**Heroic Nurses
 Rescue Crazed
 Woman on Roof**

Winnipeg, May 16.—A twenty-five minute battle took place on a twelve-inch ledge, seventy-five feet above the ground at the Misericordia Hospital Sunday morning when Miss Annie Strake of Beausjour, a psychopathic patient, escaped from a strait-jacket and tried to hurt herself to the ground.

Three women nurses crept towards the patient and seized her. Two internes came to her rescue, but the crazed woman put up such a desperate fight that it took 20 minutes to subdue her. The internes had to chloroform her before they could remove her in safety. Several hundred people watched the thrilling rescue from the street, and the Fire Department was rushed to the scene.

**K. of C. Exams
 For Scholarships**

The State Council of the Knights of Columbus has nine scholarship openings this year for members, or sons, daughters or brothers of members.

But there is no opening in the Rochester district, which includes Brockport, Albion, Medina, Newark, Danville, Batavia, Buffalo and places beyond Buffalo.

There is one opening, however, in the district that includes Elmira, Oneonta, Ithaca, Geneva, Seneca Falls, Waterloo, Auburn, Canandaigua, Corning, Hornell, Bath, Penn Yan. This scholarship is for girls, and is for D'Youville College, Buffalo.

The scholarships are worth \$200 per year, and are good for four years each, a total of \$800. Eligible candidates should get in touch with the Grand Knights of the K. of C. Councils in their home places, and obtain application blanks. These blanks should be filed not later than June 18. The examinations will be held on June 24 and 25, at the college, or at the K. of C. Homes where the applicants live.

The State is divided into ten districts by the Knights, and applicants must take the examinations in the districts in which they live. The scholarships are limited to the districts to which they are allotted. No applications will be received from students who have had college training; only from those who are beginning their college course.

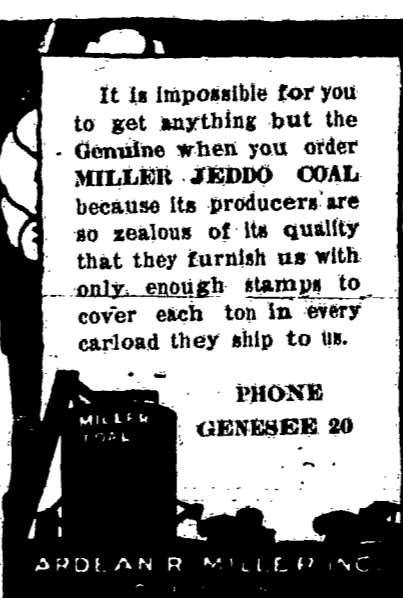

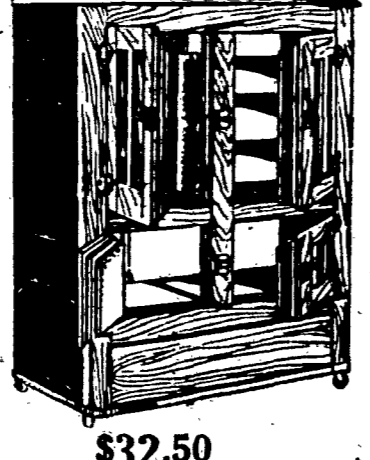
