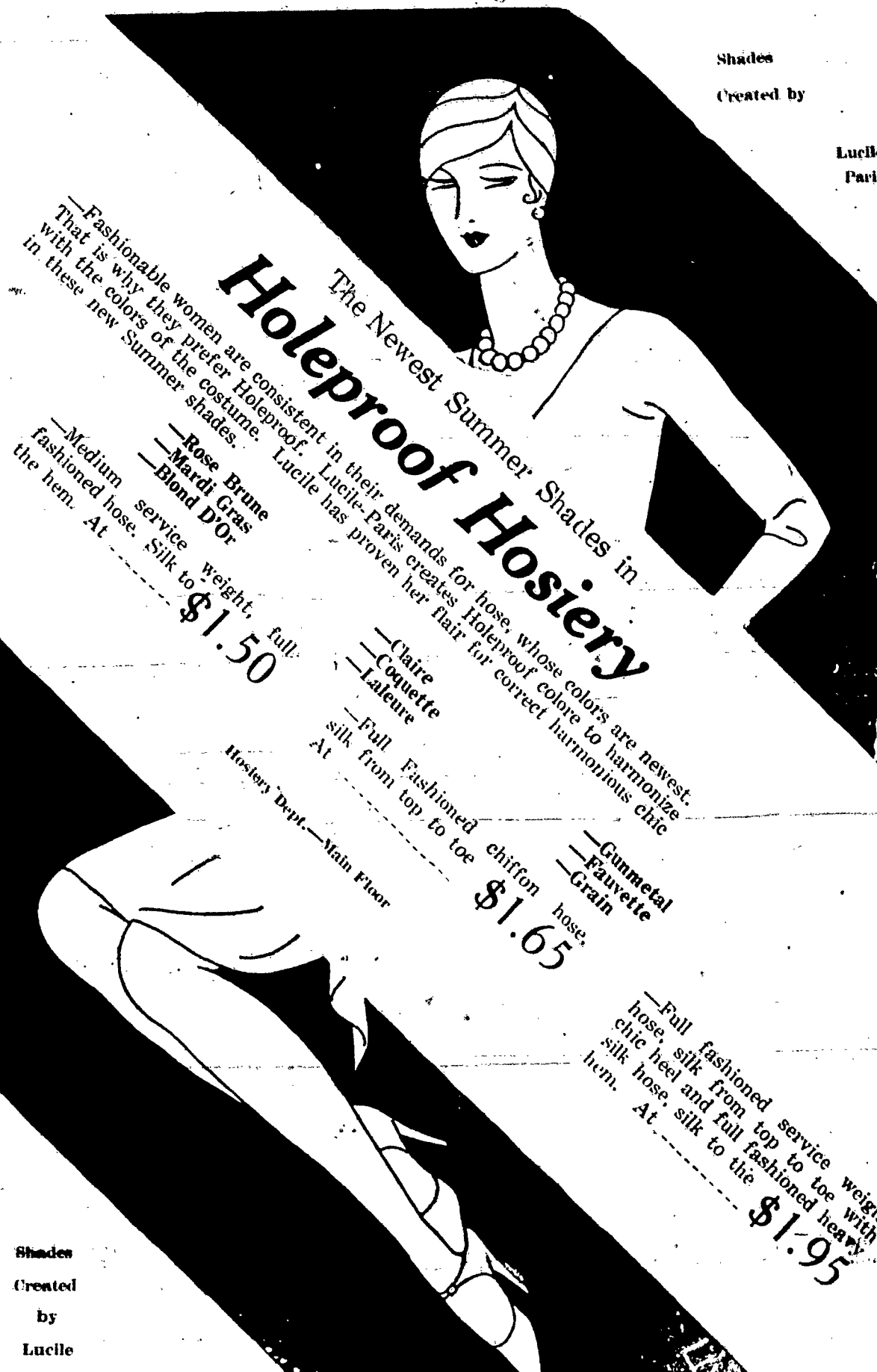

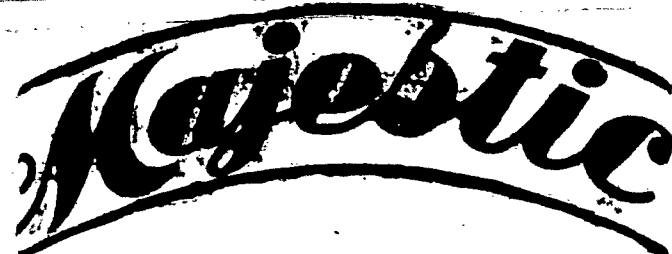

According to this article, credit appears to have been taken by your organization for my vote on the prohibition enforcement bill. Nothing could be further from the truth. I said so in a recent interview and repeat it now. The efforts of one of your officials had absolutely nothing to do with any vote I ever cast.

