In 1928, with 51,350 inmates as against 51,361 in 1928. The 150 Homes for Aged show an increase of three over 1928, and an increase of nine hospitals in the charge of religious shows a development in hospitalization.

The number of pages of text matter has been decreased only by twelve, despite the fact that two sections totaling 41 pages have been transferred from the Directory to the Official Catholic Year Book, its companion volume. In transferring these two sections, "The Statistics of Religious Orders" and "Missionary Activities" the publishers have cross-referenced the Directory with the Year Book in such a way that consulting either volume is easy.

Important New Feature Another new feature in the 1929 edition is the addition of a list of the dioceses according to States. After the name of each state, the names of the dioceses in it are recorded with the pagination for these ecclesiastical divisions. This will facilitate the gathering of Catholic statistics by States and will prove a great help to those for whom the geographical division is more pertinent than the ecclesiastical boundaries. Several dioceses include within their bounds parts of more than one State. These also are listed with the names of the states into which their territory extends.

Chicago, April 25.—The gift of a library building to Loyola University, here, by E. A. Cudahy has just been announced by the Rev. Robert M. Kelley, S. J., president. The building, to be erected on the lake shore campus of the university, will cost \$300,000 and will be a memorial to Mr. Cudahy's wife.

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BROTHER BARNABAS, FRIEND OF BOYS, GONE FROM LIFE

Organizer and Head of K. of C. Boy Work Died in New Mexico—Was Nationally Known Boy Welfare Authority Brother Barnabas, F. S. C., executive secretary of the Knights of Columbus Boy Life Bureau, organizer and head of the Columbian Squires for the Knights of Columbus, and a nationally known authority on boy welfare work, died Monday in St. Joseph's Sanatorium at Albuquerque, New Mexico. He was buried on Wednesday, from St. Francis Cathedral in Santa Fe, N. M. He had been ill for some months. Brother Barnabas was well known in Rochester and had visited here on a number of occasions. He was born in Ogdensburg, a son of the

late Mr. and Mrs. John A. McDonald, and was 64 years old. He joined the Christian Brothers' Community when a young man, and practically all his life was devoted to boys, their problems, their welfare and their spiritual and material improvement. He founded the Lincoln Agricultural School at Lincolnville, N. Y., for homeless boys, and for eight years was head of this, providing a home for many hundreds of boys, as well as training them for work in life.
