Famous Shrine In Hearts of Alps

This Basilica will be of Roman Byzantine style modernized, the dimensions being 75 yards wide, 65 yards long, and 32 yards high. It will have a splendid dome 25 yards in diameter, and the weather cock will stand about 82 yards from the ground.

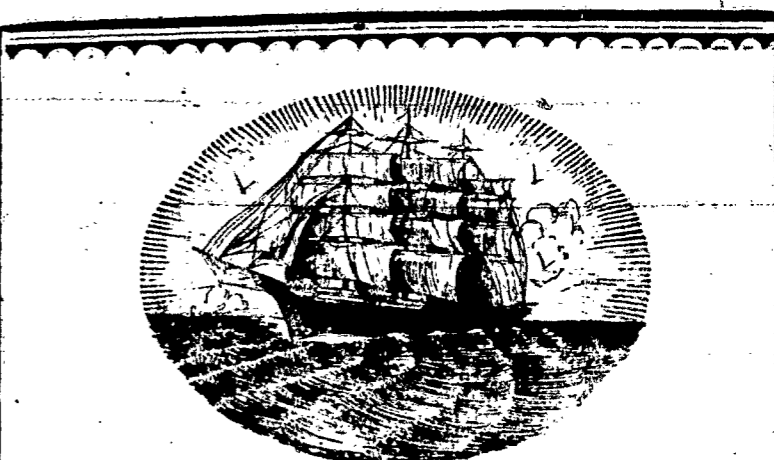
The pulpit will be at the right of the choir, and a reliquary at the left; behind the main altar and the Episcopal throne will be three little Chapels separated by a larger one communicating with the tower; also there will be eighteen other altars distributed on each side.

The inside of the Basilica will be beautifully decorated with mosaics and the walls and pillars will be covered with memorials.

The Sanctuary of Byzantine design with a high tower and a stately dome will be seen from every corner of isieux and for miles around the district. It will cost millions of francs. The Little Flower Basilica will be a structure giving credit to the name of St. Theresa.
