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Breaks in Roof and Wide Dormers Give This Home Attractive Touch

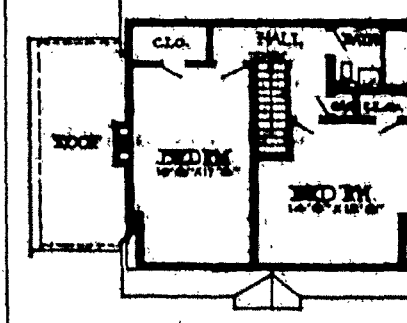


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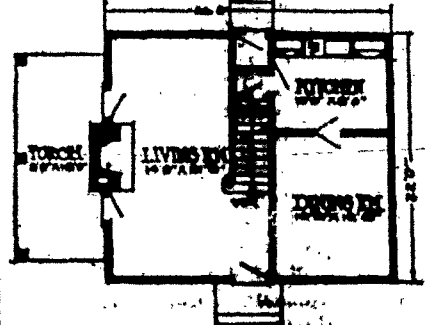

The modified type of the colonial home building design which has an irregular pitched roof and wide dormers is commonly termed the "Dutch Colonial." This a popular type of home because its exterior appearance is made attractive by the breaks in the roof and the wide dormers. However, in the interior arrangement it follows rather closely the colonial.

Such a home is shown in the accompanying illustration. This is a five-room house, 20 feet wide and 22 feet deep. The five rooms are large, 14 feet by 21 feet. The open stair out of the living room beside the entrance door leads to the second floor. An open fireplace is set in the outside wall with doors on either side leading to the open porch. This porch may be walled and glazed to make it into an "all-year-round" sun parlor if desired. The dining room is 10 feet 6 inches by 12 feet 6 inches, and the kitchen is of the same width and is 8 feet deep. The stairs lead to a hall at the rear of the second floor at one side of

which is the bathroom. Both bedrooms open off this hall, one on either side of the stairway. These rooms are large, one being 12 feet 6 inches by 14 feet, and the other 10 feet 6 inches by 17 feet 6 inches. The house is of frame construction and sits on a concrete foundation; has a basement of the same dimensions as the house proper. This is the type of home that the small family desires. Its rooms are large and airy. The arrangement of them is such that the work of caring for the home can be done with the least amount of effort. It is attractive from the exterior appearance, and when surrounded by shrubs and flowers as is shown in the illustration, it will make a very attractive home.

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Cardinal Assails World's Ideas Of Womanhood

Metropolitan Prelate Says Standard Does Not Measure Up to That Required by the Church SAYS CATHOLIC IDEAL IS NOT FASHIONABLE

We All Need a Mother's Care All Through Life, Says Cardinal Hayes to Union of Sodalties

New York, April 16.--The world has set up a new standard for the girls and women of to-day, and it does not measure up to the high standard of purity and chastity required by our Church, His Eminence Patrick Cardinal Hayes declared in a talk last Sunday to nearly 1,000 young women, members of the New York Archdiocesan Union of the Sodalties of the Blessed Virgin. The talk was given at the annual Communion Breakfast of the Sodalties.

The annual corporate communion of the members of the organization was observed at the 9 o'clock Mass in St. Patrick's Cathedral, and the breakfast was held afterwards in the Pennsylvania Hotel. Miss Mary Alice Deegan, president of the Union, presented Cardinal Hayes as the principal speaker at the close of the breakfast. "I feel I owe you an apology for the fact that I have not been to any of your annual breakfasts before, but I have been with you in spirit and you have given joy to the heart of your shepherd," said the Cardinal. "This morning at Holy Mass as I stood there at the altar I pleaded with our Lord Himself and with Mary, too, that you might be blessed. "Mary is the supreme mother, the mother of all ages. She is your mother, and she loves each of you just as if you were her own child. It is a wonderful thing that in this day you should choose Mary as your model. It is not fashionable today for women to do so. The world has set up a new standard for womanhood and for girlhood today, and it does not measure up to the high standard of purity and chastity required by our Mother, the Church. But amidst these dangerous times it is a blessing that your hearts have turned toward Mary. "We all need a mother's care, not only at our entrance into this world but all through life. You must carry away from here today the Catholic ideal and the Catholic ideal for womanhood. "This sodality has spread all over the world and it has flowered down through the centuries. May God bless your director, and may He bless you. And may Mary shed her mantle over you all." When Cardinal Hayes left the room the girls at the tables near the center of the ballroom made an aisle and knelt. He bestowed his blessing as he walked from the head table to the door.

