Homes For Aged One-Third Catholic, U. S. Report Shows

Department of Labor at Washington Publishes Interesting Statistics on Important Charity in America—More Than Half the Old People Are in Catholic Institutions

TRIBUTE IS PAID IN THE REPORT TO LITTLE SISTERS OF THE POOR

Washington, April 25.—Of the 475 homes for the aged and infirm found to be operated in the United States by religious organizations, 156, or nearly one-third, are conducted under Catholic auspices, it is revealed in a report of a survey just made by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, United States Department of Labor, just made public.

Four hundred and four of the total number of 475 homes conducted by all denominations reported in the survey that they have a total capacity of 31,879 persons. The 127 Catholic institutions that reported on this item have a total capacity of 15,687 persons, or more than half of the grand total.

Only 398 of the homes reported their average number of persons in residence, the grand total being 27,298. One hundred and twenty-four Catholic homes reporting on this item had a total average number of residents of 13,749, or more than half of the grand total.

Lutherans Are Second Lutheran organizations conduct the second largest number of homes—47—the report shows. Forty-six of these homes reported a total capacity of 3,354 persons, with 2,062 as the average number of residents.

Methodist organizations conduct the third largest number of homes—46—it is shown. Forty-two of these homes report a total capacity of 2,844 persons, with 41 homes reporting 2,408 as the average number of residents.

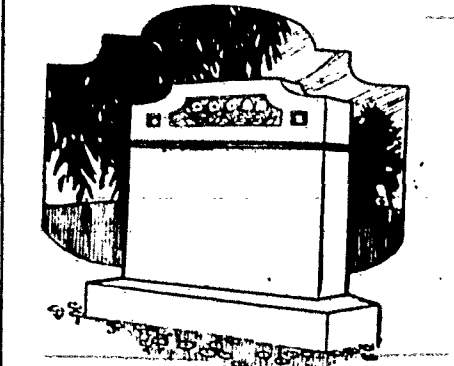
The proceeds from the fair will be used to entertain the 40,000 Elks who will come to Rochester for the annual convention of the New York State Elks' Association in June.
