

Consecration Ceremony

 A procession from the Knights of Columbus, headed by F. J. Smith, John J. McInerney and John A. Hayes, moved as personal escorts to Cardinal Hayes.

As the procession reached the Cathedral, the Knights of St. John, in full uniform, black plumbs waving, formed two lines down the center aisle of the Cathedral, and with drawn swords formed a glistening arch.

Cardinal Hayes was accompanied by Col. Edward P. O'Hern, brother of the bishop; George MacDonald, Knight of St. Gregory, and Monsignor Stephen J. Donaghy, army chaplain and master of ceremonies for the occasion. As the priests, monks, bishops and finally Cardinal Hayes entered the Cathedral Prof. Eugene Bonn, for 41 years architect at this church, played "Ecce Sacerdos," his original composition, and his tribute to his lifelong friend and pastor, Bishop O'Hern. A choir of 300 boys, most of them students at St. Bernard's Seminary thrilled the audience by leading their melodious voices with the inspiring musical strains of the organ.

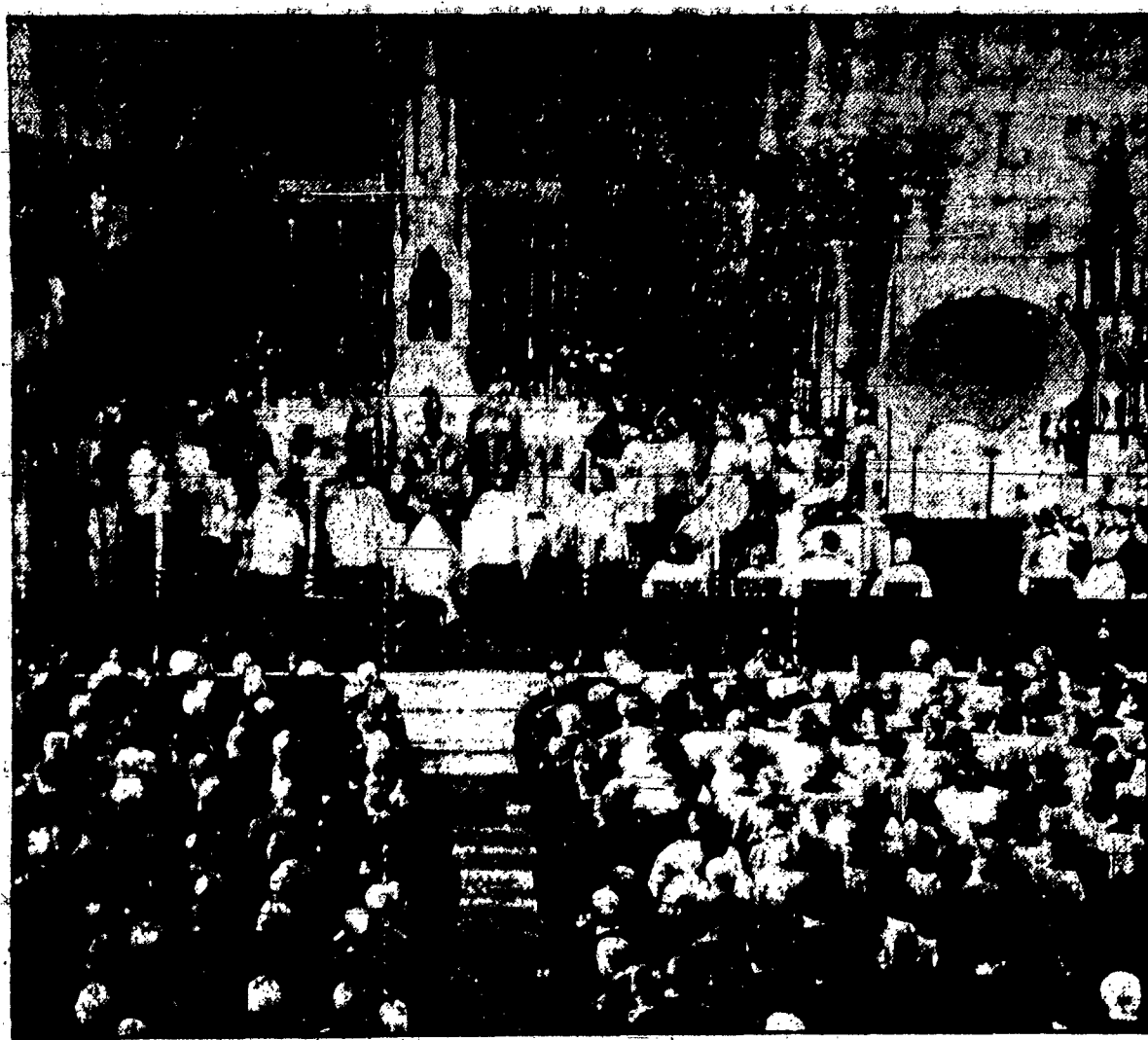
Cardinal Hayes Officiated
 Cardinal Hayes officiated as consecrator, assisted by Archbishop Hanna and Bishop O'Reilly. The consecration rite was presided over by Archbishop Thomas F. Hickey, D.D.

