Bishop O'Hern Will Ordain Priests in St. Patrick's Cathedral June 8th; Fine New Modern Hospital Will Soon Be Erected in the City of Auburn

Class at Seminary Will be Ordained By Bishop June 8

The Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern Will Officiate for First Time at Ordination Ceremony on June 8th—Ten Members of Class to Be Ordained Here, and Nineteen in Their Home Dioceses

125 OTHER STUDENTS AT THE SEMINARY WILL RECEIVE PRELIMINARY ORDERS

The Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D.D., Bishop of Rochester will officiate for the first time at an ordination ceremony of Saturday, June 8th, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, when he will ordain ten young men to the priesthood in St. Patrick's Cathedral.

There are 29 seminarians in this year's class in St. Bernard's Seminary. One was ordained in Ponce, Porto Rico, and another in Providence, R. I., a few weeks ago. Seventeen others will be ordained on Saturday this week, May 25th, in their home dioceses—Albany, N. Y.; Scranton, Pa.; Hartford, Conn.; Mobile, Ala.; Joliet, Ill., and the other ten in St. Patrick's Cathedral here on the 8th of June. The members of the class received their other orders from Bishop O'Hern in St. Bernard's Seminary during the octave of Pentecost.

On June 6th and 7th, in St. Bernard's Seminary, 125 students from various dioceses will receive preliminary orders, some tonsure, some minor orders, and others sub-deaconship. Bishop O'Hern will officiate.

At the ordination of priests on June 8th, Bishop O'Hern will be assisted by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. J. J. Hartley of St. Bernard's Seminary, and Rev. Charles F. Shay, rector of the Cathedral.

At low mass on June 8th the students of St. Bernard's Seminary will sing the "Litany of the Saints", "Veni Creator" and the "Te Deum", under the direction of the Rev. John M. Petter, Professor of Music at the Seminary.

Many relatives and friends of the young men to be ordained here on June 8th will be present at the ordination ceremony, and there will be a large number of priests and the faithful in attendance.

Chief among the resolutions adopted by the Association was one empowering its Board to "consider the question of the publication of a Catholic 'Who's Who,' and to take such steps as it deems necessary in co-operating in the publication of such a work if it deems it advisable after investigation."

Periodicals for Schools

Use in classrooms of Catholic periodicals and newspapers and increased use of the Catholic Press Hour idea in Catholic schools generally were recommended to the Catholic Educational Association. It also was voted to continue the campaign for 500 life members of the Association with renewed vigor.

Broadside against subscription sales persons were called inadvisable in another resolution and editors warning of dishonest agents were asked to state at the same time that sales persons carrying the seal of the C. P. A. Circulation Vigilance Committee can be trusted.

Dominican Friars Return to Oxford After 7 Centuries

London, May 24.—The Dominicans have returned officially to Oxford, when the new Priory of the Holy Ghost was recently opened and blessed. Their first English foundation was made there in 1221 and was in existence up to the time of the dissolution of the monasteries.

When completed the new building will have accommodation for 70 religious, but for the present it will house only half that number. Eventually all English Dominican students entering upon their theological course will pass through Oxford. The cost of the building, including the church, has been \$300,000. Of this sum a woman who desires anonymity contributed \$50,000. The building will be opened free of debt.

Father Sheehan Named Apostolic Vicar Of Yukiang

Rome, May 24.—The Rev. Edward Sheehan, American Lazarist, has just been named Apostolic Vicar of Yukiang, in the Province of Kiangsi. Father Sheehan was ordained in 1916 but did not go to China until 1923. He has been remarkable for his good administration and zeal in defending the interests of the mission entrusted to him during the civil war.

Iceland Now Has Catholic Cathedral And Fine Hospital

Rotterdam, May 23.—A correspondent of "De Maasbode" writes from Oslo: Iceland has its own priest, has a new Catholic hospital at Hafnarfjord and is completing a Cathedral in the capital city of Reykjavik. It is the largest and most beautiful church in the land.

Work on the foundation was begun in August, 1926; upon April 1, 1927, the cornerstone was laid and now the work is as good as finished.

From the hill upon which the Church stands it dominates the surrounding country. The walls are of reinforced concrete mixed with a volcanic dust that makes the stone-facets glisten in the sun and moonlight.

Although of modern material, the church's style is gothic. It glories in the possession of three bells, of which the largest weighs 4,000 pounds. The erection of the new Iceland cathedral by the Montfort Fathers is symbolic of the revival and restoration of the old Mother Church in the Far Northern lands, where her past was so glorious.

\$350,000 Campaign For Mercy Hospital In Auburn in

New Hospital Building Will Be Erected on Church Site—Gift of Church Property to Approved by Church Authorities—Commenced June 1 to 10

HOSPITAL CARES FOR MANY PATIENTS AND NEW BUILDING IS BADE

Auburn, May 23.—A campaign was authorized and launched for a building fund of \$350,000 for a new Mercy Hospital will be launched in this city June 1st and continued until June 10th.

The hospital will be erected on the site of St. Edward's Church, Thornton Avenue, and it will be a thoroughly modern institution, providing larger quarters and better facilities for the Sisters, nurses and their patients.

The transfer of the site to the hospital has just been completed. The gift of the church property to Mercy Hospital was first proposed at a meeting of the Board of Trustees of St. Edward's Church in Rochester on April 25, at which all of the trustees were present as follows: The Rt. Greek Orthodox Church Protests Palestine Policy

Jerusalem, May 23.—In an open letter to Sir John Chancellor, British High Commissioner for Palestine and Transjordan, published in the local Arab Press, the Greek-Orthodox Young Men's Association of Jerusalem energetically protests against the policy adopted by the Palestine Government concerning the administration of their Church.

First, the signers denounce the imposition of a Commission by the English authorities upon the economic administration of their Patriarchate. A similar protest against the interference of the civil powers into the internal matters of his Church has already been made by Patriarch Damianos, himself.

Liverpool Cathedral Soon To Be Started

London, May 24.—Archbishop Downey announced last week that he hopes an early start will be made on the cathedral which is being planned for Liverpool. He stated that the money already collected amounts to nearly \$750,000. Invested funds are yielding \$30,000 a year.

A site has not yet been selected. The Archbishop says that delicate negotiations are in progress and he hopes before long to make "a joyful announcement."

Rota Hears 51 Cases
