Father Duffy Coming Here On May 31st

Famous Chaplain of "Fighting Irish" Sixty-ninth Regiment to Speak at Testimonial Dinner

Rev. Francis P. Duffy, famous chaplain of the "Fighting Irish" Sixty-ninth Regiment, will be one of the speakers at the testimonial dinner to a former Rochesterian, Louis Wiley, business manager of the New York Times, at the Oak Hill Country Club on the evening of May 31st. The Rochester Press Club will be host of the occasion.

Father Duffy was undoubtedly the best known and best beloved of all American Army chaplains during the World War. He was ranking chaplain of the 165th Infantry of the famed Rainbow Division. General Pershing honored him with the Distinguished Service Cross and Congressional Medal, and he also received the Croix de Guerre with Palm from the French. He is now pastor of the Holy Cross Church in West 42d Street, New York.

Father Duffy is one of the most popular after-dinner speakers in the country, and guests of the dinner are sure of an unusual treat.

Adolph Ochs, owner of the New York Times, and a number of distinguished New York newspapermen will be present at the dinner. William F. Butler, Press Club president and John J. McInerney, dinner committee member and publisher of the Rural Digest, recently went to New York where they arranged for the testimonials for the dinner.

Notre Dame University has come to be considered, because of Knute Rockne and his famous football teams, more of a champion of football than of baseball. It will surprise many people, therefore, to know that Notre Dame apparently tops all Catholic schools in the number of its students that have graduated into the big leagues. Jewish Center Eternal Light Of Tolerance

Says Rev. Francis P. Duffy, Famous War Chaplain, in Sending Gift to Jewish Fund

New York, May 2.—The Rev. Francis P. Duffy, pastor of the Church of the Holy Cross and former chaplain of the 68th Infantry, was the first contributor to the \$150,000 fund being raised to complete the Jewish Community Center on Ocean Parkway in Brooklyn. In sending his contribution, Father Duffy wrote:

"I take pleasure in enclosing my check for \$100. This offering is made partially because the Jewish body of the Ocean Parkway neighborhood is anxious to complete a community center for the entire community to be emblazoned by an eternal light of tolerance. It gives me great satisfaction to do something to show my appreciation of a people who are the most generous and broadminded in the world. My lack of means makes my contribution a small one. I hope it will be taken as a gesture of friendliness and appreciation."
