Negro Institute To Be In Charge Of Benedictines

Rock Castle, Va., April 24.—In order to insure the permanence and future stability of the institution, the board of trustees of the St. Emma Industrial and Agricultural Institute, conducted here for colored boys, has decided to entrust the direction of the establishment to the Order of St. Benedict beginning July 1, next. St. Emma's was founded in 1895 and for 23 years was operated under the direction of the Christian Brothers. Since 1925, the school has been directed by Anthony J. Barrett, a distinguished Catholic layman of Washington, D. C. The Institute owns 1,700 acres of land, on which are located 57 buildings. One hundred and fifty students are at present enrolled at the Institute, coming from more than 25 States, including Florida, Texas and California.

Convents Visited By Bogus Priests

Chicago, April 25.—In the past few weeks some dozen or more convents in various cities of the East and South have been victimized by an impostor posing as a priest. The man sometimes appears as a Jesuit, sometimes a Benedictine but more often represents himself to be the Rev. Albert H. Dolan, O. C. M., National Director of the Society of the Little Flower, Chicago, Ill. In some convents he has presented to the Sisters copies of Father Dolan's books which he autographs in the presence of the Sisters. The impostor is described as fairly tall, thin, with light hair tending to grey; he travels in his own auto and has visited cities as widely separated as Toledo, Ohio, Mobile, Ala., Bristol, Va., and Detroit, Mich.

Mexican Govt. Fully Aware Of Revolution

Mexico City, April 25.—Evidence that the Porfirio Gil Government knew that an armed rebellion was brewing in Mexico at the time train of the Provisional President was bombed, on February 10th, is revealed in letters which passed between General Juan Andres Almazan, federal commander in the recent Jimenez battle, and General Marcelo Caraveo, rebel leader, just published by the newspaper El Universal. The exchange of letters was carried on over the period from January 27th to February 28th, at a time when the Department of Gobernacion was accusing "clerical fanatics" of bombing the train and when measures of reprisal were being adopted by the Government against the Catholic clergy. In the letters General Almazan sought to dissuade Caraveo from joining any rebellion that might be started by the generals of Sonora. Almazan stated frankly that he had "discussed the matter" of an armed conflict "with General Plutarco Elias Calles a few days ago." In spite of this governmental knowledge that revolution was imminent Provisional President Porfirio Gil, denouncing the attack on his life, made no reference to the situation of unrest but issued a statement in which he assailed the Catholics of Mexico City, whom he referred to as "clerical fanatics."

Franciscans Hold Annual Education Session June 28-30

Washington, D. C., April 25.—The eleventh annual meeting of the Franciscan Educational Conference will be held at St. Bonaventure's Seminary, Allegany, N. Y., June 28 to 30. It was announced at the office of the secretary, Capuchin College, here. The convention will be opened by the President, the Very Rev. Thomas Plassman, O.F.M., president of St. Bonaventure's Seminary. The first papers will be read by the Rev. Robert Hammer, O.F.M., St. Francis Monastery, New York, and the Rev. Victor Mills, O.F.M., St. Bonaventure's, on "St. Francis' Influence on Education." The Rev. Charles Neukirch, O.M.C., St. Anthony-on-Hudson, N. Y., will present a paper on "Franciscans as Educators" and the Rev. Dunstan Dobbins, O. M. Cap., Franciscan House, Providence, R. I., will speak on "Franciscan Educational Ideas."

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
