Hilbert, formerly of Rochester, and now a missionary priest in China. Father Hilbert is a son of Mr. and Mrs. James E. Hilbert of 48 Normandy Avenue, and has many friends in Rochester. These friends will be glad to know that their donations to Father Hilbert have helped make his work fruitful and successful. They will be glad to read his letter. It was written from Sia Lok, Via Swatow, China, and is as follows:
Dear Father Mooney:
Received your letter of January 17th, along with the gift which was enclosed. Thank you very much and also, in my behalf, thank my un- known friend for his generous dona- tion. It comes in very handy to me.
Your letter was the first to bring me the news of the election of Monsignor O'Hara as Bishop of Rochester. It certainly rejoiced my heart to hear it. Monsignor is well worthy of such a high honor. May God bless him and give him many graces to aid him in this new charge.
Time runs on quickly. Christmas seems as if it was only yesterday. Yet almost two months of the new year are completed.
On next Monday our schools will open for the spring term. We shall have about a hundred and eighty, or maybe two hundred pupils. All of them will be Catholics, except three or four, and these are preparing for baptism.
Father Ford, the Superior of our field, is now in America. Last night I received a letter from my mother in which she narrated that he had visited our home in Rochester. Per- haps you may have met him at that time. If not you may have an opportunity of seeing him later on, as he promised mother he would visit her again before returning to China. From Father Ford you will be able to learn all about our mission field, where I am and what I am doing, or rather, trying to do.
During the year which ended on December 31st my mission made splendid progress both spiritually and materially. This was due in a large part to the generosity of the Catholics of Rochester, my home town, who by their prayers and sacrifices aided me in no small man- ner to carry on my work. And so I am deeply grateful and appreciative. May God bless them all.
Right now I am preparing to make the spring visitation of my outlying Catholics. Every day "Old Dobbin" gets a good helping of grain so that he will have strength sufficient to stand the strain of carrying the pas- tor around the circuit.
Write soon, Father Leo, always delighted to hear from you.

Nyeri, Kenya Colony, East Africa, April 11.—A missionary of the Nyeri Vicariate was deeply moved when he was handed the amount of six dollars to be sent as a Golden Jubilee gift to Pope Pius XI. The contributors all belonged to convert families, and some of them were still in training for baptism.
The individual gifts in most cases were very small. One of the largest came from a youth, who gave two shillings which he had saved bit by bit during two years. Another gave a shilling which he won as a prize in an athletic contest at school. A third was from a student who hopes to be a priest, and who wrote: "I cannot yet preach but I want to help the Holy Father spread the faith by prayer, mortification and alms." He gave two shillings.

English Nun, Director
Of Corporation, Dead

London, April 11.—A nun who was a director of a limited liability company—equivalent to an incorpo- rated company in the United States—has just died here. She was Mother Magdalen, of Providence Con- vent, Wood Green, a London suburb.
The Providence nuns have a girls' school which outgrew its premises and necessitated the building of a new school. They were occupying rented premises and as they had no property they could not raise a bank loan for development.
Forming, with the aid of a few Catholic business men, a limited company, two of the nuns became di- rectors and debenture shares were issued carrying 5 per cent interest. The venture proved a success.
Mother Magdalen came here from France 25 years ago with two other nuns. She was a victim of influenza at the age of 48.

San Francisco, April 11. A copy of a painting done by the Japanese artist, Hasegawa, de- picting the landing of St. Francis Xavier in Japan in the sixteenth century, has just been received by the Rev. William Stocke, S.V.D., superior of the Japanese Catholic Mission here.
The painting shows the Saint's ships in port, his mission among the Japanese, the persecution and torture of the converts by fire and their death in the sulphur wells. At the top is an enlarged figure of the Blessed Virgin with the Christ Child in her arms rising to- ward the heavens in a pillar of fire from the bodies of the mar- tyrs. Hovering over her are two angels.
A striking feature of the pic- ture is the dress of the Blessed Virgin and the Christ Child and the garb of the angels. The art- ist has done them as Japanese, the figures wearing Japanese ki- monos.
The original was sent as a gift from the Catholics of Japan to the Holy Father on the occasion of his sacerdotal jubilee. Father Stocke's copy was sent to him by Bishop Hayasaka.

Sunday, April 14.—St. Benet, a shepherd, was inspired by God to build a bridge over the Rhone at Avignon at a place where many peo- ple had been drowned. He obtained the approbation of the bishops, proved his mission by miracles, and began the work in 1177. He died in 1184. His body was placed in a chap- el built upon the bridge and when the coffin was opened five hundred years after his death, the body was found without the least sign of cor- ruption.
Monday, April 15.—St. Paternus, was born near Poltara about the year 482. He went to Wales where he founded a monastery and later lived as an anchorite in the forests of Seley. He converted many from the Druid religion and induced them to destroy one of the largest of their pagan temples. He died in France in solitude about 550.
Tuesday, April 16.—St. Optatus and seventeen other holy men re- ceived the crown of martyrdom on the same day at Saragossa under the governor Decian during the persecu- tion of Diocletian in 304. Two others Catus and Cremenius died later of their torments.
Wednesday, April 17.—St. Anicet- us, Pope, and Martyr, was remark- able for his extraordinary virtue and religious fervor. He reigned from 165 to 173.
Thursday, April 18.—St. Apollon- ius, a Roman Senator, was beheaded by decree of the Roman Senate after he had refused to renounce his faith when publicly accused of Christian- ity by one of his own slaves.
Friday, April 19.—St. Elphege, archbishop, was born in the year 954 of a noble Saxon family. He was captured by the Danes who expected to collect a large ransom for his re- lease. When he refused to permit a tax upon the people of the diocese for the payment of the ransom, he was killed on Easter Sunday, 1012.
Saturday, April 20.—St. Mar- cellinus, Bishop, was born in Africa of a noble family. Accompanied by Vincent and Dominus he went over into Gaul and preached the Gospel with great success. Many miracles are mentioned as having happened at his tomb. He died at Embrun about 374.
Rome, April 11.—According to the Journal Tribune, two kinds of passports will be adopted for regu- lating access to Vatican City.
The first type, which will not have as its object any particular re- striction, will permit access to the administrative offices of the Vatican which have frequent contact with the public. The second, which will au- thorize entrance of the Vatican palace, will be issued under certain conditions.
As to the archives, library and museums of the Vatican, these will remain as they have been in the past—open to the public without special formality.

Miss Coughlin was born in Celingline, Ireland, March 9, 1841. Her nephew, the Rev. William O'Cal- laghan, of Waynesboro, Pa., was celebrant of the Requiem Mass.

San Francisco, April 11.—After more than half a century of service as a teaching nun of the Presen- tation Order in San Francisco, Sister Mary Gabriel died at the age of 71, on Monday, and was buried from St. Francis' Church, Thursday.
Born in Indiana, she came to San Francisco at the age of 12 and en- tered the local convent. Surviving her are a brother, William Butler, of this city, a nephew, the Rev. William G. Butler of St. James Church, and a niece, Sister Mary Euphrasia of the Sisters of Mercy.
