Edward Callahan, Son of Attorney and Mrs. Charles E. Callahan, Heads 4,460 Rivals

WINS A SCHOLARSHIP AND A HISTORIC TOUR
Wrote Best Essay on "Old Glory's Greatest Glory" and Answered Many Questions About Flag

Edward Callahan, 16 years old, honor student at Aquinas Institute, and a son of Attorney and Mrs. Charles E. Callahan of 520 Seneca Parkway, was awarded first prize this week in the Western New York Division of the Nation-Wide Flag Contest conducted by the Rochester Journal-American and associate papers. He has been awarded \$200 for a scholarship fund and a trip to historic places in America.

Edward wrote the best essay on "Old Glory's Greatest Glory" and answered 75 questions about the Flag most correctly, excelling 4,460 declaring him worthy of the first prize was cast by the regional judges, William R. Boothby, Joseph Fritsch, Jr. and A. H. Nelsner.

William Flynn, Jr., of Troop 98, Boy Scouts of Buffalo, was awarded second prize, and William Silverman, a senior student at Monroe High School, was awarded the third prize. Each will receive \$200 for educational purposes. Nearly 100 schools had contestants in the Flag Contest. The high honor won by Edward Callahan is therefore a notable one, and he will receive the hearty congratulations of many people.
