The Church's Liturgy.

March 24: Palm Sunday

On Palm Sunday the Church, the Mystical Body of Christ, in her liturgy expresses the two aspects under which she considers the cross by two ceremonies, the one joyful, the other sorrowful. The first ceremony of this day is the blessing of the palms and the procession, in which with holy gladness we revive the grand scene of the triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem. In it we participate in the holy joy of God the Father in the love and obedience of His Son beginning the work of our Redemption, which is to be completed in the anguish of His passion and in His death upon the cross. The second aspect of the cross is presented to us in the Mass in which the chants and lessons relate exclusively to the sorrowful recollection of the passion and the death of Our Savior.

The blessing of the palms follows a ritual similar to that of the Mass. The Introit, Collect, Epistle, Gradual, Gospel and even the Preface are recited by the celebrant as if Mass were being offered up; but after the Sanctus he turns to the blessing. Following the Antiphon "Hosanna to the Son of David" and the prayer, the lesson is read. It is from the book of Exodus and it tells us how the Israelites murmured in the desert of sin and sighed for the flesh-pots of Egypt, and gives the promise of the Manna to be sent as food from Heaven. In the Gradual we hear the words of Caiaphas that it was expedient that one man should die for the people; we hear His admonition to His disciples to watch and pray.

The Gospel describes the triumphant entry of Christ into Jerusalem when the people cut boughs from the trees and strewed them as He passed, crying: "Hosanna, to the Son of David, Blessed is He that cometh in the Name of the Lord." Then follows the special prayers of blessing in which the dove sent by Noah from the ark and Moses who left Egypt with the Israelites symbolize the Church.

Spiritual Bouquet  
Founder Dead

New York, March 21.—The Rev. Joseph Alfred Pauze, for 29 years one of the Fathers of the Order of the Blessed Sacrament who have charge of the Church of St. Jean Baptiste, died March 11 at the Hotel Dixie, Montreal, in Montreal. He was 53 years old.

Father Pauze, one of the organizers of the Spiritual Bouquet of 100,000,000 spiritual flowers sent in the name of America to the International Eucharistic Congress at Sydney, Australia, had been ill here for a week. He went to Montreal, despite his condition, when he received word that his mother, Mrs. Mary Kelly Pauze, was dying there. Mrs. Pauze died on Feb. 22. Father Pauze became too ill to attempt a return journey to New York.

The palms are then carried in procession and are held during the reading of the passion and from the Preface to the Communion of the Mass.

The joyousness of the hymns and antiphons sung during the procession contrast strikingly with the sadness of the Church expressed in the Mass. The Tract is from the twenty-second psalm, in which we see a foreshadowing of the anguish of our Savior on the cross: "Oh God, My God, Look upon Me; why hast Thou forsaken Me?" In the Epistle St. Paul puts in a very few words the inner meaning of the astounding mystery of the Incarnation: "He, Christ Jesus, humbled Himself, becoming obedient unto death, even to the death of the cross. For which cause also God hath exalted Him . . . that every tongue should confess that the Lord Jesus Christ is in the glory of the Father."

The passion of our Lord according to St. Matthew follows the Tract and at the Offertory one of the great Messianic prophecies of David is read: "My heart has expected reproach and misery—they gave me gall for my food and in my thirst they gave me vinegar to drink."

The Church desires all her children during her time of Passion so to unite themselves to Christ through her that they may be one with Him in His Suffering and thus share in the glory of His resurrection.

Simon N. Stein was one of the most conspicuous participants in the procession of prelates and laymen from the Cathedral School to St. Patrick's Cathedral on Tuesday morning, March 19, when Bishop O'Hern was consecrated. As a member of the Columbus Club, Mr. Stein, attired in silk top, cutaway coat, striped trousers, marched with his fellow club members as escorts to Bishop O'Hern.

Juarez Churches  
Remain Closed

El Paso, Texas, March 21.—Despite the order of General Escobar, commander of the Mexican revolutionary forces, abolishing Article 130 of the Mexican Constitution and declaring that Catholic churches may reopen and conduct services unmolested, no such action has been taken in the churches of Juarez.

Members of the Catholic clergy here said no action would be taken until an order to reopen the churches had been received from Rome. An order authorizing the reopening of Guadalupe Mission also was received by Mayor Agustin Gallo of Juarez.

Guadalupe, Mex., March 15.—The Governor of the State of Jalisco has started the organization of the militia to protect the civilian population against violence, the federal troops here having gone with General Calles. The lives and property of Americans, it was announced, will be protected. Every evidence here points to the fact that the Catholics of Jalisco are not in sympathy with the Manso rebellion.

The first official announcement of Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D.D., Bishop of Rochester, after his consecration on Tuesday, was the appointment of Rev. William M. Hart, Ph.D., S. T. L., as Vicar General of the Diocese and rector of Corpus Christi Church, succeeding Bishop O'Hern in both positions.

Father Hart was secretary for several years to Bishop Hickey, and continued in that position under Bishop O'Hern when he took charge of the Diocese, upon the resignation of Bishop Hickey. He is a courteous, capable and zealous priest, and proved himself a tower of strength and endurance in handling the multitudinous details of the consecration of Bishop O'Hern. His appointment as Vicar General and rector of Corpus Christi Church has been hailed with gratification throughout the Diocese. Father Hart's friends are generous in their congratulations and good wishes to him, and they wish him abundant success in his new duties.

THE DYING SOCIALIST

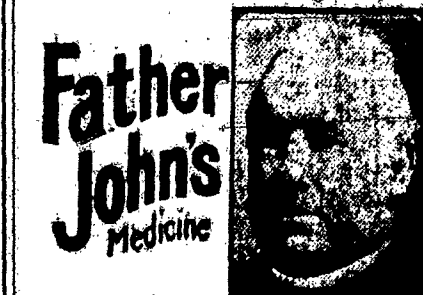
Goodbye old soap box,

Dubuque, Ia., March 20.—The Knights of Columbus of Iowa were joined in the campaign just inaugurated to increase the membership of the Iowa Catholic Historical Society and efforts are being made to recruit all Knights of Columbus in the State in the society.

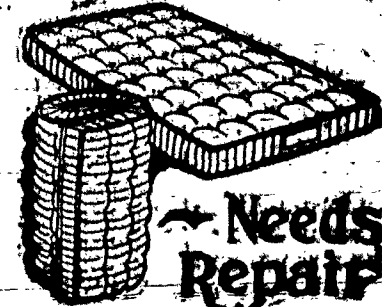
