**Life Work Done,
Sister M. Teresa
Is Laid at Rest**

Taught for Sixty Years in Parochial Schools in the Diocese of Rochester
Sister M. Teresa Powers died Monday evening at Our Lady of Victory Convent and was buried from Our Lady of Victory Church at 10 o'clock Thursday morning.
Sister M. Teresa completed sixty years of service as a teacher in parochial schools in the Diocese of Rochester on March 19 last. She had charge of St. Mary's School, Auburn, when it was opened in 1873, and she did splendid work there for several years. The number of pupils in the school increased under her principalship from 183 to more than 700, and the school won a fine and fine place in the hearts of the Catholic people of the city.
In 1884 Sister M. Teresa was sent to Ithaca to open the Immaculate Conception School. Here also she made a great success of her work. The school now has 12 teachers, and an attendance of nearly 500 pupils.
In 1902 Sister M. Teresa returned to Auburn and opened the new St. Aloysius School, which now has an attendance of nearly 400 pupils. Her splendid capability as a teacher was also evidenced in this school, and it was a success from the start.
For the past 15 years Sister M. Teresa had taught in Our Lady of Victory School. Hundreds of boys and girls all over and beyond the Diocese remember her with love and gratitude. She was a woman of beautiful character, kindly, helpful and always self-sacrificing in her work. She had remarkable gifts as a teacher, and all her life she gave freely and cheerfully to the children under her care.
Sister Teresa belonged to one of the pioneer Catholic families of Western New York. She leaves a brother, Richard Powers of Rochester.
