Batavia Church Silver Jubilee

Will Be Celebrated by the Erection of a New Church and School to Cost \$100,000

Batavia, May 16.—The Silver Jubilee of the Sacred Heart Church in this city will be celebrated in October. In observance of this event, plans are under way for the erection of a new church and school, at an estimated cost of at least \$100,000.

A basement church was erected about 15 years ago, and a wooden school building that now accommodates 150 children. It is estimated that there are twice that number of children who would attend the school if a new and modern building were provided. The Sisters of Mercy are in charge of the school.

The pastor of the church, Rev. S. M. Chichowski, announces that a committee of sixteen members of the church had been appointed to study the building problem and plan finances. An architect is preparing plans for the church and school, and when estimates of cost are obtained definite action will be obtained.

HORNELL Well-Known Lawyer Buried on Monday

Hornell, May 16.—John Griffin, 78 years old, one of the best known lawyers in this section of the State, was buried from St. Ann's Church at 9 o'clock Monday morning. Mr. Griffin died at the home of his sister, Mrs. Maria McNamara, in Rochester, and his body was brought to his home here. An unusually large congregation attended his funeral, including many priests and practically all lawyers in the vicinity. He had practiced law in Hornell for the past fifty years.

Dr. Griffin was a charter member of Hornell Elks, a member of Hornell Council, Knights of Columbus, and the Hornell Bar Association. He leaves two brothers, the Rev. James A. Griffin of Corning, Thomas Griffin of Angelica; a sister, Mrs. McNamara of Rochester; a nephew, Dr. Joseph McNamara of Rochester, and a niece, Miss Genevieve Griffin of Toledo, Ohio. Interment was in St. Peter and Paul's Cemetery in Elmira.

BISHOP WILL CONFIRM 400 CHILDREN SUNDAY AT THE CATHEDRAL

Ceremony Will Be in Keeping with Established Custom of Observing Pentecost Sunday by Giving Confirmation

The Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D.D., Bishop of Rochester, will confirm a class of approximately 400 children at St. Patrick's Cathedral at 4 o'clock Sunday afternoon. The day is Pentecost Sunday, and it has been a long-established custom for the Bishop of the Diocese to give the Sacrament of Confirmation on this day. Bishop O'Hern is continuing that custom, and with a class that will delight all friends of the Cathedral.

The children in the class will be from the Cathedral Parish School, from St. Mary's Orphan Asylum for boys and St. Patrick's Orphan Asylum for girls, from Nazareth Hall, and from Public Schools Nos. 5 and 17. They have been prepared for the reception of the sacrament with the greatest possible care. About 25 adults will be in the class.

A large number of priests will be present at the conferring of the Sacrament, and Bishop O'Hern will give a talk to the children. Professor Bonn, organist at the Cathedral.
