
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### Nazareth Play Wednesday Night

Knut Rockne told the members of the Boston Athletic Club the other day how he picks his football material in his work as coach at Notre Dame University. Here are his tests, named in the order of their importance:

- 1—Brains. Resiliency of mind, resourcefulness, power of analysis.
- 2—Spark. The emotional urge that lifts a man out of the commonplace.
- 3—Willingness to work hard. It is an essential of success.
- 4—Sense of responsibility. Chores pay dividends and clearing the path for a teammate is a chore.
- 5—Proper viewpoint toward sport. Play the game fairly, to respect rights of opponents and the rules of the game.
- 6—Mental and moral courage, physical courage taken for granted.

### 21 States To Send Pilgrims To Tomb Of Little Flower

Chicago, May 2.—Reservations for the Fourth Annual Pilgrimage to the birthplace and tomb of the Little Flower in France have already been received from 21 States, the Carmelite Fathers here report. So numerous have been the inquiries concerning this year's pilgrimage, which is expected to be the largest ever to go from America to Lisieux, that a special bureau has been established at the National Headquarters of the Society of the Little Flower, at the Carmelite Monastery in this city.

An unusual feature of the pilgrimage will be a special solemn novena beginning on shipboard on July 4, the date of sailing, and closing on the ninth day, when the pilgrims arrive at Lisieux. There will be Mass and devotions each day at sea, and on their arrival at Lisieux, the pilgrims will attend Mass and receive Holy Communion at the tomb of the Little Flower. The Rev. Martin O'Donnell, O. Carm., one of the priests at the National Shrine of the Little Flower here, will accompany the pilgrimage as chaplain.

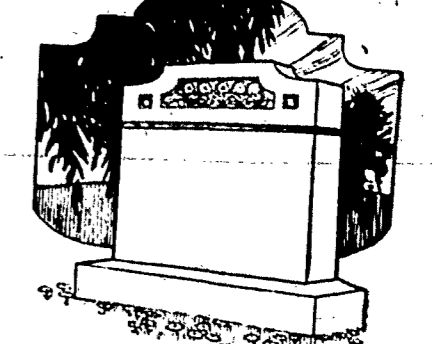

### Vatican Coinage Ordered by Pope

Rome, May 2.—The Pope has given orders for coinage of new Vatican money. The first coins will be 20-lira gold and five-lira silver pieces.

The money will be principally used for the purchase of Vatican stamps at the postoffice to be established within the Vatican City, for payment of admission charges to art galleries and similar institutions, small fees, etc. The coins will also be used in papal territory outside the Vatican.

Vatican employees, however, will still be paid in Italian currency.

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
