Rev. Arthur A. Hughes Given Purse of \$1,000 On 35th Anniversary

People, Priests and Prelates Help Rector of Holy Mary Church Celebrate Happy Event—Many Clergymen At Luncheon

The Rev. Arthur A. Hughes, rector of Holy Mary Church, celebrated the 35th anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood on Sunday and Monday of this week. Sun-

day morning Father Hughes celebrated a solemn High Mass at 11 o'clock, and in the evening there was a special vesper service, at which there was a procession of children of the parish, all dressed in white.

Members of the Fourth Degree Assembly, Knights of Columbus, of which Father Hughes is chaplain, acted as ushers. There was a capacious congregation present.

The Rt. Rev. Msgr. Michael J. Nolan, D. D., Chancellor of the Diocese, preached a sermon that was a fine tribute to the life, work and priestly character of Father Hughes. Jean McKenna, in behalf of the children of the parish school, presented Father Hughes a basket of beautiful flowers, and the men of the parish gave him a purse of \$1,000.

Many Attend Luncheon

Father Hughes served a luncheon in a large tent on the Church lawn on Monday. Among the guests were Most Rev. Archbishop Thomas F. Hickey, D. D., Archbishop of Vancouver; the Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D. D., Bishop of Rochester; the Very Rev. Msgr. John Glavin of Albany, a classmate of Father Hughes at the Troy Seminary; about forty priests, members of various religious orders, and relatives of Father Hughes.

Appreciative talks were given at the luncheon by Archbishop Hickey;

by Very Rev. Msgr. James Hartley, D. D., president emeritus of St. Bernard's Seminary; by Msgr. Glavin, and by Very Rev. William M. Hart, Vicar-General of the Diocese. A program of music helped make the event most enjoyable.

Rome, May 24.—The ceremony of beatification of Don Bosco, founder of the Salesians, on June 2 will have unusual solemnity because of the presence in Rome of a great number of pilgrims and delegations, including Cardinal Gamba, Archbishop of Turin; Cardinal Riboldi, Archbishop of Gnesen and Posen; and 25 bishops.

Besides the Turin pilgrimage, estimated at 25,000 persons, there will be approximately 70,000 persons in other groups visiting Rome at that time.

The Burroughs Adding Machine, managed by G. P. Spalding, occupies the entire third floor. A stairway and automatic elevator lead to all floors.

The building is beautifully lighted, the floors are of Terrazo-stone; the walls of Kraftex, with marble inlaid. Groups of steel equipment for offices are shown at the front of the "Y & E" store, and near the center are counter height units in walnut finish, demonstration files, card records, samples, etc. Close by is a row of trays and bases for machine posting, and steel desks for commercial bookkeepers and savings bank card ledgers.

The first room at the left has a complete "Y & E" "DeLuxe" office suite—desk, swivel chair, table, telephone stand, customer and waste basket—all in beautiful figured walnut.

On the opposite side of the hall way is another room which is a credit to Mr. D. J. McLaughlin, Superintendent of the Wood Plant, who supervised the construction of the walnut paneling which extends from floor to ceiling.

The other rooms are beautifully finished and furnished, and will delight visitors who know good things. The receiving and shipping room are in the rear. Here, too, are laboratories for men and women.

On the mezzanine floor is a private office, finished in buff, with a "DeLuxe" walnut suite for the manager, Mr. P. S. Fassett. Here, also, are desks for the salesman, and a steel counter for the office records, all in olive green finish.
