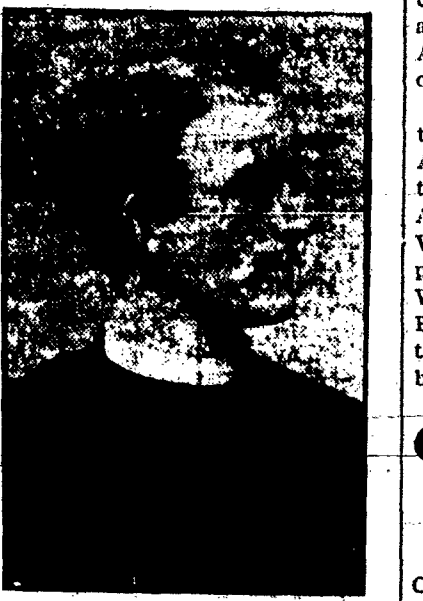

Beloved Priest Buried Tuesday From Macedon

Whole Town Attended Funeral of Rev. Michael A. F. Holmes—Bishop O'Hern Pontificated

Rev. Michael A. F. Holmes, for 45 years pastor of St. Patrick's Church at Macedon, was buried from that church on Tuesday morning.



REV. MICHAEL A. F. HOLMES united in paying tribute to one whom the people had loved, respected and looked up in all the years of his pastorate.

Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D. D., Bishop of Rochester, pontificated at a solemn High Mass of requiem. Rev. William M. Hart V. G. was the assistant priest; Rev. John P. Brophy and Rev. John F. Boppel, deacons of honor; Rev. J. E. Nelligan, deacon of the Mass; Rev. Edward Dwyer of Palmyra, sub-deacon; Rev. James Wood, Fairport, censor bearer; Rev. Arthur F. Florack and Rev. John Ball, book and candle bearers; Rev. John Ganey of Newark, and Rev. James O'Brien of Clifton Springs, acolytes; Rev. John M. Sellinger, master of ceremonies, and Rev. Leo V. Smith, assistant. The music was in charge of Rev. Ignatius Cameron. There were many other priests present at the service, and the church was filled to the doors with sorrowing friends. Interment was in Auburn.

Father Holmes died at the parish rectory in Macedon last Friday. He had been in failing health several months. His body lay in state in St. Patrick's Church Monday, and on Monday evening the office of the dead was chanted by priests of the Diocese.

Father Holmes was born in Auburn in August, 1857, and was one of the oldest priests in years of service in the Diocese. He was educated in Auburn, graduating from the High School there in 1874 as valedictorian of his class. He spent two years in St. Hyacinth's College, Quebec, then made his seminary course at St. Joseph's Seminary, Troy. He was ordained by the late Bishop McQuaid in St. Patrick's Cathedral, Rochester, July 25, 1880.

After his ordination, Father Holmes taught one year in St. Andrew's Seminary, then served as assistant pastor at St. Mary's Church and later at the Immaculate Conception Church in Rochester. He was a good priest, quiet, unassuming, sincere and very scholarly. He was greatly beloved by all people in his community, and his death will be sincerely mourned. He is survived by two brothers and two sisters, James H., Charles and Mary E. A. Holmes, all of Auburn, and Mrs. M. P. Donovan of Cleveland, Ohio. He was a member of the Newark Knights of Columbus, and of the Fourth Degree Assembly, K. of C.

Lawrence Weaver, Drowned, Was Buried Tuesday Morning—Other News From Auburn

Auburn, April 18.—Lawrence Weaver, 49 years old, of 38 Bradford Street, was buried Tuesday morning from St. Alphonsus' Church at 9:30 o'clock, with interment in St. Joseph's Cemetery.

Mr. Weaver, driving from Island Park Saturday night, about 11 o'clock, drove his car in the darkness from the road into the Owasco River, just north of Island Park bridge. He was drowned in ten feet of water. His body was recovered about 10 o'clock Sunday morning by Archie Kasper, one of a large group of searchers.

Mr. Weaver was born in Rochester, but lived nearly all his life in Auburn. Surviving are his widow; three daughters, Mrs. Howard Adams, the Misses Ethel and Marion Weaver; a son, Harold Weaver; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence C. Weaver; two brothers, William and Edward Weaver; two sisters, Augusta and Margaret Weaver, all of Auburn.

ELMIRA James O'Rourke Buried Tuesday

Well-Known Greener, Murdered by Burglar, Laid at Rest—Other News From Elmira

Elmira, April 18.—James P. O'Rourke, 30 years old, of 354 West Thurston Street, this city, was buried from St. Patrick's Church at 9 o'clock Tuesday morning. Interment was in St. Peter & Paul Cemetery. The funeral was attended by hundreds of friends and relatives, all of whom paid good tribute to a man whom they held in high regard.

Mr. O'Rourke was murdered Saturday morning by a burglar whom he caught robbing his store. His father, Patrick O'Rourke, a guard at the Elmira Reformatory, was badly beaten by the same burglar and is now in St. Joseph's Hospital. Part of his right ear was bitten off by the burglar when the aged man seized and attempted to hold the man who had just killed his son. Father and son saw the burglar in the store and chased him when he ran from the building. The son caught him first, and was mortally wounded when the father arrived and seized the man, only to be brutally beaten himself.

The murder was committed at the rear of the home of Rev. Francis J. Lane, 326 Crete Avenue, and it has caused great excitement in the community.

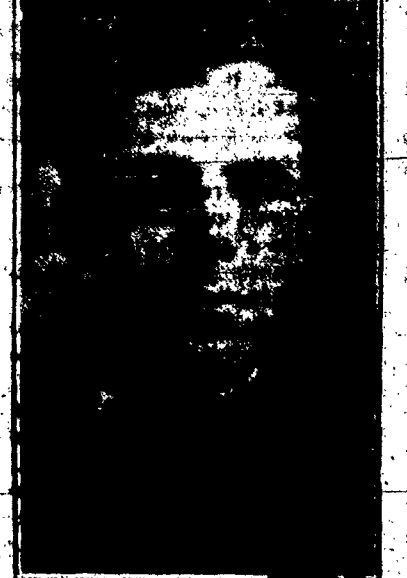

He was gassed and invalided to the United States for treatment in military hospitals. Recovering, he returned to France and rejoined his regiment. Father LeMay served two successive terms as chaplain of the New York State American Legion.
