### PATIENCE

Father Tagawa, a Japanese priest of the Society of Mary, writes: "Patience is a great Japanese virtue. That is why, in Japan, it is a sure sign of interiority, a great shame upon a person of a certain rank, not to be master of himself in every circumstance. To groan while suffering, to weep in public, to be excited while waiting, to pass in front of another man in a hurry, to show signs of impatience while attending a lecture that may be a little long, are shameful manifestations on the part of a Japanese. With regard to patience and impatience let me add also that the Japanese does not know how to swear or use 'cuss' words. But this does not mean a stoic resignation . . . not at all. He must ever show a patient smile. This manner of acting is exasperating to Europeans and Americans, but it is necessary. With us it is a rule of politeness."

### MASSES FOR WEEK

Sunday, June 2.—St. Pothinus, Bishop, governed the See of Lyons during the persecution that broke out in that city in 177, during which many were martyred.

Monday, June 3.—St. Clotilda, Queen, was the wife of Clovis, King of the Franks. By her virtue and wisdom she converted her husband to the Faith and with him the entire nation. She died in 455.

Tuesday, June 4.—St. Francis Caracciolo, born of a princely family, after being miraculously cured of leprosy left his home to study for the priesthood. He founded an Order of Clerks Regular who maintained one of their number always in perpetual adoration before the Blessed Sacrament. He died in 1608.

Wednesday, June 5.—St. Doniface, Bishop and Martyr, was born in Devonshire in 820, receiving authority from the Pope to preach the Faith in Bavaria, Thuringia, Hesse, Friesland, and Saxony. While waiting to administer confirmation to some newly-baptized Christians, he and his attendants were attacked by a troop of pagans. The Saint forbade his attendants to offer resistance and he and fifty-one others were slain.

Thursday, June 6.—St. Norbert, Bishop, after leading a life of dissipation at the Court of the Emperor Henry IV that was a scandal to his sacred calling, repented and established the Canons Regular or Premonstratensians who were to unite the active work of the country clergy with the obligations of the monastic life. In 1126 he was named Bishop of Magdeburg.

Friday, June 7.—St. Robert of Newminster, while a monk at Whitby, heard that thirteen religious had been expelled from the Abbey of St. Mary in York, for having proposed to restore the strict Benedictine rule. He joined the religious and later became Abbot of a monastery built for them at Newminster.

Saturday, June 8.—St. Medard, Bishop, was one of the most illustrious prelates of the Church in France. He was consecrated by St. Remigius who had baptized King Clovis. After a life noted for devotion to the poor, he died at Noyon in 545.

### Catholic Charities Will Hold Annual Meeting Nov. 10-14

Washington, May 29.—For the first time in its history the National Conference of Catholic Charities will meet in the South. Its annual convention will be held in that old-world Catholic city of New Orleans from November 10 to 14.

To discover to what extent parishes are functioning as social agencies, a study of 100 parishes in ten cities is being made by the Rev. Dr. John O'Grady, the Rev. Richard Doherty of St. Paul and the Rev. Dr. Lawrence J. Shehan of Washington, D. C. Their findings will be incorporated in a paper to be read.

Among the speakers at the evening meetings will be the French Ambassador, M. Paul Claudel; the Rev. Fulton J. Sheen, instructor of Moral Theology at the Catholic University; George L. Berry, President, International Printing Pressmen and Assistants' Union, who will speak on Labor Standards in the Industrial South, and Judge Brady of Albany whose subject will be "The Future of Juvenile Courts."
