Twenty-five boys have been practicing almost daily for the past two weeks, each holding the hope of making the Aquinas baseball team.

St. Bonaventure Grid Program

The football schedule for St. Bonaventure's College and Seminary for next fall has just been announced. It calls for eight games.

Gridiron relations with Temple and Loyola of Baltimore are being established for the first time.

Among the outfielders are the veterans Jim Walsh and Harry Kendall. Most of the boys out for the team this year are candidates for the one open outfield position.

The masked position is open this year and four boys remain on the squad, none having much of an edge on another. Farrell is a large-sized target; Kelly, aggressive but small; Connelly, a hitter, and MacDonald, a fair all-around player, but also small.
