to the Spanish People  
STANDS 114 FEET HIGH  
ABOVE PALOS HARBOR  
Overlooking the Spot from Which  
Columbus Sailed for America  
437 Years Ago

Palos, Spain, April 25.—Four hundred and thirty-seven years ago Christopher Columbus set sail in the name of God, half an hour before sunrise, on the morning of August 3, 1492, on that memorable voyage which resulted in the discovery of the American continent.

Last Sunday a mammoth statue of Columbus, towering 114 feet above the very harbor from which the great Admiral set sail for the new world, was unveiled in this city—a magnificent memorial from the American people to the Spanish people. Many thousands of people attended the unveiling ceremony, and a great celebration marked the event.

U. S. Ambassador Hammond pulled the cord that released the draperies from the statue, and the giant figure of Christopher Columbus, gazing far out to sea—over the very route he took more than four centuries ago, was revealed to the gaze of admiring thousands.

The statue, seventy feet high, and resting upon a pedestal forty-four feet high, towers above the harbor of Palos. It was donated to the Spanish people by the Columbus Memorial Fund, Inc., of America, and the sculptor was Mrs. Gertrude Vanderbilt-Whitney. The directors of the fund include R. A. C. Smith, Alexander P. Moors, James A. Flaherty, Frederick H. Allen, Miss Anne Morgan, Adolph S. Ochs, William H. Page, Rear Admiral H. O. Stickney and Morgan J. O'Brien.

An interior chamber in the pedestal contains smaller statues of King Ferdinand and Queen Isabella. In unveiling the statue, Ambassador Hammond delivered the following message from President Hoover: "Upon the occasion of the unveiling of the Columbus monument at Palos, I have great pleasure in ex-

Sunday, April 28.—St. Paul of the Cross, enlisted in a Crusade against the Turks, but warned by heaven, abandoned this work and founded the Passionist Monastery of Monte Argentario. His life was modeled on the Passion of Christ and he died while the passion was being read to him.  
Monday, April 29.—St. Hugh Abbot, was a prince related to the sovereign house of the Dukes of Burgundy. When sixteen years old he made his profession in the religious life and when only twenty-five he succeeded to the government of the great Abbey of Cluny. He died in 1109 and was canonized twelve years later by Pope Calixtus II.  
Tuesday, April 30.—St. Catherine of Siena travelled through Italy bringing back rebellious cities to obedience to the Holy See. She brought Gregory XI back from Avignon to Rome and was counsellor of Urban VI. She died in Rome at the age of thirty-three in 1380.  
Wednesday, May 1.—Sts. Philip and James, Apostles. Philip was one of the first chosen by Christ and St. James (the Less) was the author of an inspired epistle. According to St. Paul, St. James was favored with a special apparition of Christ, after the Resurrection.  
Thursday, May 2.—St. Athanasius, Bishop, was born in Egypt and defended the faith against the heresy of Arius. For forty-six years he fought, well nigh alone, for true Faith. He is honored as one of the greatest of the Doctors of the Church. He died in 373.  
Friday, May 3.—The Discovery of the Holy Cross. Commemorates the finding of the relic by St. Helen, the mother of the Emperor Constantine.