"In Friday's Baltimore Sun is an article by Mr. Marvin Murphy, quoting you in regard to this matter. You are said to have 'explained' that 'Mr. Pickett had been sent for by Senator Copeland to discuss some prohibition matters. Mr. Pickett had not gone to the Senator's office to lobby,' etc.

Souper of the Lord" and Blessed Edmund Campion's "Rationes Decem," the remarkable "Ten Reasons" which created such a stir in the Universities.

This book was printed between April and June, 1581, by seven workmen at the most. Five were subsequently arrested and one, the Ven. William Hartley, martyred. The stock of type was very small and a few pages had to be set up at a time and printed off, the type being then distributed for the next batch.

Four hundred copies were taken to Oxford by the Ven. William Hartley and distributed along church benches for the benefit of the heretical congregations. "Some" it is related, "were furious, some amused, some frightened, some perplexed; but all agreed that the essay was a model of eloquence, elegance and good taste."

Exhibition of Paintings

Daniel O'Connell, the Liberator, is naturally a chief attraction in the exhibition of paintings, water-colors, miniatures, drawings, prints and photographs of the men and women who took a prominent part in Catholic history.

The royal personalities here include the Cardinal-Prince of the Stuarts, Mary Queen of Scots, Mary I, and James II. Cardinal Weld, Cardinal Allen and Cardinal Newman represent the Sacred College and the confessors of the faith include the last martyr Blessed Oliver Plunkett, Archbishop of Armagh. The old Catholic families also figure prominently in the display.

The liturgical objects, with chalices in three parts and small and thin altar stones, vividly recall the penal days. Many of them were used by the martyred priests and bear their names or initials.

There is the Leyland Chalice, whose engraving of the Crucifixion shows Our Lord's hands raised straight above His head. It was made in London in 1517-18 and bears the inscription "Restore Meo to Leyland in Lancashire," which was responsible for its return after it had strayed thence.

There are many other precious chalices on show, including the Laughton Chalice used by Blessed Edmund Campion, as well as ciboria, monstrances and pyxes.

Other articles of artistic and liturgical interest are the chasubles with panels of English embroidery dating from about 1400 and beautifully depicting various scenes from the lives of Our Lord, Our Lady and the saints. One of the chasubles shown was worn by Father Arrow-smith, the martyred Jesuit, and the chalice vells include one said to have belonged to St. Thomas of Canterbury.

"My dear doctor, we have a generation of young people of the 'flapper' age who are untaught as to the evils of intemperance. With the adoption of the Eighteenth Amendment, too many of us forgot the importance of teaching and preaching temperance.

Forgetting the Gospel

"To invoke the power of the law has engaged so much attention that, as I see it, the old time 'power of the gospel' has been overlooked, as well as Christ's admonition to go to all nations, 'teaching them to observe things whatsoever I have commanded you.'

"We must continue to be teachers and leave to Caesar the things that are his. I have no desire to enter further into a discussion of the matter at issue. I do insist, however, that all those associated with your organization shall not misrepresent me or my position.

**Al Smith Will Get Laetare Medal Sunday**

Notre Dame, Ind., May 2.—EX-Governor Alfred E. Smith will receive the Laetare Medal on Sunday, May 5, in New York City, it was announced by the Rev. Charles L. O'Donnell, C.S.C., president of the University, at the annual "Universal Notre Dame Night" celebration of

the St. Joseph Valley Alumni Association.

Governor Smith, who was announced as the recipient of the medal on Sunday, March 10—the third Sunday in Lent—and that known as Laetare Sunday—agreed to the May 5 date after Father O'Donnell had conferred with him in New York last week. Among the notables who will attend the presentation is Patrick Cardinal Hayes.