In St. Patrick's Day Message That he Wrote During His Last Illness--Tribute to Soldiers

Dublin, April 18.--A St. Patrick's Day message written by Marshal Foch during his last illness has just been delivered to the Irish Independent with the approval of the great war hero's family. The Marshal had promised to write the message and had dictated and was revising it when his death occurred. The letter contains the following passages: "On the day sacred to the national Saint of Ireland may an old soldier who loves the Irish character and appreciates the military virtues of the race, as shown all through the ages, pay his tribute of respect to the achievements of the Irish troops fighting on French soil during the World War? "The associations between your people and the French nation are of long standing, and all through our history we have had Irish soldiers of distinction in our service, and more than once have we owed much to the traditional valor of the Irish fighting on our side, as at Fontenoy and other eighteenth century battles. Even today the military archives of France contain much evidence of the part played by Irish genius and Irish valor in our military history. Cincinnati, April 18.--The first unit of a great structure, the cost of which will exceed more than \$1,000,000, is nearing completion at St. Gregory Seminary, one of Cincinnati's oldest and largest Catholic institutions. The new building will house the living quarters for the sisters in charge of the domestic department, classrooms, dormitory, infirmary and athletic facilities for the high school. Proper Insulation Pays; Helps Cut Down Expense

Insulation properly applied is not expensive. It can be shown that it pays its own way, first, by making it possible to reduce the size of the heating plant, and second, by reducing the necessary consumption of coal. Insulation goes on quickly--is not difficult or expensive to apply. Furthermore, it can be obtained from almost any reliable building supply dealer. Like all other materials used in building, it must be applied properly to get the desired results. Another interesting thing about insulation is that it works almost as well in summer as it does in winter, for then it keeps the heat out and makes your house a more comfortable place to live in. Some of the modern comforts with which we surround ourselves, which have long been luxuries, are now coming to be thought of as necessities, and to the extent of living, make it more difficult for us to build our homes on limited incomes; but insulation pays its own way. It is a bad building investment to do without it.

Sheathing in Small House Stops Fire Risk

Necessity for installing fire-stopping between a brick veneer exterior and the sheathing of a wood frame house can be eliminated through the use of an incombustible mineral sheathing. Such a sheathing provides its own fire-stop on the inside of the structure. Nor can the blaze travel far up in the air space between the brick and the sheathing because of the facing of incombustible materials on both sides. In laying brick veneer over mineral sheathing the bricks are tied in with metal ties, which are nailed into the sheathing with no more difficulty than the same ties are nailed into wood. This is made possible by the pyramidal composition of the incombustible sheathing. Mineral sheathing comes in large panels, which are tongue-and-grooved and which, in consequence, make possible a wall that is sealed against the infiltration of wind and which cut down the escape of furnace heat.

Publishers of Catholic Literature Say Demand in 1928 Exceeded That of All Previous Years AN APOLOGETIC BUREAU WILL BE ORGANIZED

C. C. M. and provided for the formation of an editorial committee which will examine and catalogue existing literature which is explanatory of the Catholic Faith.

An interesting development of the meeting was the report by all of the publishers present that in 1928--the year of the last Presidential campaign--the demand for literature setting forth the teachings of the Catholic Church far exceeded the demand in any previous year of their experience. They also said that during the first three months of 1929, the demand has exceeded that of any similar period in any previous year, except 1928.

Priest and Nuns Seized in Raid In Mexico City

Mexico City, April 18.--The secret service agent of the Secretariat of Gobernacion raided a clandestine convent in the suburbs of Atzacapotlan in the Federal District arresting 27 nuns on a charge of leading a convent life, according to a report published by Excelsior.

The raiders claim that they surprised the women in the convent engaged in prohibited religious exercises. A priest was present, whose name they gave as Felipe J. Siqueros. At the Secretariat of Gobernacion it was stated that detectives had been stationed at the house for sometime. The women were warned and given their liberty but the priest is being held for further investigation.

Vatican Audience For 3,000 Visitors

Rome, April 16.--The Pope Sunday granted audience to 3,000 citizens from Frascati, who were introduced by Cardinal Lega.

The Pope, replying to the Cardinal's address of loyalty, said he was gratified by the homage, and he blessed the visitors and their town.