As the consecrator, Cardinal Hayes, his concourse of assistants, and Bishop-elect O'Hern stood before the high altar, which was decorated in the papal colors, the scene was inspiring and sublime. The ritual published in the Catholic Courier and Journal a week ago was used. After subscribing to the Bishop's Oath, the Bishop-elect accepted the Gospels from the consecrator, and with outstretched arms, said:

"So may God help me, and these Holy Gospels of God."

One of the questions answered by Bishop O'Hern in his examination was translated in English as follows: "I will, for the Lord's sake, be faithful and merciful to the poor and to petitioners and to all of these in need."

At one point the consecrator said: "I believe a bishop to judge, to govern, to consecrate, ordain, baptize and anoint."

The choir sang the "Litany of the Saints."

The imposition of hands, the rite by which episcopal power was conferred, was sublime. Cardinal Hayes, placing both hands on the bishop-elect said:

"Receive thou the Holy Ghost."

That solemn rite terminated the preliminaries of the consecration, and the candidate became Bishop O'Hern, with full episcopal honors and power.

The crozier, ring and pectoral cross were blessed, and later Bishop O'Hern was addressed by the consecrator thus:

"Receive the Gospel, and go preach to the people committed to thee, for God is powerful to increase His grace in thee. He liveth and reigneth world without endy."

While the choir was singing "Te Deum Laudamus" Archbishop Hanna and Bishop O'Reilly escorted Bishop O'Hern through the aisle of the Cathedral as he imparted his first pontifical blessing to the kneeling

congregation. When the new bishop returned to the altar he was greeted by Cardinal Hayes, without his mitre. The ceremony closed when Cardinal Hayes bestowed on Bishop O'Hern the Kiss of Peace, and the re-consecrators did like wise.

The musical feature of the Cathedral program was inspiring, thanks to the efforts of Prof. Eugene Bonn and of Rev. John M. Petter, S. T. B., professor of music at St. Bernard's Seminary. The sanctuary choir sang the Gregorian parts of the service under personal direction of Father Petter. Prof. Bonn directed a choir of seventy voices, men's and boys. The mass selected for the consecration service was one recently composed by Rev. George E. Predmore, rector of St. John the Evangelist Church, Spencerport. The "Ecce Sacerdos," written expressly by Prof. Bonn, and dedicated to Bishop O'Hern, was very beautiful.

Short Stories: The Rev. C. P. Donovan, Mrs. Mary Synon and Lewis W. Britton.

With one or two exceptions these judges are members of the Chicago Chapter of the Catholic Press Association—League of Writers.

The preliminary judges in the contest for awards to authors of books are: The Rev. Wilfrid Parsons, S. J., of America, Sister M. Ignatia of The Magnificent, Battle Gaud and Joseph J. Quinn of The Southwest Courier, Patrick F. Scannlan of The Tablet, the editorial staff of The Commonwealth and the book reviewing staff of The Catholic World.

The contests are conducted under the auspices of the Catholic Literary Awards Foundation, which provides the funds for the prizes awarded. The foundation, still in course of formation, has for its purpose the promotion of Catholic literary effort. It is planned to secure a membership of 500 and all moneys received as its membership fees will be put into a permanent fund.

Pilgrims Plan Trip To Rome

Card. Dougherty Sponsors Journey To Celebrate Jubilee In May

 Philadelphia, March 21.—Under the auspices of Cardinal Dougherty, there will go forth from Philadelphia, in May, a pilgrimage to Rome celebrating the golden jubilee in the priesthood of His Holiness, Pope Pius XI.

In announcing the pilgrimage, Cardinal Dougherty said:

"Within the next few months Catholics from many lands will hasten to Rome to participate in the joy of their common Father by offering him their jubilee felicitations, and laying at his feet their pledges of loyalty and devotion. They will go also, like the Pilgrims of old, to refresh their souls by kneeling at the tombs of the martyrs and visiting the great Roman basilicas in order to gain the indulgences in this Holy Year.

"The faithful of this Archdiocese have ever been noted for their devotion to the Vicar of Christ. It is eminently fitting, therefore, that they should not permit this joyful occasion to pass without some manifestation of the sentiments which fill their hearts. For this reason, it has been decided to arrange a special Philadelphia Pilgrimage to Rome during this Holy Year of Jubilee."

The complete journey may be made in forty-one days, beginning May 22 and ending July 2. Those who wish, it was announced, may make a tour covering forty-eight days, returning home on July 9.

The "Pennland" will sail from New York on Wednesday, May 22, and arrive at Cherbourg on May 31. From that point, the pilgrims will go by train to Lisieux, to the Carmelite Chapel in which the body of St. Theresa, "The Little Flower," now reposes. Afterwards they will continue to Paris, where two days will be given over to sightseeing excursion. Rome will be reached on June 7. The return journey to Cherbourg will be made via Lourdes.
