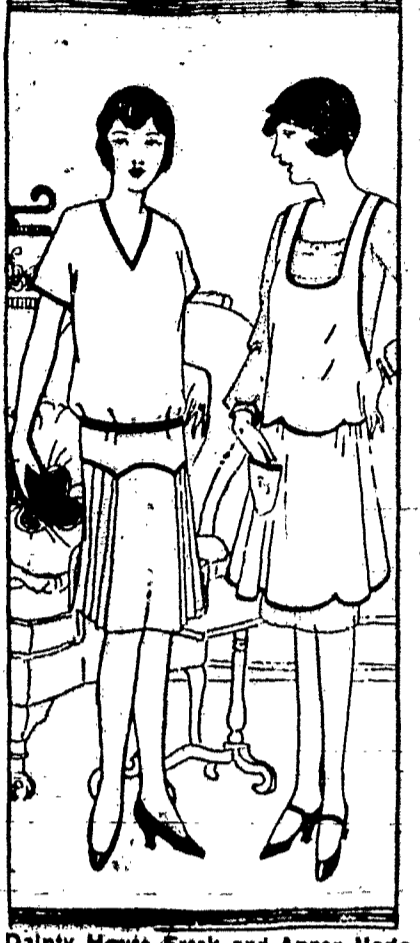

By October, the first unit, an L-shaped building, will be ready to receive the student body, priests and staff. When completed, the Seminary will be E-shaped, the center wing housing a beautiful chapel.

When the new St. Joseph's Seminary here is ready, the motherhouse and novitiate of the Josephite Fathers will be moved to Washington from Baltimore. The students at the present St. Joseph's Seminary in the Monumental City attend classes at St. Mary's Seminary and University of the Archdiocese of Baltimore. ## Flour Bags Make Neat House Frocks, Aprons

Sloveness went out with the era of the dressing sack and boudoir cap. The up-to-date woman is as smartly, though suitably, dressed for her working hours as for pleasure, and no less becomingly.

The house frock shown here, for example, meets all the requirements of sturdiness, smartness and freedom of

movement. It also meets the slender pocketbook since it can be made for little or nothing at home. The materials required are four empty flour bags and four yards of bias tape. A patent-leather or suede belt is a smart accessory and can be used on any number of other frocks besides, or a narrow belt of contrasting material can be made.

The bags you probably have in the house from flour bought for home baking, or almost any baker will sell them for a few cents apiece. First you will want to take out the stamping, and that is not a difficult task. Many women prefer to do this by covering the bled places with lard or soaking them in kerosene for a few hours and then washing in warm water. The flour bag material takes an excellent dye, so that with a little effort, one may have her favorite shade of green, blue or rose, with bias binding in some effective contrasting color.

In cutting such a pattern as this out of flour bags, it will be necessary to have a seam across the shoulder. A smart effect is obtained by binding the front edge of the shoulders and then stitching it down to the back edge.

The clever apron also shown can be made from the same material. This style requires a little more work than a straight slip-over model, but its additional attractiveness well repays one. The apron skirt is scalloped top and bottom and bound with colored bias tape, as are the pocket, armholes and neck and straps. A corn yellow with black, light green with lavender, light with dark blue, are a few of the effective color schemes which may be obtained by dyeing the flour bags.

Soft Greens, Yellow, Brown and Beige Tones Blend With Nature.

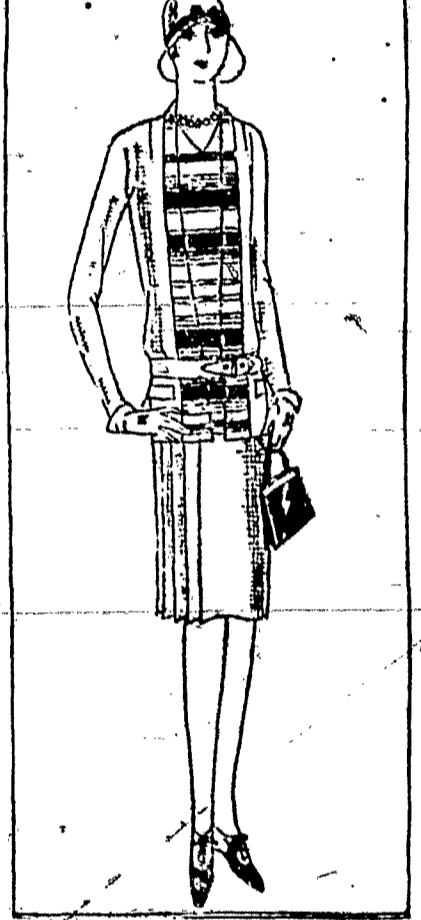

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## Minister Makes Strong Plea For Catholic Martyrs

Suggests That Protestant Churches at Tyburn Unite, Do Penance for Horrible Crimes

London, May 23.—A united service of the Protestant churches at Tyburn, where many Catholics were martyred in the penal days, is the suggestion of the Rev. Sir James Marchant, a non-Catholic. He thinks reparation should be made in this way or the crimes committed against Catholics.

Writing in the *Times*, the Rev. Sir James Marchant, who is the director of the National Council of Public Morals, says: "As I joined in the inspiring celebrations of Catholic Emancipation (as I would in any celebration of the abolition of slavery), the past history of religious persecutions rose before me like a dream, and an overwhelming sense of shame blinded me to the splendours being enacted before my eyes. I went out to Tyburn Stone and bent in penitence for the horrible crimes committed in the name of Christ."

"I respectfully suggest that the leaders of all the Churches should seize this signal opportunity to assemble round that stone of remembrance, and hold a united service of penance and thanksgiving, penance for the crimes of our forefathers, thanksgiving that we have lived to see the day when the Christian Communion publicly disown these foul deeds."

"Such a service would surely be well pleasing to Almighty God, would close forever one of the blackest pages of history, and would promote the reunion of Christendom."

## Mexican Magazine Devotes Number To Vatican Pact

Washington, May 24.—The April issue of *El Mensajero del Sacrado Corazon de Jesus*, Mexican monthly "Messenger of the Sacred Heart of Jesus," is given over almost entirely to the subject of the settlement of the Roman question.

The volume is beautifully illustrated with rotogravures of the Vatican, the Lateran, the Quirinal, the signing of the treaty, and photographs of the captive Popes and historical personages associated with the Roman question.

## City of Naples Beautiful Place

Naples, the grand opera city, disputes with Constantinople the claim of occupying the most beautiful site in Europe. Street dancers dance, street singers sing and street vendors cry their wares in a musical uproar peculiar to Southern Italy. Old Vesuvius can usually be relied upon to provide the artistic background for Naples and its famous Bay.
